#### **Bob** Ables Dies After Worth Accident Fort

Welcome

Robert Lee (Bob) Ables, 36year old resident of Cisco, lost his life in a auto-truck accident in Fort Worth at about 2 p.m. Monday. He was a native of Eastland County and had lived in Cisco for some 15 years.

Funeral services for Mr. Ables will be conducted at 2:39 p.m. Thursday at the First Baptist Church with the Rev. DeWitt Chandler of San Antonio officiating. Burial will follow in the Oakwood Cemetery with Rust Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Mr. Ables, who was employed by Don Pierson Enterprises, had recently been assigned to a post in Dallas and had planned to move his family from their home at 800 East 23rd Street in Cisco to Dallas about July 15. He was en route home from Dallas when the mishap occurred in the 6200 block of Randol Mill Road, Fort Worth.

The crash ripped the gas tank out of the Ables 1962 model Ford, spreading burning gasoline along the highway, according to a Fort Worth police report. The vehicles slammed into opposite roadside ditches. Mr. Ables

was dead on arrival at Harris Hospital in Fort Worth. The truck driver escaped injury. His load of asphalt burned, the report said.

Mr. Ables was born October 10, 1928, in Carbon where his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Verlon A. Ables, still reside. He was a graduate of Carbon High School, Cisco Junior College and Sam Houston State College. He attended Sul Ross College in Alpine briefly.

A veteran of the Korean Conflict, Mr. Ables was a member of the Carbon Methodist Church and of the Carbon Masonic Lodge.

Mr. Ables had been employed by Don Pierson, prominent Eastland business man, for a number of years. He managed the Fiesta Bowl after Pierson Enterprises built it and later handled other assignments. He spent most of last year abroad for his employer.

Mr. Ables was married Oct. 19, 1952, to the former Barbara Anderson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. F. Anderson of Cisco.

Besides his parents and his wife, Mr. Ables is survived by one son, Robert Don, 10; one brother, Virgil D. Ables of Priddy; and two sisters, Mrs. Billy Jo Barnett of Castro Valley, Calif.; and Mrs. John Phillips of San Leandro, Calif.

**Cattle Re-Test Program Due To Start In County** 

The re-testing of 20 percent of the cattle herds in Eastland County for brucellosis will begin in the next few days, according to Dr. J. B. Henderson of Coleman, area veterinarian for the Texas Animal Health Commission Buddy Henderson of Stephenville will be in charge of this work, Dr. Henderson said.

Herds that had reactor animals when the cattle herds over the entire county were tested for htis dread animal disease two years ago will be tested as well as enough other herd to equal at least 20 percent of the herds over the county.

This testing is necessary in order to comply with the regulations and to be eligible for re-certification as a clean county, according to County Agriculture Agent J. M. Coopwho plan to attend are urged to get their tickets now and avoid the last minute rush. No tickets will be sold on Saturday.



ASC PLANS TO BEGIN CROP

MEASUREMENTS WORK SOON

## COUNTY SCREW WORM

Eastland County raised its share of the voluntary phase of the screw worm eradication program with contributions in excess of askings, according to Oscar Schaefer, county chairman of the program.

A tabulation released by Glyn Gilliam, Ranger banker and secretary of the program in the county, showed total contributions of \$3,041.50. The county had been asked to contribute \$3,000.00 to keep the program under way until the governments of the United States and Mexico take over the eradication work in July.

Gorman led in contributions with \$744.70; Rising Star contributed \$701.51 and Cisco \$606.87. Ranger contributions totaled \$592.83 and Eastland \$395.65, according to the tabulation. Community totals are not significant, however, Mr. Schaefer pointed out, since some of the smaller communities had much larger cattle raising areas from which to secure contributions.

"We are very proud of the record which our county has made in supporting the screw worm eradication with cash contributions," said Mr. Schaefer. "as Secretary Orville

Freeman said in a meeting Mexican Secretary Juan Gil Preciado at the eradication center at Mission the other day, it is one of the best stments ever made in cultural research and the biggest single breakthrough in controlling pests through the peaceful use of atomic He added that the banks of

the county would continue to accept contributions.

The Mexican and American agricultural secretaries met at the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation center at Mission to initiate plans for a take-over of the eradication program jointly y their governments. Over the Southwest at lar-

ge, contributions to the final phase of the voluntary program were more than dou-ble the \$300,000 asked, Mr.

In the four years that the program for control of the screw worm has resulted in a reduction of cases of infestation from 6,308 in Texas in 1962 to 45 in the first five months of 1965, Mr. Schaefer pointed out. There have been no reports of infestation in this county this year, the nearest case being at Menard.

Measurements on peanuts, feed grain, cotton and diverted acreage will begin in the near future, according to Jesse G. Meredith, Eastland County ASCS representative. garding 1965 wheat marketing cards, Mr. Meredith said cards are not required. He remined producers who have signed to participate in the 1965 Feed Grain and Wheat Stabilization program that the area cannot be grazed from May 1 to November 1, 1965. July 1 is the last date that producers may file application for new grower wheat allotments for the 1966 crop year, he added. June 30 is the final date to sprig coastal bermuda under the 1965 ACP

program. The U. S. Department of Agriculture has announced the following 1965 price support rates for Eastland County, Mr. Meredith said:

Wheat, grade No. 1 or better, \$1.26; oats, grade No. 3 or better, \$.70; barley, grade No. 2 or better, \$.85; grain sorghum, grade No. 2 or better, \$1.70.

Application for a farm storage facility loan will be accepted from producers needing grain storage bins, the representative stated.
