## 1921 TAX REPORT IS \$125,364 LESS

Property valuations in Mitchell county for the current year are \$6,420,435 as compared with a valuation of \$6,545,799 last year, according to a report given the Record Tuesday by John Holt, tax assessor. This report shows that property renditions in the county depreciated in value \$125,364 during the year.

The only increase shown in the rolls for the year as submitted by the collector is in the number of poll tax assessments. Last year there were 1,146 of these assessments while for the present year a total of 1,899 were assessed. This increase is accounted for in the fact that a large number of women of the county are represented on the poll tax rolls.

Last year the county tax was \$45,820.84, as against \$44,943.06 for the present year. State taxes assessed in the county last year totaled \$40,580.27, while this year the figures are \$39,806.50. Both the State and County rate remains the same as one year ago.

A total of \$9,634.24 out of the county taxes for this year is credited to the road and bridge fund.

School taxes assessed for the present year aggregate \$39,410.42. Of this amount \$19,414.87 is credited to the rural districts of the county, \$14,805.72 to the Colorado Independent district and \$5,189.83 to the Loraine Independent district.

The rolls show that the total tax assessed against Mitchell county property for the year 1921, State County and School are \$133,794.12.

The tax rolls were completed Tuesday morning and were made up by L. B. Elliott and Mr. Holt.

She has returned to the parental roof, while he is meditating in the Taylor county jail at Abilene.

Chesney went to San Saba Wednesday for his man, but the fellow received a tip and left there about the time the officer arrived. The chase went from there to Brownwood, where Chesney arrived at a rooming house in that city from which the couple had left. Leaving Brownwood they went to Bangs, Coleman and then to Abilene, where the arrest was made.

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## MITCHELL COUNTY EXHIBIT AT ABILENE ABANDONED.

Plans for taking an exhibit from Mitchell county to the West Texas Fair at Abilene next week have been abandoned it was learned Tuesday afternoon. The Chamber of Commerce had planned to finance such an exhibit, provided W. A. Dulin, county farm agent, could collect the specimens and go to Abilene with them.

Mr. Dulin is very busy this week assisting the cotton farmers of the Colorado territory securing cotton pickers and since there are a large number of farmers who have not yet obtained this labor, the Chamber of Commerce decided it would be impracticable to request him to spend next week in Abilene with an exhibit, when his services were needed by the farmers.

"Mr. Dulin's services to the county in obtaining help to gather the present cotton crop would be worth much more to the county than it would be in superintending exhibit at the fair," a representative of the Chamber stated, although we realize the benefit that would result to Mitchell county, especially in publicity, through an exhibit at Abilene."

Dulin stated Tuesday that Mitchell county could send an ideal exhibit of the various staple sorghums, and also some registered hogs that could compete with the product of any section of the state. "There is one hog in this county, weighing 900 pounds that I believe cannot be excelled in this country," he stated.

## NO ARRESTS MADE FRIDAY CONNECTION BIT THEFT

It was learned Friday that no arrests had been made in connection with the theft of a rotary bit from the Smith well, six miles west of Colorado, which occurred two weeks ago. Only a part of the bit was stolen from the location.

The complete bit is valued at from \$1200 to \$1400. It is said that the thieves carried the tool away in an automobile.

## Oil—Gas—Potash

One or all three may be discovered in the same well, Mitchell county Texas, is in the Permian red bed formation similar to that of Electra and Burkburnett with their long lived wells. The first three wells drilled in Mitchell county hit the oil. Two of these wells are seven miles apart. Mitchell county has thick beds of salt. The great potash beds near Strassfurt, Germany, were discovered in a salt mine The United States imports 80 per cent of its potash fertilizer United States Geological Bulletin, issued June 7th, says: "Two oil companies boring 80 miles apart in Western Texas report salt strata of nearly same geological age and general characteristics as potash bearing beds of Western Europe of at least the richness of potash deposits of Alsace and Germany. Thickness unknown however. Even if deposits in these two wells are not commercially valuable, richer deposits may be found elsewhere. The potash area, at any rate, is large.

