### COTTON AND SEED MARKETS DECLINE

The threatened railroad strike has ton market this week, the same as throughout the South, when the staple showed a gradual decline in price, since Monday. The slump has proximately \$10 a bale during the past week and Wednesday cotton was selling at from sixteen cents to seventeen cents a pound.

Receipts at the gins here were not ar heavy as during the previous week. but most of the plants continue to run steadily. With the decline in cotton has also come a decline in seed and these were selling at \$26 per ton Wednesday. Prior to that date the seed had brought a price of \$28 at the gins throughout the week. Street buyers early in the week were paying \$30 a ton for this commodity, but were taking it in limited quantities.

Some farmers in Colorado this reck report that they are finishing the work of gathering their cotton and by the end of next week several are expected to bring the last bale for this season to gin. For the most part these farmers are from the country south of Colorado in the tight land



FARM BUREAU RENDERED SERVICE FOR ITS MEMBERS,

Members of the Texas Farm Bureau Cotton Association are receiving from two to three cents a pound more for their cotton than local buyers over the state are paying to farmers not in the association, according to E. M. Baldwin, secretary of the Mitchell County Farm Bureau. This means from \$10.00 to \$15.00 a bale more for cotton being markete i co-operatively.

Mr. Walter L. Troutt of Dallas, sales manager for the farmers, explains that the better prices to members is due to the fact that the association carefully grades and staples each bale and each bale is sold on its actual spinning value. Proper premiums are obtained for better grades and staples. The association has sold 12,000 bale; of cotton in the last few weeks which means that the farm members have already made between \$100,000 and \$200,000 on this small amount of cotton. Cotton camples are pouring into the sample rooms in Dallas at the rate of several thousand bales a day.

A bookkeeping system has been established which is so complete that it is impossible to lose even a pound of cotton in the accounts. item connected with each farmer's cotton is entered separately before the cotton is assembled in lots for the various pools.

Other successful marketing assoriations sponsored by the Texas Farm Bureau this year are handling hay, sweet potatoes and watermel-For example, the alfalfa growrs of El Paso county have an association which controls 75 per cent of the best alfalfa in Texas. This year they are handling about 80,000 tons and word comes from them that they have raised the price from \$9.50 to \$15,00 a ton. They have obtained satisfactory credit with El Paso fine anciers and have organized a ware. house subsidiary and are enabled to store their hay so that it can be marketed in an orderly manner.

Equally as successful as the El Paso organization is the Texas Hay Association of the South Texas Farm Bureau which has already sold 18,-000 tons of hay at a much better price than the average farmer could possibly have gotten this season selling to Harry H. Ford, manager

Some wildcatter is going to hit the pool but as to when and where time alone will

It is also the opinion of big oil men that the oil pool in West Texas is going to furnish a high grade oil, An increase in the price of oil will determine the amount of activity of the wildcatter but we all desire to see him continue his search for the big pool in West Texas.-Big Spring Herald.




