

the fluid being water. When the twenty-three foot sand was struck at 2,556 feet, six and five-eighths inch casing was set with a packer attached, shutting off the water from above. The hole was cleaned out to within eight feet of the bottom, but there was a delay in procuring a four and one-half inch sand pump to complete the job. The first flow was on December 16 after the tubing had been connected. Six days before Christmas, the flow resumed when plunger rods were inserted in the tubing and ten to twelve barrels of oil was obtained before the flow was shut off. A third flow occured the next day. "Work at the Foster No. 2 has






