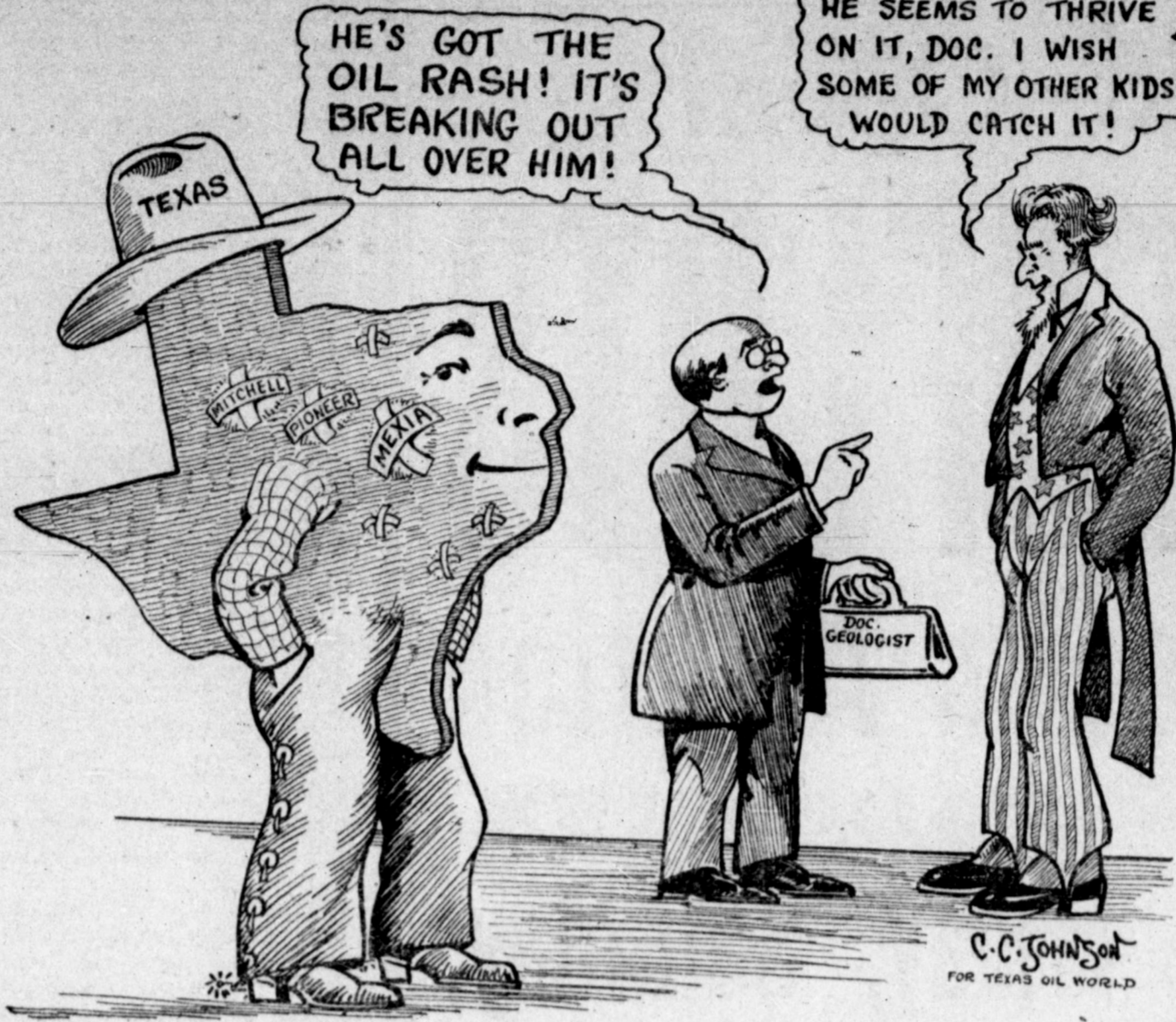
The Colorado High School has credits that are commendable and by all means should be preserved, lost unless the citizenship demand remedial measures.

ANNUAL MEETING C. OF C. IS HELD AT WESTBROOK

The annual meeting of the Westbrook Chamber of Commerce was held Tuesday night in the school auditorium. In the absence of the president, E. S. Hudson, Rev. A. D. Leach, pastor of the Westbrook Baptist church, presided.