## CONAWAY NO. 1 IN OIL SAND

The Conway No. 1 which struck the oil sand at 2929 continues to look good. The drillers are proceeding with great caution. This will be the fourth well in the west part of Mitchell county to find oil. Smith No. 1. has been spudded in and by the time this issue appears should be drilling in earnest.

Two trucks loaded with tools for drilling, have arrived at Iatan from Ranger and when another load enroute arrives Foster No. 2 will be spudded in.

It is understood drilling will be resumed on Coleman No. 1 very soon. This well shut down for drilling water at about 720 feet.

The Underwriters Oil and Refining Company will drill its No. 1 deeper as soon as a new wire line arrives. Contractor Thompson will do the work. Sloan, Poncia and associates expect to start drilling on the Wulfjen lease within sixty days. The derrick is up. The Reno-Tex people expect to drill an offset well to the Conway on the Little.

**CAPT. D. H. SNYDER, NOTED PIONEER STOCKMAN PASSES**

Last week the Sun made pleasant mention of the 88th birthday of Capt. D. H. Snyder. This week it must chronicle the sad news of his death, which occurred Monday night, Sept. 12th.

Following a short religious service in the home the remains were conveyed to the First Methodist church where Dr. C. M. Bishop, president of the Southwestern University, assisted by the pastor, Rev. A. Wade Hall, conducted the funeral service. The age-old songs, selected from those

the deceased loved so well; the earnest fervent prayer of the pastor and the impressive, spiritual interpretation of the life that was spent spoken by the officiating minister, combined to hallow the otherwise sad occasion as one more of triumph than of sorrow. Following this touchingly beautiful service the Masonic fraternity took charge of the body and laid it to rest in the Old Fellows cemetery rendering impressively the burial service of that ancient Order.

Capt. Dudley H. Snyder was born in Mississippi, Sept. 5, 1833. The death of his father in 1845, followed a year later by reverses which swept

away the competency left the family, laid upon his young shoulders the responsibilities of caring for his widowed mother and younger brothers. In 1854 Capt. Snyder left his native state and after short stops in Ozark, Ark. and Mansfield, La., he made his way to Round Rock where his grand father, Dr. Hale had settled some years before. Here he began his life work in earnest and after farming one year Capt. Snyder became in a humble way a freighter and trader which operation led him even in those pioneer days as far north as Missouri. He soon became a stockman, dealing first in Spanish ponies and Missouri

draft horses. When the Civil war came on he became sub-contractor for the Confederacy and successfully delivered thousands of beef cattle from Texas to points beyond the Mississippi.

When the war was over Captain Snyder began that remarkable career as stockman, which in company with his brother, John W. Snyder, now of Clayton, N. M. made his name and that of Snyder Bros., known and respected from the Gulf of Mexico, throughout that vast territory now embracing the states of Oklahoma, New Mexico, Colorado, Wyoming and on to the Pacific. By the force of his genius and capacity for conceiving and successfully carrying out great enterprises he and his associates not only amassed great wealth but blazed the way for and contributed in a large measure to, the establishment of the stock industry in the great west and northwest which was the forerunner of the splendid civilization that vast territory now enjoys. He was truly a pioneer of an empire. Reverses came in 1873, but they served rather to restrict his operations more within his adopted state and West Texas and the Southern Plains acknowledged for many years the influence of his constructive genius and the urge of his indomitable will.

But Capt. Snyder contributed to other enterprises. He was one of the pioneer promoters of the Southwestern University and gave liberally of his time and money for its establishment and maintenance. He was for many years an invaluable member of its board of trustees and so endeared himself to the cause of Methodism in Texas and its great pioneer educational institution that when, because of advancing age, he could no longer serve actively in their councils he was invited by the University governing board to sit with it in its annual sessions.

