1965 ASC Program Is Underway In County

The 1965 Agricultural Conservation Program is now well under way, according to E. E. Blackwell, chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation, Eastland County Committee.

The chairman explained that the ACP for each county is formulated by local people to deal scientifically with local as well as national conservation problems. Needed conservation measures are recommended by local farm leaders and technicians of several agenciest and organizations, ost-sharing assistance under the program amount to about half the cost of the approved conservation practices.

Among 1965 ACP practices approved for application in Eastland County, Mr. Black-well listed the following: The establishment or improveent of vegetative cover, increase water penetration, lessen runoff, reduce erosion and siltation, and keep water clean.

Woodley has been providing action and thrills for avid rodeo fans for 15 years and the secret of his success is his string of stock. And he has a woefully small surplus from which to draw. But, backed by experience and real savvy, he keeps his rodeo arsenal laoded with real dynamite.

In the past twenty years ranches which raised horses in vast numbers gradually have disappeared from the scene These herds, from

car-load lots, now the stock contractor finds an individual animal. The shortage has made the search a day-to-day. overlook - nothing enterprise, fiercely competitive.

Oldtimers freely admit the present day bucking horse is ranker and harder to ride than when horses were plentiful. They have to be, for the current crop of riders have perfected the art of staying aboard.

With quality higher and quantity lower, the old rule of supply and demand has reached the rodeo arena. Value of a top bucking horse today can run into five figures, astronomical, when little over a decade ago a thousand dollars was top price for such an animal.

POTATOES FOR FREEZING Select potatoes the size of walnuts. Scrub well in cold water to remove skins, or wash and scrape. Pre-heat in boiling water 5 to 8 minutes, depending on size.

Cooling: Cool in cold running water 5 to 8 minutes. Pack: Pack dry without water.

PREPARATION OF FRENCH FRIED POTATOES FOR FREEZING

Use mature potatoes suitable for French frying. Wash, peel and cut into sticks inch square. Pre-heat sticks in boiling water for 2 minutes.

Cooling: Cool in cold running water 3 minutes.

Recreation Center Gets Tentative FHA Okay

Green light for the development of the \$112,000 Lakewood Recreation Center along Highway 36 midway between Rising Star and Cross Plains in Eastland County has been tentatively given by the Farmers Home Administration, Eastland County FHA Manager Homer Cole announced Monday.

Next step toward the real-ization of the recreation area will be the preparation of specifications for bids, Cole said, and the engineering firm of Yeates and Decker of Abilene will begin this immediately. The recreation complex will include a \$30,000 club house, a nine-hole golf course, an 18hole miniature golf course, an Olympic-regulation swimming pool, picnic and camping facilities as well as a 38acre lake with boat docks. A \$6,000 tenant home will also be built.

State and national FHA approval has been granted, Cole said, pending the availability of funds, which are to be available by the time bids are let, he said.

Cooper and Rising Star Soil Conservation Service Manager Johnny Lee was credited by Mr. Cole with having important bearing thus far on the progress of the recreation facility development.

The recreation center will be governed by a board of directors and will serve a 25mile radius of rural residents, providing recreation facilities. After the first year, the organization is expected to be self supporting. Members will pay \$60 each for the first year, to hire a manager, provide maintenance and begin payment on the 40-year FHA loan.

The organization's articles of incorporation and by-laws have been approved, Cole said,
