BOND ELECTION ON TUESDAY, AUG. 2

The Municipal election ordered recently by the City Council to determine whether the city shall be authorized to issue bonds not to exceed \$120,000 for waterworks improvement, and the laying of sewer mains, will be held Tuesday at the City Hall. F. A. Winn and A. A. Dorn were named as judges to preside at the election, while E. M. Baldwin and O. B. Price are to act as clerks.

It is proposed to impound a large lake of water by damming Lone Wolf Creek near the city, providing a supply of pure water sufficient to meet the needs of a community considerably larger than Colorado. The present waterworks system is to be extended as far north as Ninth Street and across the river into South Colorado, so as to afford city water and fire protection to practically the entire city. South Colorado does not now have this service.

The plans for a sewer system, as suggested by the consulting engineers, Myers & Noyse of Dallas, who were employed by the Chamber of Commerce to make these surveys, call for an adequate system covering practically the entire city, both the downtown and residence districts. The proposed site for a disposal plant is located near the junction of Lone Wolf Creek and the Colorado river.

Only qualified voters of the municipality, who are property taxpayers, will be permitted to participate in this election. There has developed small opposition to the issues and those championing the proposed projects believe the bonds will be approved.

COLORADO PASTOR WILL CONDUCT REVIVAL AT UNION

Rev. C. L. Browning, pastor of the First Methodist church of Colorado, will conduct a revival at Union, ten miles southwest of Colorado, commencing Sunday morning, August 7. The meeting will continue over the Sunday following.

Rev. Browning will conduct a revival near Big Spring, commencing the second Sunday in August.

MYSTERY STILL SURROUNDS "THE MAN WITH THE JUGS."

Mystery still surrounds "the man with the jugs." Watt Collier stated Tuesday, in response to the question if identity of the person who fled his cane patch last week, carrying a jug in each hand, had been established.

Last week Mr. Collier employed Will Henderson to harvest a field of cane, just across the river west of Colorado. Henderson had been busy only a few hours, cutting row after row on either side of the field down with his harvester, gradually narrowing the strip of standing sorghum row by row, when suddenly a man carrying a jug in each hand, was seen to make hurried exit from the cane patch and make a hasty retreat for the hills overlooking the river.

Henderson looked about him a little and detected another jug partially hidden under the foliage between two rows of the cane, and going to the location, found a small funnel also. He noticed an odor suggesting whiskey and upon making a careful examination (through the sense of smell) found some real, honest-to-goodness hooch in the container.

Looking for the escaping man with the other jugs again, it was found that he had completely disappeared. Collier stated Tuesday afternoon that in so far as he knew the fellow might be running until yet. This, however, is only problematical, and it is more generally believed that the possessor of the two jugs was vending the juice, regarded by so many as an oasis in the midst of the Volstead desert, merely moved his distributing point from the Collier cane patch to a more secluded location.

COLORADO PULLED THIS STUNT SOME TIME AGO.

"Is Operated Upon Without Anesthetics," read headline in the daily papers Tuesday, and in reading the article following this caption, we found that much ado was being made over the fact that Mrs. Beulah Payne wife of an ex-constable at Paris, had submitted to the ordeal of a surgical operation without the use of anesthetics.

Paris is pulling an old one in this stunt, since this feat was performed at the Colorado Sanitarium several weeks ago. J. A. Pickens, local grocer and butcher, went to the operating table and interestingly watched the surgeons remove his appendix, refusing to be administered drugs.

"It felt very much similar to a rough shave," Pickens is quoted to have stated to a friend who visited him at the hospital a few hours after the operation had been performed.

DERRICK FOSTER 2 BEING ERECTED

Geo. A. Reese, manager for the Colorado-Tex Company, was in Colorado Tuesday and stated that the contractor commenced erection of the derrick for Foster No. 2 Monday. This well will be the second to be drilled by this company on their holdings at Iatan, and is located some two thousand feet southeast from the first test—Foster No. 1, which has been under pump for several days.

Mr. Reese stated that he would begin to string the tool just as soon as the derrick is completed and expected to be ready to spud the second well by August 15th.

In speaking of the present well, he stated that production continued to improve under the pump and placed 150 barrels as a conservative estimate. The 1700 barrel storage capacity of the company at the well is filled and arrangements will probably be made to ship one or more cars of oil next week.

Reese was optimistic and expressed himself as believing "a big surprise was in store for the citizens of Mitchell county who were slow to believe we really have something here worth developing."