In February 1864 Capt. Snyder was married to Miss Barry Oatts of Round Rock, who with nine children, three sons and six daughters survive him. The children are Mrs. Ollie Jones, Georgetown; Mrs. C. C. Kirkpatrick, San Angelo; Mrs. Warren W. Moore, Austin; Mrs. W. H. Atwell and Mrs. Ed J. Olive, Dallas; D. H. Jr., and Marcus Snyder, Colorado; Fred Snyder, Lubbock; Mrs. C. M. Armstrong, Seminole, Texas, all of whom were here for the funeral. There were also four grandchildren here—Tom Jones and Lajean and Cherry Armstrong of Seminole. He is also survived by his brother Captain John W. Snyder of Austin and Thomas Snyder of Clayton, N. M., one half brother, Durham Wulfjen of Colorado and one half sister Mrs. Mamie McDonald of Dallas. Another brother Charlie Wulfjen died recently in Wyoming.

Captain Snyder was a man of action—a pioneer spirit who dared dangers as inconsequential incidents in human affairs. In his active days he moved at ease in realms of finance or stupendous business and though reverses came at different periods of his life he was resourceful and always equal to the emergencies which confronted him until failing sight retired him from business. For nearly eighteen years he lay within that shadow but that shadow was only physical; his heart remained singularly young, his spirit calm and tranquil, and even as a shut-in he enjoyed life and found pure joy in the companionship of family and friends.

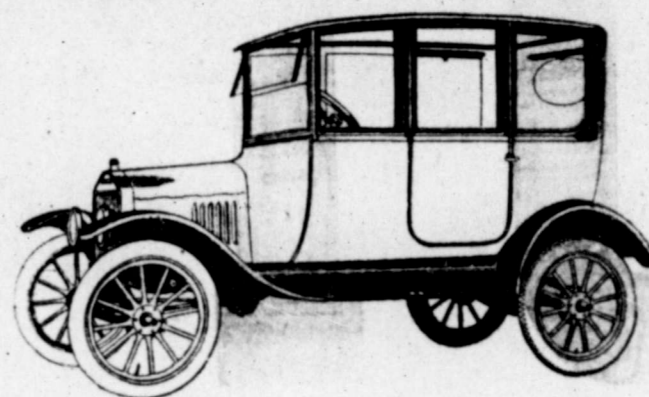

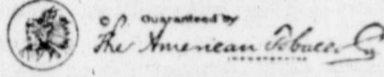

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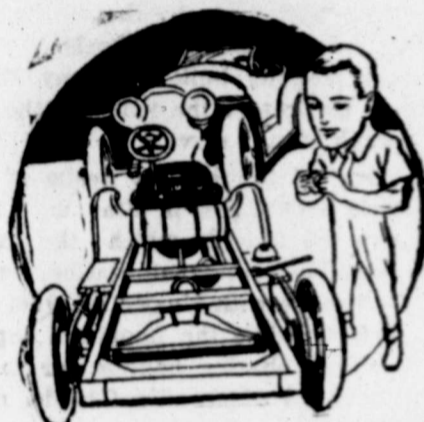

IN DAVIS MOUNTAINS WHERE PLAYGROUND IS PLANNED

In the Western part of this huge state the Davis Mountains lift their peaks.

Strange and weird is their topography for the winds and the rains of countless years have chiseled in them fantastic shapes.

It is where the Texas plains stand on end. Rough it is, to be sure, for the convulsions of time have torn great gashes in the face of nature.

Great yawning canyons they are—rich in their beauty, for the hand of man has left them unspoiled.

Champions of the proposed park are earnest in their assertions that the Davis mountains excel in beauty anything that much advertised Colorado has to offer.

The agitation of the establishment of this state park is already attracting tourists. They enter the proposed park area through Fort Davis with a hope that even the automobile roads still in the minds of the park prophets, they may be able to see some of the many canyons which will be included.

