

In writing to is paper he says: "Many who visit California in automobiles become convinced that the good roads of that state are the most practical thing for people of Texas and the one thing that we may have to put us in the class with the people out here. While there is no doubt about the desirability of good roads, we maintain that irrigation is the one thing that West Texas must have before it can develop as it should. Paved roads would be a mighty factor in development, but irrigation would put West Texas on a permanent financial basis that would take care of good roads and other things

necessary for real prosperity. Enough water goes to waste every twelve months in West Texas to produce big. crops? The only problem is to find a way to keep it in this country and to make it possible to get it on some of our rich land. Twenty acres under the ditch is worth more than five hundred acres under present methods. A big dam on Clear Fork, another on Jim Ned and the raising of Lake Abilene to its maximum capacity would be the beginning of a new and better day in West Texas.