GIN MANAGER INJURED WHEN SCAFFOLD FALLS

W. E. Cooper, manager of the Concrete Gin of the Continental Oil-Cotton Company, sustained a painful injury to his forehead, immediately above his right eye, when a scaffold on which he was working at the gin gave way and fell. The accident occurred Monday and three stitches were required to close the wound.

Cooper stated that his face was thrown against a section of iron smoke stack, the edge of which cut a gash just above his eye. The eyelid was cut through but miraculously no injury was done to the pupil.

SANITARIUM ROAD BEING IMPROVED BY THE COUNTY.

The road leading from South Colorado to the Colorado Sanitarium is being improved by the county. The road is being changed, so as to enter the city immediately south of the A. A. Dorn residence, rather than at a point north of this place, as heretofore. The roadbed is being widened and raised in several places, which will serve to greatly eliminate the possibility of automobile accidents on the present narrow, curved driveway leading to the sanitarium.

The Colorado Sanitarium, of which Dr. C. L. Root is surgeon in charge, is located on a scenic bluff south of the city, from which a beautiful view of the city may be had. The institution is equipped with every modern facility for the treatment of surgery.

QUALIFICATIONS OF A VOTER IN COMING BOND ELECTION.

In addition to the ordinary requirements to vote in ordinary city election, party seeking to vote must be a "property taxpayer" in the city of Colorado, that is to say, must own property within city limits subject to taxation.

If law requires you to have paid a poll tax, you must have paid a poll tax in order to be able to vote, this being a requirement in any election. You must have resided within the State a period of 12 months and within the city limits of Colorado a period of six months in order to be able to vote. This is a requirement in any city election, but in addition thereto, you must be the owner of property, not necessarily real estate, "any property" which is subject to taxation within the city.

Where husband and wife own community property, that is to say property acquired by them during marriage, the wife as a part owner of this community property is a "property taxpayer," and is entitled to vote in this election, if she has complied with the other requirements of the election law, and is otherwise entitled to vote in city elections.

An unmarried woman who is the owner of property in her own right subject to taxation within the limits of the city and is otherwise entitled to vote in city elections, is eligible to vote in this election.

One who is now a citizen of the State, and has been for a period of 12 months, and a resident in the city for six months, but who removed from another state since the first day of January, 1920, and was therefore not subject to a poll tax for the year 1920; and who meets the other requirements of a voter, and is a "property taxpayer" is eligible to vote in this election.

FRIGHTENED TEAM RUNS AWAY WITH ICE WAGON.

A team of horses driven to one of the O. Lambeth ice wagons frightened and ran away Saturday afternoon, overturning the wagon and demolishing one of the rear wheels.

The team, which was in charge of Chas. Shannon, an employee of Mr. Lambeth, ran from the ice storage vault to the brick gin and stopped immediately overturning the wagon.

RURAL SCHOOL TRUSTEES TO MEET HERE SATURDAY.

Rural school trustees of Mitchell County will be convened in annual convention at Colorado Saturday morning at 9 o'clock by Judge J. C. Hall, ex-officio superintendent of public instruction. The meeting will be held in the district court room.

This meeting will be convened for the purpose of discussing rural school conditions of the county and to adopt cooperative plans for the purpose of bettering these schools.

SCHOOL BOARD TO ACCEPT UNDERS

E. Frank King, superintendent of schools, authorized the statement on Tuesday that the school board would accept the enrollment of a limited number of children under age for the next session, which is to open Monday, September 5th. This action upon the part of the Board, Mr. King stated, was in compliance with the wishes of a number of patrons of the schools, who desired to enter children under the scholastic age.

Application blanks for these entries are to be had at the office of the president of the school board, H. L. Hutchinson. The Board will file all these applications in the order received, giving to each a number, following a policy of first to come, first to be enrolled. It could not be determined now, King stated, just how many of these enrollments the board would be able to accept.

The statement of Mr. King, as given to The Record Tuesday morning, follows:

"The School Board has employed two primary teachers for the coming year, and it is thought at this time that the school will be able to take a limited number of unders. However, only a limited number can be admitted. In order to show no preference as to whose child is admitted, the number that is taken will be admitted by written application. These applications will be numbered consecutively from one to whatever number the school can take. Those who have a child under school age that they wish to enter will find these application blanks at present at the H. L. Hutchinson store. Go there and fill out a blank and it will be numbered and the child admitted if his number comes within the limit.

"Quite a number of people have asked permission to enter unders, and for that reason if you wish to get within the limit, it will be necessary to act at once.

"School will open on September fifth, first Monday. It is hoped that all patrons will make an effort to start children on first day. It disorganizes the school and handicaps the children to start them several days or weeks after the school opens.

