EXPERT SAYS WEST TEXAS BE BEST POULTRY SECTION

West Texas is a coming poultry section of the Southwest, it has advantages that no country has, first it is the greatest country in the world to grow feed with but little work, maize, kaffir corn and other row crops. They grow the finest

wheat in the world, the finest oats. Now think of a better advantage for a beginner starting the poultry business, nine out of ten of them fail the first year or two on account of not being able to take care of the feed bills, they will tell you there is nothing to the chicken business, it costs too much to grow them that a profit cannot be made. If I

were beginning in the poultry business over I would go out to West Texas where lands are reasonable and I would buy me some land close up to a small town on account of enough to have enough land to grow my own feed and be handy to express and postoffice. The chicken business is no good miles out in the country away from the express and postoffices. Your orders most all come by mail and delivery by mail and express. The extra cost of land close to a large city would do lots of advertising. Just a few days ago a school teacher visited me and wanted to talk poultry with me. He said: I am a chicken crank, I cannot help it, I want to get me about 200 day old chicks of White Leghorns and start me a poultry farm and supply the hotels in Dallas and Fort Worth with fresh eggs. I told him he was on the wrong road, to start a market poultry farm he should have several thousand White Leghorns. He would have to build houses that would cost him hundreds of dollars and his lands would cost him money. I advised him that I did not want to keep him out of the poultry business by this talk, but my advice would be to him to go out West and get him a school in some small town and at the edge of town buy him a few acres of land, build him some small hen houses and start a Standard Bred poultry business and grow into anything he wanted to grow into. He could keep on teaching and in the evenings and mornings take care of a nice flock of high class birds, he could run trap nests and get records on his birds, so when he did want to start an egg farm he would have the foundation layers to start and know the records of

hens to breed his egg farm birds from. He would be in a country where feed was cheap and lots of the best kinds. He could, when his business was large enough, send his eggs in to the markets from most any point for less express than it would cost him to freight his feed from the west, back to east Texas to feed his birds.

I am glad to see the West Texas Chamber of Commerce work for the poultry interest in West Texas like they are, it is a good move. They are the association that can put the industry over in a large way. I like to talk to bankers in West Texas and hear their praise of what poultry is doing for the country. Poultry is making money in West Texas for most all the farmers. It gives them them money every week in the entire year. Bankers and business men back it up, farmers are interested in poultry. If you don't believe me attend a poultry show in West Texas and see the crowds it brings to the town. I judged several shows in West Texas this year and am still judging them and not a town or show have I judged but what it is a job to get room and light to judge on account of the large crowds. The farmers like poultry and they take out and visit the shows. Just a few days ago I noticed an article from Col. R. L. Penick of Stamford. He told of what poultry was doing for West Texas. Mr. Penick is a business man that knows. He has been in business for years in West Texas and has learned that the fellow on the farm that keeps good chickens can pay his debts. Out at Plainview, Texas, take one of the best banks in the town, and there is E. J. Morehead and James Anderson both in the poultry business. They are bankers and good ones at that. They are poultry breeders and good ones at that. Take Munday, Texas. Here you will find Heald, a banker, in the poultry business. He breeds high class birds, he talks more poultry to the farmers, gets out and puts on poultry shows. Go to Wichita Falls, and there is Floyd Billingsby, a banker in the poultry business and running the poultry show. Fred Weeks, the best lawyer in Texas, at Wichita Falls, in the poultry business. I could go right on and tell you of many more but this is enough to carry my point that West Texas is a poultry country when you find men like these running and backing an industry.

Go out West, beginner, and you cotton farmer who wants to live easy the rest of your days, and start a business that will take care of you—start a poultry business. Get standard bred poultry to begin with and don't start large, but start advertising with the business and you will make money from the beginning. It is a paying business. I know for I am in it. West Texas is the place to start—feeds are cheap and lots of it of all kinds.

