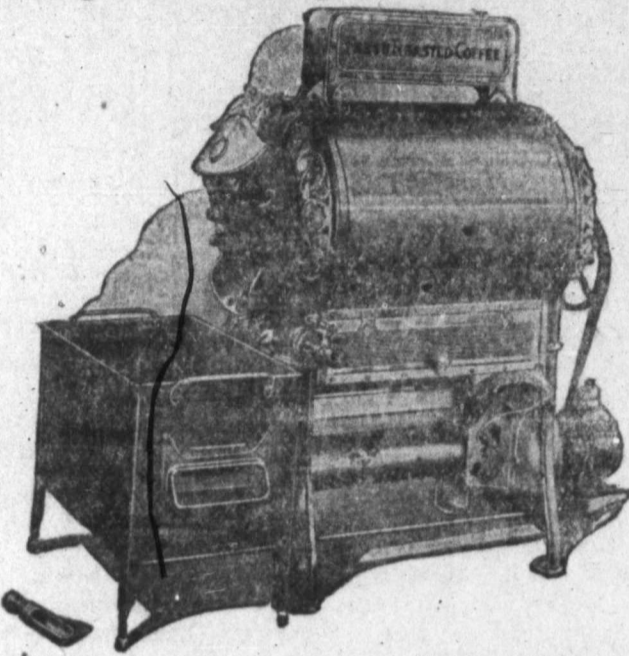

DAVIS MOUNTAINS STATE PARK IS LARGE PROJECT

The El Paso Herald never lets an opportunity pass to boost West Texas and the following editorial gives a very good idea of the way it is giving out news matter relative to the Davis Mountain Park and other development in this section of the state.

The editorial in question follows: West Texas is a young giant just beginning to call attention to itself. It invites the world to know that a large part of the southwest is embraced in West Texas. It is a vast territory, enough to make several large states. It is dotted with fast growing towns, some attaining the population and the metropolitan appearance and the volume of business of small cities.

Once West Texas was all cattle country. Its towns were cowtowns. Then farms came into being in little groups on especially favorable soil and near rivers where some irrigation was possible.

There are cattle ranches in West Texas still. Some of them are of magnificent size. But they are being reduced in number and extent every year.

Farms are taking their place all through what is known as the Plains country. It has been found profitable to farm land that a generation ago was considered unsuitable for anything but grazing land for herds and flocks.

The land is settling up. The population grows year by year. Towns and country receive more people with every twelve months.

Farms are generally well improved and well cultivated. The men engaged in cattle raising are giving increasing attention to breeding and feeding, with the result that West Texas cattle are selling at the top of the market.

Small cities like Amarillo, Dalhart, Lubbock, Plainview, Colorado, Midland and Pecos are continually making public improvements as they grow and private enterprise is keeping pace with new buildings and new residences.

With federal aid, highways up to the best standard for motor travel, are built in many counties. To supplement the existing rail transportation, a new rail line through West Texas is being projected to tap productive territory not now served.

This is the season of the grain harvest, when \$35,000,000 worth of wheat alone is being threshed in West Texas. The crop runs into hundreds of carloads. To gather and thresh it called for more than 25,000 men.

Yet many farm communities are so far from shipping points that hauling grain to the nearest railroad town involves an extravagant outlay of money, time and labor.

And right on the heels of the wheat crop comes the oats crop estimated at 15,000,000 bushels valued at \$18,000,000 some of which also must be hauled over the road a long distance to a shipping point.

The need of a railroad is apparent. Each section of West Texas vast domain has its own special big project to work out. But there are some that affect the whole of West Texas.