"Owing to lack of room, two grades will come to school at eight and remain until twelve, and then two other teachers and two other grades will come to these same rooms at one and remain until five. Since we did not get a new building, this is the best we can do. We hope all patrons affected by this change will fall into line in a cooperative spirit even if it does to some extent throw things somewhat out of joint. Remember it is the best we can do at present. Possibly we may have a new building next year."

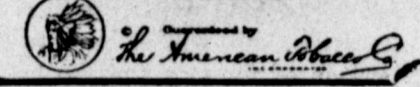

\$10,392.54 MORE TO BE IN TEXAS FOR EXTENSION WORK

According to the last census the rural population of Texas has outgrown that of the state of Pennsylvania, which held first place among the states according to the 1910 census, and Texas will receive \$10,392.54 more from the Federal government under the Smith-Lever law to be expended through the A. & M. College of Texas the next biennium beginning September 1st for home and farm demonstration work, according to information received by President W. B. Bizzell from Washington last week.

During the past decade Pennsylvania ranked first and received a slightly larger proportion of the Smith-Lever fund than Texas received. But as a result of the 1920 census Texas will receive \$4,858.85 more for 1921-22 and \$5,533.69 more for the years of 1922-23, or a total of \$10,392.54 more

WHAT IS COLORADO DOING TO ENFORCE THIS LAW?

"Owing to the vast number of complaints filed in person by citizens of Aransas Paass, protesting against the practice and use of open cut-outs, within the city limits, we the Mayor and City Commissioners of Aransas Paass, Texas, will on and after August 1st enforce Section 12, Revised Laws, relating to the use of the public highways of Texas. Auto drivers will therefore govern themselves accordingly.

C. E. HENRY, Mayor, and City Commissioners, Aransas Paass, Texas."

The above is an extract from an Aransas Paass paper.

We have heretofore in these columns referred to the existence of this law which has been on the statute books several years, but so far as Colorado and Mitchell county is concerned has been virtually a dead letter. Now, we do not undertake to say who is responsible for this law's non-enforcement. We are not a lawyer or the son of a lawyer. It ought not to be a difficult matter however to decide among themselves, of the city and county officers, as to whose business it is to see that this law is enforced. Is it violated in Colorado? "Why, Hell and Maria!" —to quote from General Dawes—it is brutally violated here; it is more than violated—it is outraged—on every corner of the city and every minute of the day. We at one time thought that the screechings of that T. They do not add one whit to the power of the car. The only conceivable purpose that we know of, is to advise our neighbors in the next county that we are coming and are now on our way.

You don't have much difficulty in enforcing the law against crap shooting. You don't stop and pass the buck there, and say it is the business of some other officer, and not your business. Have a little conference over the table and decide among yourselves whose business it is to enforce this law and then get busy, after giving appropriate warning that it will be impartially enforced.

ACTION OF CHICAGO POST CAUSES CRITICISM HERE.

Action of the Sol-sai-Mar Post, of the American Legion, Chicago, in entertaining Jack Johnson in a most elaborate manner, pledging to the negro pugilist the loyal support of the post membership in arranging a prize fight, caused the Oran C. Hooker Post at Colorado to pass resolutions severely criticizing the Chicago post and to call upon National headquarters for a recall of their charter.

The resolution, which was made public Monday by Joe Y. Fraser, post commander, follows:

"By instruction of the Executive Committee I am directed to draw the following resolution:

"WHEREAS, It has appeared in the daily papers that Sol-sai-Mar post of the American Legion at Chicago, Ill., did wine and dine with Jack Johnson, and did pledge him their support in an engagement with Jack Dempsey, it behooves us who believe in law and order for which the Legion stands to repudiate the repulsive conduct of an individual post in socially fondling and officially sponsoring a negro who has just finished a federal sentence for white slavery.

"Now, therefore be it resolved, that Oran C. Hooker Post No. 127 condemns the action of this post and calls upon National Headquarters to revoke this charter forever. If the members of Sol-sai-Mar Post feel that they can do honor to this dusky pugilist who has boasted of his crime against civilization, we have a right to demand that they do it as individuals and not defile the name of the American Legion.

"We do not make this objection on account of racial feeling, but base our objection entirely on the fact that Jack Johnson is a convicted felon and unworthy to bear the title of an American citizen, and has been guilty of the vilest crime known to humanity. Reference of the Sol-sai-Mar post to the war record of this negro is itself repulsive and a veritable insult to every American soldier.