Musquiz an dLimpia canyons may be traversed by automobiles, but the big and Little Aguja, Madera and others of the deeper, narrower and wilder canyons may be approached or entered by machine, but to be seen must be negotiated, until roads are built, on foot or by means of horses.

After seeing Musquiz, Wild Rose, Frazier, Horstheif and Cottonwood canyons, the tourist may go northward in the direction of Balmorhea, taking in the Big and Little Aguja canyons on the way. To see Madera and Cherry canyons, a detour must be taken at Balmorhea, by way of the Head Springs and Phantom Lake, to the W. L. Kingston headquarters ranch at the mouth of the Madera canyon.

Because of the interest being manifest in the canyons which it is hoped will be included in the proposed park, in the Davis Mountains, attention of the road commissioners of the five counties interested—Jeff Davis, Presidio, Brewster, Reeves and Pecos—is being directed now towards making roads leading to the park area more easily negotiable by automobiles and a move is on foot to hasten the signing of the roads in order that tourists may reach the various points of interest by the shortest routes and without loss of time.

One of the wonders of Little Aguja canyon is "Monument Rock" a natural moult, seemingly insecurely based, which towers several hundred feet in the air, sole remnant of a number of needles which formed a natural barrier across the great masses of broken granite.

or horse with care unless the horse is one of the mountain bred sort, in which case it will be better for the rider to leave the choice of routes and the manner of negotiating it to the animal. He knows.

"Dead Man's Canyon" so called because the skeleton of an unknown man was found in it many years ago, when the cattlemen first began running their herds over the Davis mountain country, is a box canyon running a short distance back from the north walls of the Madera canyon. he water flowing from perennial springs, tumbles over the rocky bed of the canyon in torrential fashion, adding to the beauty of the natural picture furnished.

Frazier canyon is another of the scientifically beautiful canyons. It is one of the few gorges in the park area which can be traversed by the automobile.

"Wild Rose Pass," one of the tributaries to the famous Limpia canyon, is not scenically beautiful throughout its length but may be traveled by automobile. When the government maintained a chain of fortified posts across the state, paralleling the Rio Grande, the military road leading to historic Fort Davis passed through Wild Rose pass. Even if the trail made by the feet of the army mules and the wheels of army rock mounds built by army signalmen to protect the poles of the telegraph would serve.

One of the highest peaks of the Davis mountains is Star mountain, upon the top of which the army maintained a signal station during the trouble with Mexico in 1916, particularly while the Langhorn expedition was chasing the bandits far to the Southward of the Rio Grande, more than 100 miles away.

Good camping places are frequent in the canyons of the Davis mountains. The creeks and forests furnish water and fuel, and the elevation of from 5,000 to 9,000 feet keeps the air cool and free from troublesome insects.

Among the touches of civilization in this wild region are the homes of Beauregard McCutcheon and W. L. Kingston, and those spots where automobiles make a camp. Once the roads are built the residents of that country are certain the tide of tourists now wending their way to Colorado and other distant points will swing to the Davis mountains.—Marfa New Era.