The Colorado Chamber of Commerce was represented by Dr. P. C. Coleman, president. Dr. Coleman spoke for some time of the conditions which may be expected to come with an oil boom and urged the citizens to control any situation arising and maintain the reputation of Mitchell County citizenry for respect of law.

In speaking directly to the chairman, Rev. Mr. Leach, Dr. Coleman paid a tribute to the ministry and denounced those who would criticize ministers as political preachers when they took a stand for good government and clean morals. "I have known the people of Mitchell County for almost forty years," the speaker stated, "and they will back you ministers up in your demands for good citizenship."

The West Texas Chamber of Commerce was represented by W. S. Cooper of Colorado, member of the executive board who told of some of the benefits of the organization. He asked that Westbrook send a strong delegation to the Fourth Annual convention to be held in Plainview May 22-23.

J. M. Thomas, vice president of the Colorado National Bank, was

another speaker. He related in an interesting manner the scenes when he first visited Westbrook. At that time the entire countryside was an open range, Mr. Thomas stated, and only one store was in Westbrook. Now the surrounding country is in farms and it will only be the matter of a few years until we shall see much of the country south of the railroad in farms, he continued.

In referring to the recent discovery of oil in Mitchell County, Mr. Thomas stated that we have something other than oil in this county. In 1919 and 1920 we produced 32,000 bales of cotton and last year the crop amounted to 23,000 bales. He expressed appreciation because of the conservative policy of the people of Mitchell County is developing an oil field here, stating that in the end such a policy would be much better than to encourage a boom.

The occasion of the meeting was the election of a directorate of the Chamber of Commerce for the ensuing year. These are to meet Tuesday night for the election of officers.

The auditorium of the school building was filled with people and following the business session refreshments were served.

CONDITIONS SHOW UP WELL IN WEST AND SOUTHWEST

WASHINGTON, April 18.—Business conditions in the West and Southwest have improved 100 per cent over last fall, Eugene Meyer, Jr., managing director of the war finance corporation, declared today upon his return from a survey of twenty states west of the Mississippi made at the request of President Harding.

"Easier money in the east is bringing in money on land mortgages into the west for the first time in a long time," said Mr. Meyer. "Mines are reopening which should help conditions in Utah, Montana and Arizona.

Agriculturally the outlook for planting is a little late but this is more than compensated for by the fact of prevailing moisture. There is a feeling that agricultural prospects have never been so good in years because of the moisture and in sections where there has been a scarcity of rain for the last two years the outlook is good and farmers are much encouraged."

The larger banks throughout the east, he asserted, report conditions as much improved but the smaller banks are dependent on the outcome of the year's harvest.

Improvement in the corn belt, he said is reflected in the advertising in newspapers and farm journals.

RAILROADS WILL ALLOW HALF FARE TO C. OF C. MEET

All railroads in Texas have agreed to give a one-half rate fare for the round trip to the Fourth Annual Convention of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, which will be held at Plainview, according to a letter received recently by The Record.

The reduced rate also applies to the dependent members of the families of the delegates from all points within the State. The dates for the sale of tickets to the convention can only be from May 20 to 22 inclusive and instructions are given to ask the agent for a certificate receipt. Each ticket issue must be matched with a receipt and no ticket will be honored without such a receipt. All tickets must be bought for Plainview and the receipts must bear the same date as the ticket and carry the signature of the purchaser in ink.

It is expected that but few, if any, of the Colorado delegation to the convention will go by train to Plainview, in case the roads are in good condition. Plainview is about 8 hours drive from Colorado and the plans are to go by automobile.

Austin Erwin has his ground cleared and ready for the building of a nice residence on the west side Neal Gross, we understand, will start building soon and others are planning to build.

PRESBYTERIAN ORPHANAGE MOVED TO DALLAS

The Reynolds Presbyterian Orphanage at Albany has been moved to Dallas and R. H. McCarty in the Albany News says:

"It's In Dallas"—Yes, they put their cold blooded fingers, incased in silk velvet, and like the mother eagle they are going to stir up the old home nest, and take our little birdlings down to the big city of Dallas. Dallas said that the removal of the Reynolds Presbyterian Orphanage was void of sentiment, and all for Christ's sake, and they put their hands behind them and said, pay us twenty thousand dollars gate fee out of the Orphanage Fund at Albany for admission to the government barracks at Love Field, some seven or eight miles out of Dallas on a public highway. And the argument Dallas put forth in their contention for the Orphanage was the opportunities the city could offer to the orphans, commercially and otherwise, and that's all true.