HIS POULTRY YARD BIG ASSET IN FARM BUSINESS

G. N. 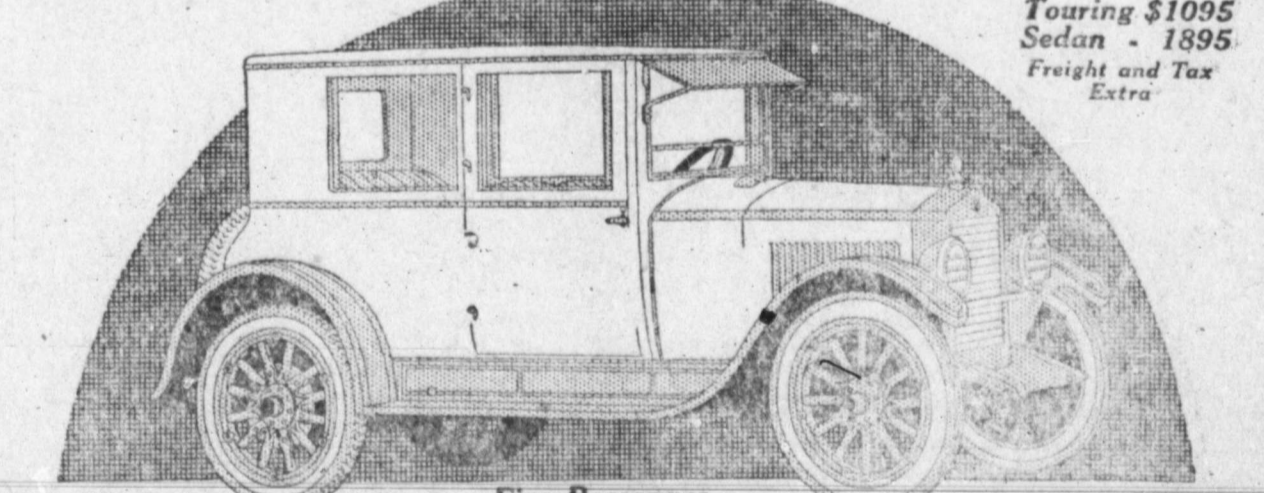

#### HOME DEMONSTRATOR.

At the regular term of Commissioners' Court Monday a group of women appeared before that honorable body to speak in behalf of the petition which had been presented to the body at a called session in June, asking for a county home demonstrator. The only objection any of the members had against granting the petition was the lack of funds in the county treasury, but after hearing the urgent need of one from the women on the farms who spent the entire day in town that they might present their claims, the commissioners were of the opinion that the help to the homes that would come from such reliable source would more than pay the expenses of one in dollars and cents to say nothing of the good that could come from it that has no monetary value. After deliberate discussion the body unanimously agreed to appropriate one thousand dollars annually for this work.

As was stated in the petition this is to be supplemented with the same amount from the extension Department of A. & M. College. This is another progressive move that has been made for the county. The Civic League working with the Chamber of Commerce greatly assisted the women of the County in securing this. Mrs. A. L. Whipkey, president of the Civic League, wired Miss Helen Swift, district manager of the results of the meeting and she wired her acceptance of the proposition, stating that a Demonstrator would be sent August 1st. Now that the Commissioners have nobly done their part the women of the county should co-operate in this splendid work that it will be easy for it to be the success it deserves to be.

All communities are requested to be ready to assist in carrying on the work when Miss Swift sends in full instructions.

### WITH THE CHURCHES

#### SUCCESS OF THE CHURCH DEPENDS UPON LAYMEN

In a special sermon to men delivered at Union Tabernacle Friday morning, Rev. M. C. Bishop placed emphasis upon the importance of the laymen taking the initiative in religious affairs, if the church is to be expected to accomplish very much.

"Ninety-five per cent of those men who control big business and who are millionaires or multi-millionaires are men who have adopted the principles of Jesus Christ," he stated. He referred to the lives of great statesmen of America and Europe as having been consistent Christians. "If such men as these found the principles of Christ worth while, why should not we of Colorado adopt them also?" the pastor asked.

In referring to Charles E. Hughes secretary of State and who for many years has been an outstanding figure in affairs of state, Rev. Mr. Bishop stated: "For a period of fifteen years, Hughes never failed to miss a service at his church. One day, however, he was called away on urgent business and seeing that it would be impossible to be in his accustomed place Sunday, addressed his pastor a note, explaining his absence."

"When you men just have to go fishing on Sunday, have the manhood to telephone your pastor, telling him that you do not have much religion and that you prefer to spend the Sabbath fishing than for the glory of God; that you think more of fishing than of your church and the leadership of the pastor. If a church and a pastor are worth anything, then give them some consideration."

In summing up the duties of a laymen to his church, Rev. Bishop stated that the financial obligation was an important one, but not the most essential. "Of course if all you laymen would pay your money into the church treasury (as the Bible teaches you to do, our financial troubles would all be solved, but if you supported the church only by your money and nothing else, we would never get anywhere. The church having plenty of money and no spiritually is one of the dearest organizations I have any knowledge of."

The speaker praised the work of the women in the church but expressed his regrets that the men were leaving so much of the initiative to the women. "The man should be at the head of every business and religious undertaking," he said, "and when that day arrives the day when the men of our churches shall be at his post and anxious to work—we are going to make new history in the spiritual progress of the community."

He pled for the laymen to stand by the Bible and the church to which he belongs. "I don't care whether you are a Methodist, Presbyterian, Christian, Baptist, or what not," he stated, "stand out flat footed for what you are and let the world know clearly your belief. The man who is wish-washy and does not care so much about this church or that one, will never accomplish very much."