"Such reports as this illustrate how the evil mistakes of an isolated post are widely circulated, while the splendid activities of the Legion are comparatively unnoticed," Mr. Fraser stated.

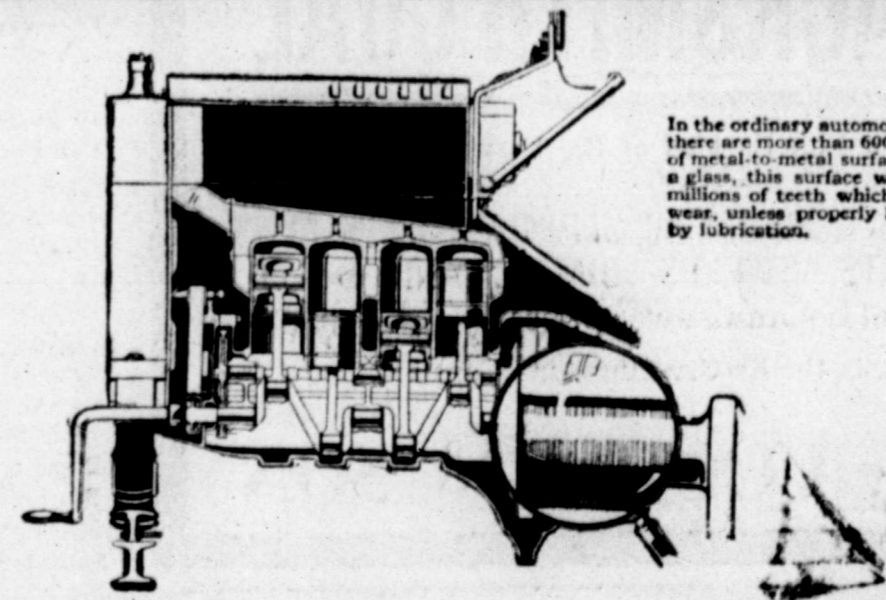

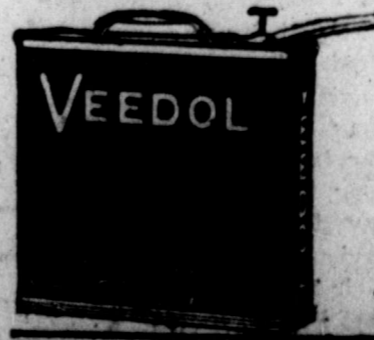

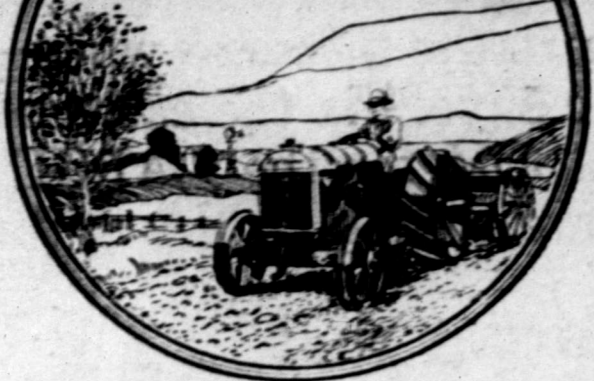

LETTER FROM COMMANDER TEXAS RANGERS ASSOCIATION

On the 10th day of August, 1920, in the district court room in Weatherford, Texas, the ex-Rangers of this state, including men who saw service on the frontier of Texas prior to the 31st day of December, 1880, met and organized the Ex-Texas Rangers' Association, and will hold their next meeting at Weatherford, Texas, August 11th and 12th, 1921.

We earnestly request all men that served on the Texas frontier during those days to join our organization whether they can attend any of our meetings or not. It might be very necessary to locate them some day to make proof for the widow of some former comrade that she might secure the pension that she so justly deserves. Now that the wives and widows of the old ex-Rangers have not up to this time been permitted to join the organization. The question of lady membership having not been mentioned at our first meeting last August. But we think it reasonable sure that they will be requested to join our organization when we meet next month. The objects of our organization are to do all we can to secure pensions for worthy claimants and to secure if possible the enactment of laws making it easier for the old heroes of the 50's and 60's to secure the pension they so justly deserve. In many instances the records do not show that these old heroes belong to the service when in fact their work is the very foundation of affairs in West Texas today.

Again, let me request all men who saw service on the frontier of Texas prior to December 31, 1880, to join us. Come to the Weatherford meeting if you can. Due notice of the meeting will be given over Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma. I am handing you the names of a few that were present at the Weatherford meeting last August.

ELECTION NOTICE.

