Miss Helen Swift of College Station, district supervisor with the Extension Department, A. & M. College, was in Colorado Wednesday to meet with Commissioners' Court and ask that the county co-operate with the department in employing a home demonstrator for Mitchell County. Miss Swift came to Colorado in response to an invitation from the Civic League and the Chamber of Commerce. Mrs. A. L. Whipkey, president of the Civic League, addressed the commissioners upon the needs of the demonstrator and made a strong appeal that the demonstrator be employed, presenting the commissioners a petition endorsed by 125 women of the county.

Following the address of Mrs. Whipkey, Miss Swift spoke at length upon the duties of the demonstrator and told of what women in those counties where the demonstrators were employed were accomplishing. in the way of food production and conservation, co-operative marketing, etc.

"We are buying Maryland totomatoes and Maryland corn here every day," Miss Switf stated, when there is no need at all for doing so. The people of Mitchell County can produce the necessities of life just as easily as the people of any country. The only trouble is we are not improving the opportunities presentd.'

Miss Swift described how that the to expect. vomen working under her department assisted the women and girls of the counties employing them in making dresses, hats, etc. "In Tarrant County, 200 women, under the direction of our home demonstrator, made their own dress forms and fitted one dress each, realizing a saving to each woman of twenty dollars. That one item alone saved the women of Tarrant county 4, 000.00."





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