WEST AND SOUTHWESTERN TEXAS OFFER GREATEST OPPORTUNITIES

About one-third of the State of Texas is arid, or semi-arid, and there is a very large portion of the State that is subject to reclamation by irrigation. In many sections of the Southwestern and Western part of the State there are ideal opportunities for irrigation on both large and small scales. In the Lower Rio Grande valley alone is a project covering eight hundred thousand acres that has already received preliminary investigation by the United States Reclamation Service. A project of large magnitude is proposed in Coke county near Bronte and the U. S. Reclamation Service is and has been investigating the proposition. It is proposed to place a dam across the Colorado river there to store up the flood waters for gravity irrigation, and thousands of acres of fine land will be reclaimed and made to be worth millions of dollars if the project is put through. In many sections of West Texas irrigation on a small scale is practiced. Henry M. Half of Midland has been advocating the advantages of irrigation from water wells in Midland county and has demonstrated beyond a doubt that this would be very successful there, and the prospect is that several hundred acres in that county will be under irrigation in this way before long. Pecos, Reeves, Ward and several other counties in the Pecos River Valley district are now successfully irrigating farm lands and many acres are being put under cultivation yearly as new projects are established. One of the largest projects under the supervision of the Government is at Carlsbad, N. M., on the Pecos River. Many counties on the Plains have demonstrated the possibilities of irrigation from wells, as almost an unlimited supply of water is to be had at shallow depths in most of the Plains counties. In many sections of Mitchell county this kind of irrigation could be carried on successfully as well as irrigation from the Colorado river in some localities. While Mitchell County is in the rain belt and a complete crop failure is improbable, for the raising of truck and small fruits irrigation is very desirable.

Reclamation on a scale larger than was ever dreamed of before, will be made possible if the bill known as the Smith-McNary bill, recently reported favorably by the Senate Irrigation Committee, in Congress, becomes a law.

This bill provides for a bond issue of \$350,000,000 to provide a capital fund for the construction of great irrigation and drainage projects throughout the United States by the United States Reclamation Service. This is not, however, to be issued

all in one year, as it will take several years to build up a working organization of sufficient magnitude to handle such a tremendous undertaking.

The bond issue will be spread over a series of seven or eight years not to exceed \$50,000,000 to be issued in any one year. This is less than the price of one battleship, and yet the plan involved in this bill, it is estimated, will within the next thirty years provide for an expenditure of \$2,000,000,000 in reclaiming arid and swamp lands within the United States, without the cost of a single penny to the federal government.

This seemingly impossible feat is accomplished by what is known as a revolving fund. The bill provides that any district or political subdivision, having lands to reclaim may issue bonds to cover the estimated cost of the project. These bonds are to be placed in escrow with the federal land board, and the project constructed out of the reclamation fund which is created by the bond issue provided for by this bill. After the project is constructed and in operation, the bonds are then sold on the open market and the proceeds of the fund returned to the reclamation fund to be used over again in the construction of other projects, and at the end of 30 years the original United States bond issue is gradually retired out of the repayments made by the district.

Reclamation is thus made to ultimately finance itself, the government merely lending its credit during the construction period, and while the project is getting on its feet.

Texas would be the largest user of this service. That is, Texas has more land subject to reclamation than any other state in the Union. There are vast areas of land in Texas, particularly in the coast country that can be reclaimed by drainage, which is provided for in the Smith-McNary bill, in addition to the millions of acres of land in Western Texas that could be reclaimed by irrigation projects.

It is a well known fact that both arid and swamp lands when reclaimed, are the most valuable and highly productive lands found anywhere. Not less than one million could be added to the population of Texas by the development of some of the most accessible arid and swamp lands which will be made possible through federal assistance by this bill.

Texas already stands second in the value of farm products produced and will, within the next five years, stand at the head of the column of States of America as crop

producers. Only a few years ago Texas was almost at the bottom of the column of farm products producing states, and it is only since the great lands of West Texas have been placed under cultivation, and the enormous possibilities of agriculture in the West been discovered, that the Lone Star State has been able to lift her record as an agricultural State above that of the proud North Central States. When the full resources of the Western part of Texas are developed, no other State in the Union can even reach the hip pocket of old man Texas, and many of them now boasting their records as oil and agricultural states will be unable even to crawl about the feet of Texas. Texas is already first in the number of individual farms within its borders and is also first in the production of livestock. The value of livestock alone in Texas is almost, if not equal to the entire value of some other states. Texas also leads in the production of cotton as an individual crop. The largest hog producing county in the WORLD is in Texas and is among those of West Texas. That county is Hale, a comparatively small county in area.

Texas Leads in Oil.

