CONOWAY DRILLING AT 2200 FEET; PROSPECTS EXCELLENT

D. J. Lewis, superintendent of drilling at Conoway No. 1, fourteen miles southwest of Colorado, was in the city Tuesday morning and reported that he was drilling at a depth of 2200 feet in lime formation and that prospects were excellent for a good well to come in within the next two or three hundred feet.

Lewis stated that he was then drilling an eight inch hole and that he had not been troubled with water. The log of the well corresponds in many respects to those of the wells at Westbrook, he said.

STRANDED MAN AT COLORADO Municipal Bond Election Is Ordered By City Council

An order for a bond election to be held in Colorado on Tuesday, August 2, to determine whether the city shall issue waterworks improvement bonds in the sum of \$85,000 and sewer bonds in the sum of \$35,000, was passed by the City Council Thursday morning.

A petition asking that such election be ordered was presented to the council two weeks ago, but because of legal technicalities involved, the order was not finally issued until Thursday.

The order specifies that the bonds shall bear interest at the rate of six per cent per annum, with an option clause to mature them at any time after ten years.

Better times are to be experienced n Colorado during the fall of 1921 than those of last year if the predictions of a number of conservative business men and farmers are to be taken as authority. The past week several have voiced the belief that Mitchell county farmers would have more money to spend this year than

One of the reasons for this prediction is based upon the fact that the farmer in planting and cultiavting his crops this year has at least until now faced the assurance that his commodities would not comand a good price. Throughout the year the market has presented a very unsatisfactory aspect for the grower of cotton; grain; feed stuffs, and truck.

The producer, realizing this, was prompted to economize, it is pointed out, and has not gone into debt for money borrowed or for supplies beyond an amount necessary. He could not see much money in sight as the revenue in exchange for his crops, and consequently did not assume superfluous obligations.

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