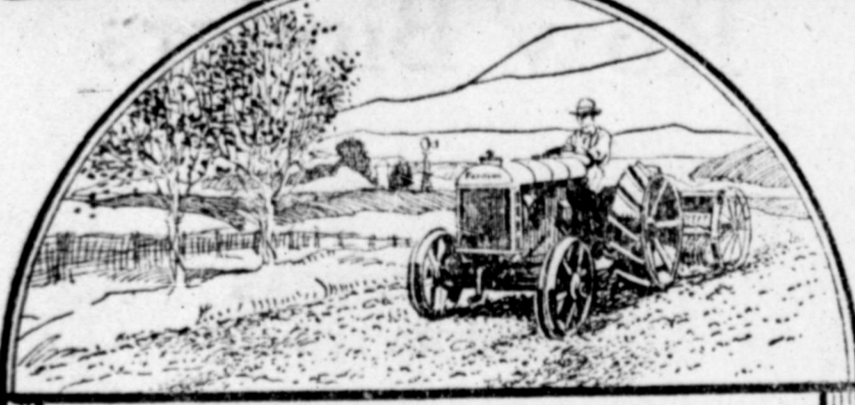

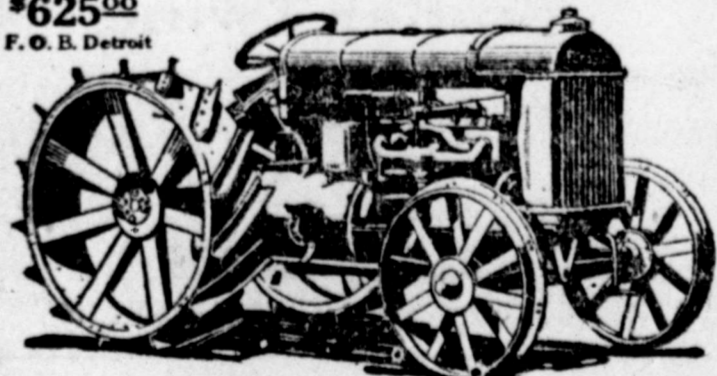

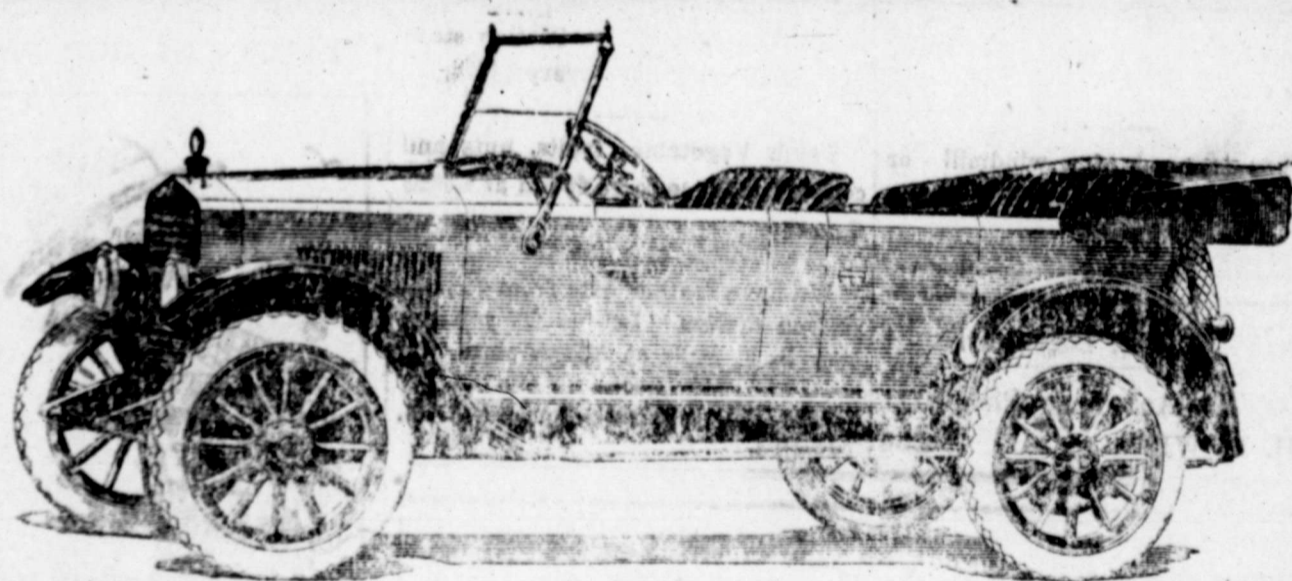

A Brass Monkey

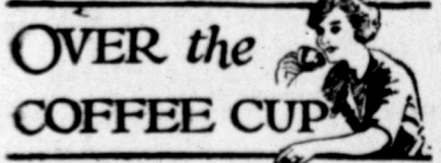