In the production of oil Texas has in most recent months reached the top of the list of States, and is now the leading oil producing State in the Union, even though her vast oil and other natural resources have merely been scratched as it were, and are yet barely past the wildcat stage. However, many thousands of investors and interested parties of other States are becoming acquainted with the possibilities in Texas and are assisting the local citizens to develop and prove up this vast area of wealth producing territory. The most phenomenal growth and advancement ever recorded has been credited to the Texas oil fields, and more money is said to have made, and more millionaires created by Texas oil fields than all others in the United States combined. Even the great Wall Street of New York if detached from interests in Texas could hardly compete with the Texas oil money. There are many counties in Texas that have been made famous by the discovery of oil underneath their surface. Among these Mitchell bids fair to become one of the most famous. Oil men as well as others, predict that even the much talked of Ranger or Eastland county field will be surpassed by Mitchell when its oil resources will have been developed to its capacity. Even the great Mexia field in Texas may be forced to take second place when extensive development has been accomplished in the Mitchell county area, and even though this is not now a reality, it is at least a very probable fact, since the actions of the Morrison No. 2 well is said to have been very similar, indeed, to those of the Rogers well, the discovery well in the Mexia field. In as far as development has gone in Mitchell county as compared to development at Mexia when the discovery well was first brought in there, Mitchell county has a decided advantage in chances to outstrip all other fields in Texas in the production of oil. This is true from the fact that in other fields much more development was done before the field was proven up to the extent of the proven field here. Work in the Mitchell county field has been slow and tedious owing to the difficulties to be overcome by the companies operating here, and consequently no big rush has been started and no real rush of development in drilling new wells. For this reason the Mitchell county field has been proven up along a line of twelve miles, from Iatan to the Morrison No. 2, without attracting any big amount of attention until the Morrison blew in spraying oil over the derrick.

Mitchell county is destined to be one of the leading counties in Texas in the production of oil, according to the oil fraternity, and in this respect she will doubtless even outstrip her record among West Texas counties as an agricultural county. She is already one of the leading counties of the West in the production of farm products.

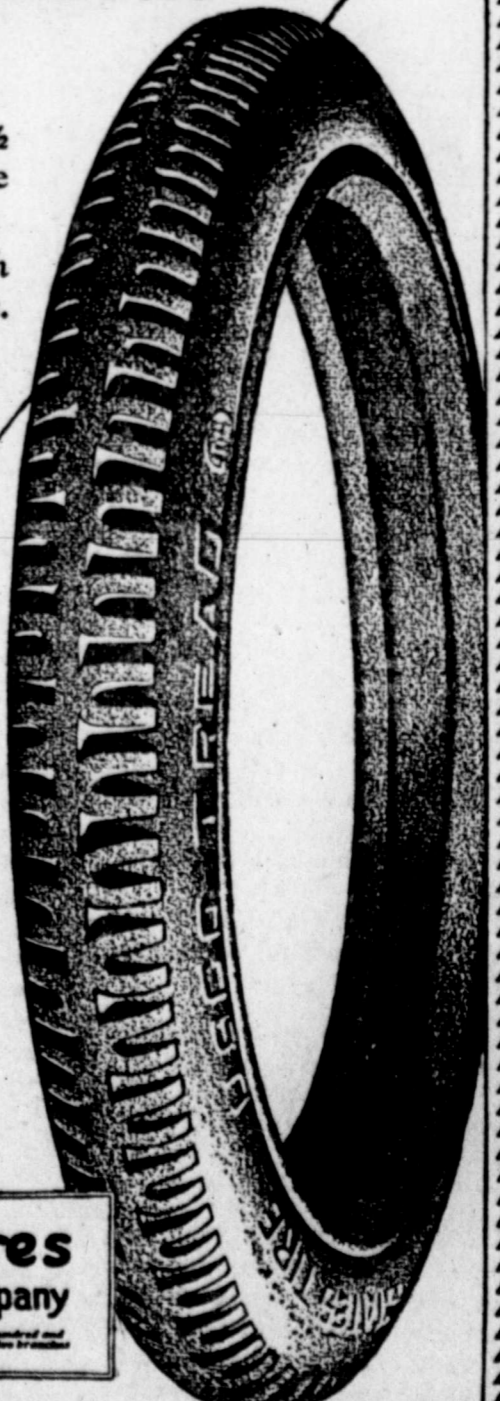
