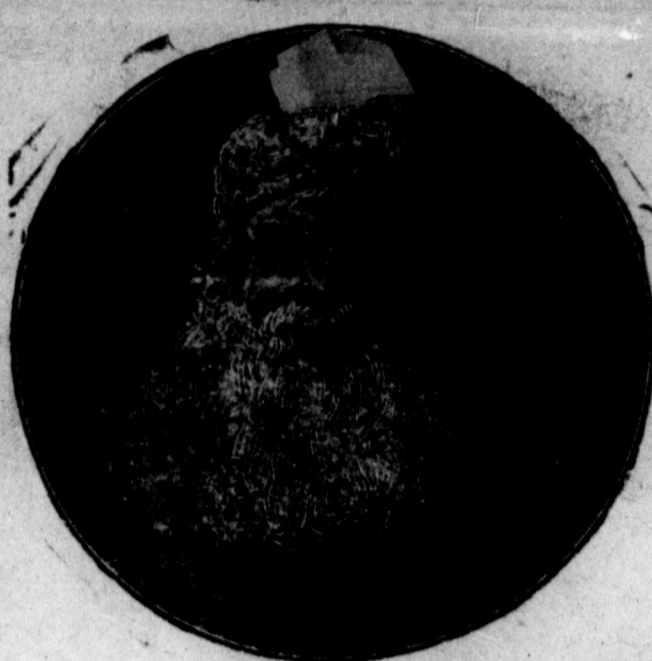

### FAITH VS. WORK.

There is an element often lacking in individual and congregational life. The lack of faith is to frequently felt by the unbelieving part of our congregations. We act and speak too many times as if we had no faith in ourselves, in our church, or in humanity. This causes the unbeliever to become suspicious of the sincerity we profess to have, he soon doubts our honesty.

If you would have others believe in you, believe in them. To feel that others need inspiration, become inspired yourself first. If you want others to get a vision of their duty, you get a vision. If you would that others were of strong faith, have faith yourself. There is no quicker

or surer way of inspiring faith than to be so full of it that it becomes contagious.

Faith is necessary to please God. Without it, it is impossible to please Him. Without faith one never accomplishes anything in the world of business, nor in the church.

Faith without works is dead. The elders obtained a good report by faith. But it was a working faith. Abel offered unto God a more excellent sacrifice than Cain. It wasn't altogether that he believed the stronger, that his offering was accepted, but there was a service rendered, a faithful service. Abraham's example is one of the most illustrious of them all. There was faith incarnated in every act of this

great man.

It is well to believe, have faith, but unless your faith is workable, it will amount to but very little. Believe in the great future of the Cumberland Presbyterian church, and work to that end, and you will be made happy to see the accomplishment of your working faith. Faith is the substance of things hope for, the evidences of things not seen. The old colored minister who was trying to quote the scriptures who said: "Blessed is the man that expecteth not, for he shall not be deceived," his philosophy was about right. If you have no faith, you can not expect to accomplish anything. Have a working faith.—Cumberland Presbyterian Review (Ft. Worth).

### LOCAL CHURCH BUDGETS.

Church finances are usually in a state of depression bordering on bankruptcy. There is need now, more than ever before, for wise planning in regard to handling the business of the church. Every congregation, not already converted to the budget system, should make its acquaintance at once.

A budget is by far the simplest arrangement for successfully caring for the expenses of a church. Let the list be complete. In making up the budget, before the first of the year, consider pastor's salary, Sunday school expenses, upkeep on church and manse, monthly bills for water, lights, gas and janitor, sinking fund for past, present or future building projects, emergency or reserve fund, all other dues, missions, the Endowment fund, and any other expenses to be incurred during the year. Divide the total by the number of members and you will be surprised that the individual assessments are so low.

There is need for caution for inaugurating the budget plan in your church. Be sure you are asking for enough to cover everything and be certain, too, that those who pledge to pay their assessments will actually do so. Some members will be unable, possibly, to pay their full quota. Others will be able to pay more and the average will be maintained. But nearly all can manage the full amount if they discharge the duty incumbent upon them as Christians of giving "as God hath prospered." This means in proportion to the income, and as the only ratio mentioned in the Bible is one to ten, it is clearly evident that Christians are financially indebted to God in the amount of one-tenth of their income. If they accept and fulfill this duty, they will seldom fail to meet the demands of a budget system: It is more likely that they will exceed their quota.

Tithing is God's plan for the individual. The budget is the safest and sanest method of conducting the business of the church. Combine the two and the finances of your church will be on a firm basis and your energy can be used in more productive ways than in worrying over the money for pastor's salary and other expenses.