And say, dear Dallas, there are many instances, just the other day press dispatches carried this news item: The jelly beans were parking their cars on the highways out of Dallas, and one fellow reported finding fifteen cars parked in one bunch, and he could hear the scream of

maids crying for the protection of their virtue. And the daily press said that this damnable traffic had become so prevalent on the highways in Dallas county that the city of Dallas was going to put on night patrol to protect the virtue of young maids. And say Dallas, by the eternal God, we want you to see to it that this highway down to Love Field where you are going to stow our orphans away in temporary government barracks, kinder like cattle in a stock pen, is well patrolled, and protect the virtue of our little orphan girls, and the editor of the Albany News is going to hold you responsible for the charge entrusted to your care and keeping. The Prophet Samuel of old said to Saul: What is this I hear in mine ears, bleating of the sheep, and the lowing of the cattle—Just a cold-blooded deal put over brethren, by a lot of real estate brokers who care nothing for the life of an orphan child, just like cattle and sheep—but they had real estate to sell. And there was dear old Weatherford, she too, wanted to get fingers in the Orphanage fund. Oh, yes, that doctor had a hospital to sell on the outskirts of the town, he paid eleven thousand dollars for it some five or six years ago, and through the brethren at Weatherford, he was negotiating a deal, whereby they would take

thirty-five thousand dollars out of the orphan children's fund at Albany to replenish his exchequer—the bleating of the sheep and the lowing of cattle—you fellows ought to take anti-fat for the enlargement of the heart. This is the first time in all of our life that we ever heard of an orphanage or school having to hire folks to let it come and live in their midst. Now that Love Field, government barracks, etc.—we want to discuss that location. It's some six or seven miles out of Dallas, on a highway, but not on a street car line, near a big artificial lake owned by Dallas, and a rendezvous for the flappers and joy riders at even tide, not a fit place to keep and rear orphan children. Yes, in this modern day traffic, through the genius of Henry Ford, the houses of ill repute are on rubber tires, and burning the wind on our highways. Oh, yes, down there at Love Field, our orphan children will be pigeon-holed in a hermitage, six or seven miles away from school and church, housed in a lot of shot gun war shacks, ceiled with beaver board, and rubberoid roofing. Oh yes, a nice place to corral our orphans, away from Sunday School and church, and we expect that a brace of old maids will visit it about once a month to deliver a lecture to Sister Smith, and tell her how to raise orphan children. But the brethren who were appointed to find a permanent location for the Orphanage have performed their duties, and they did it in God's name, and Dallas said for Christ's sake. Oh yes, going to stir up the home nest, the cradle of its childhood, and take it down to the big city of Dallas, where the white robed figures and the minions of the law are in travail, and where they are holding big mass meetings to stay the crime wave, and where they nab the citizens of the commonwealth on your public streets and flog them to a queen's taste—where men and women shoot each other down like dogs, and where the di-

vorce courts grind daily—and where they have to patrol the highways in Dallas county to protect the virtue of young girls. Yes, Dallas, you have many opportunities to offer the Orphans, as one of the Dallas real estate brokers said, buy cheap groceries and get a job. For instance one of our orphan girls after passing out of the home here, followed her widowed mother down to Dallas and "GOT A JOB." And just the other day she sent the orphan girls at Albany word, for God's sake to stay away from the city—oh, she says the temptation that a young girl has to fight against is just simply terrible—but she has a job and can buy cheap groceries. It's wonderful about the wisdom of men, under spiritual guidance. Out here at Albany, we have a splendid three-story brick building, a nice cottage home for the management, other temporary buildings, about fifty thousand dollars in the treasury for the construction of dormitories, about three hundred acres of land, an excellent dairy farm right close in. Church and school, so to speak, at its door, just one great big family go to Sunday school and church, and to our public school, and the little orphan children are in personal touch with all the activities of the town, but the big city of Dallas called it away from its home nest—out here in the country, where strong men and women are reared—and always, when God wants a man to preach a great sermon, write a law, man an army, rule a state, stay mob violence, build a railroad or found a government, He puts His hand down in the rural waste basket, and fishes up a jewel. Bye, bye babies, and may Dallas take good care of you in the government barracks.