Whereas, the City Council of the City of Colorado deems it advisable to issue bonds of the said city for the purposes hereinafter mentioned.

Therefore, it is hereby ordered by the city council of said city that an election be held on the 2nd day of August, 1921, at which election the following propositions shall be submitted:

1. "Shall the City Council of the City of Colorado, Texas, be authorized to issue bonds of said city in the sum of Eighty-five Thousand Dollars, (\$85,000.00) payable in Forty (40) years after date, with option of redeeming same at any time after ten years from date, bearing interest at the rate of six per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem them at maturity, for the purpose of constructing a reservoir and extension of the waterworks of said city, as authorized by Chapter 1, Title 18, R. S. 1911, and Chapter 9, Acts of the 37th Legislature, Regular Session, 1921, Arts. 769 and 770, R. S. 1911, and the constitution and laws of the State of Texas."

2. "Shall the City Council of the City of Colorado, Texas, be authorized to issue bonds of said city in the sum of Thirty-five Thousand Dollars, (\$35,000.00) payable in Forty (40) years after date, with option of redeeming same at any time after ten years from date, bearing interest at the rate of 6 per cent per annum payable semi-annually and to levy a tax sufficient to redeem them at maturity for the purpose of constructing sewers within the limits of said city, as authorized by Chapter 1, Title 18, R. S. 1911, and Chapter 9, Acts of the 37th Legislature, Regular Session, 1921, and the constitution and laws of the State of Texas."

The said election shall be held at the City hall in the City of Colorado, Texas, and the following named persons are hereby appointed managers of said election, to-wit:

F. A. Winn, Presiding Judge,
A. A. Dorn, Assistant Judge,
E. M. Baldwin, Clerk,
Oscar B. Price, Clerk.

Said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 1, Title 18, R. S. 1911, and Chapter 9, Acts of the 37th Legislature, Regular Session, 1921, and the constitution and laws of the State of Texas, and only qualified voters, who are property taxpayers of said city shall be allowed to vote.

All voters who favor either proposition to issue the bonds, shall have written or printed upon their ballots, for each proposition, the words: "FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS"

And those opposed shall have written or printed upon their ballots for each proposition, the words: "AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS."

The manner of holding said elec-

tion shall be governed by the laws of the State regulating general elections.

A copy of this order, signed by the Mayor of Colorado, Texas, attested by the City Secretary shall serve as a proper notice of said election.

The Mayor is authorized and directed to cause said notice of said election to be posted up at the city hall and at the place designated for holding said election, at least thirty days prior to the date of said elec-

tion. The Mayor is further authorized and directed to have said notice of election published in some newspaper of general circulation published in said city, and which notice shall be published once each week for not less than thirty days prior to the date of said election.

RULING OF INTEREST TO MEMBERS WEST TEXAS C of C

Ed P. Byars of Fort Worth, traffic manager of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, has reported to the Colorado Chamber of Commerce the ruling of Interstate Commerce Commission relative to the transmission of messages, which will be of interest to the twenty-two members of the organization at Colorado.

The report follows:
"On the blanks now furnished by the telegraph companies there are provisions limiting the companies' liability for mistakes or delays in the transmission or delivery, or non-delivery, of interstate messages as follows:

- (a) For UNREPEATED messages to the amount received for sending the same;
- (b) For REPEATED messages to fifty times the sum received for sending same;
- (c) For a VALUED message the amount agreed upon as its value, provided an additional charge for the transmission be paid.

"The courts have held that the above provisions are the full extent of the telegraph companies' liability and so long as such rules remained in force there was no adequate remedy given the sender of a message for damage suffered because of companies' negligence.

"After an investigation, the Interstate Commerce Commission, which has the control over interstate telegraph lines just as over interstate railroads had issued its decision finding the present rules, described as above, unreasonable. The Commission has prescribed reasonable rules for the future and has ordered the companies to comply with the new rules on or before July 13, 1921. Under the new rules the liability of the companies will be increased in case of negligent non-delivery or erroneous transmission of interstate messages as follows:

- (a) For an un-repeated message the maximum liability will be \$500 instead of the cost of the message.
 - (b) For a repeated message, the maximum liability will be \$5,000, instead of fifty times the sum received for transmitting same.
 - (c) For a valued message, the liability is to remain the same as previously though the charges vary slightly.
- "After July 13, 1921, any member suffering loss or damage because of the negligent non-delivery or erroneous transmission of interstate messages will have a good cause of action against the telegraph company, and may recover the actual damage proved, up to \$500 on an un-repeated, or up to \$5,000 on a repeated message, or the value agreed upon on a valued message."