Thursday morning the pastor delivered a special address to women. At the Friday morning services, Marion Elliott sang a solo, "The Old Rugged Cross."

area to show a field big in the extent of its prospective producing acreage, with the possibility, that any of the wells now drilling may break into bigger production than that shown by the completions to date. The major producing agencies of Texas are now well entrenched with acreage throughout this new field and have not confined their leasing operations to Mitchell County, as a number of them have already taken huge tracts in Crockett, Sterling, Goke and other counties of the same general region. It is interesting to note that a number of companies subsidiary to Standard Oil are showing the greatest activity in this leasing campaign, while many of the strongest of the independents are making preparations for drilling their own large blocks of leases. At this time it looks as if production would spread to the counties south and northeast of Mitchell, as scores of minor structures, as yet untouched by the drill, have been identified by the numerous geological parties which have recently been busy in the area. Colorado is returning to the business glory of its former days and is now making ready to become the capital of the new oil empire of West Texas which will eventually reach from the banks of the Pecos far to the northeast toward Electra and Burkburnett.—Texas Oil World.

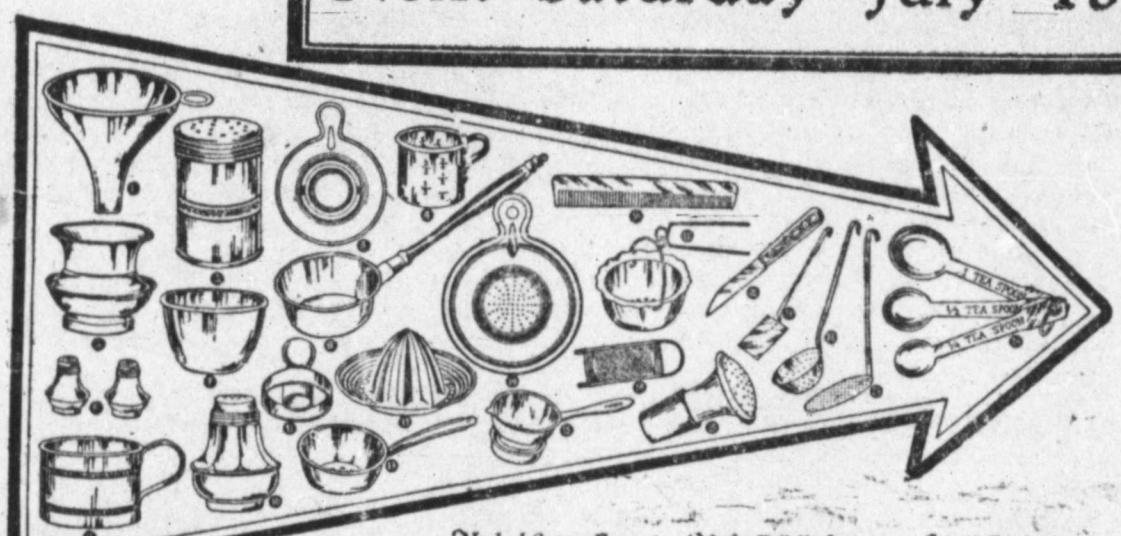

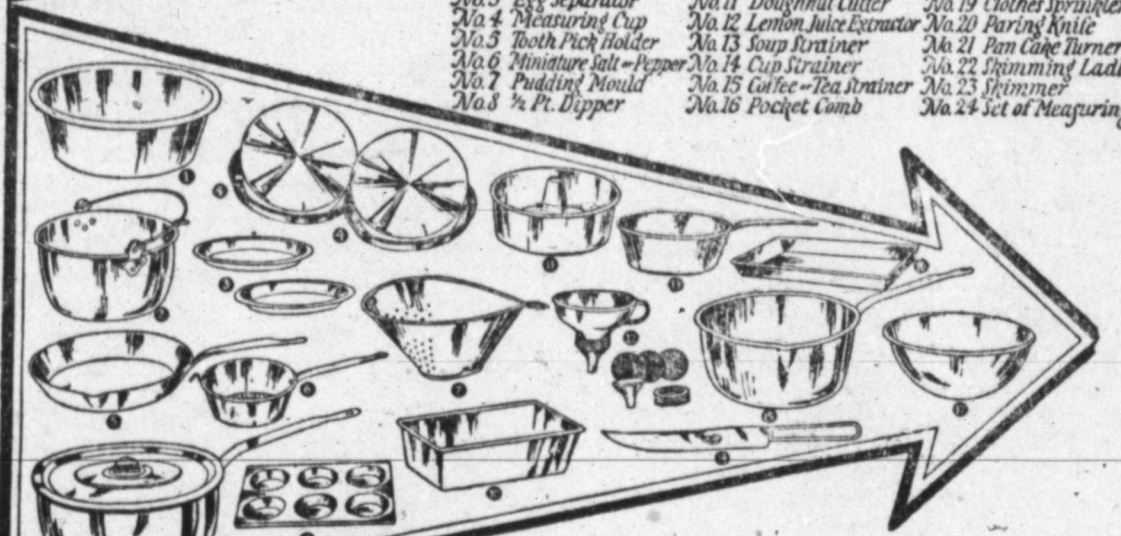

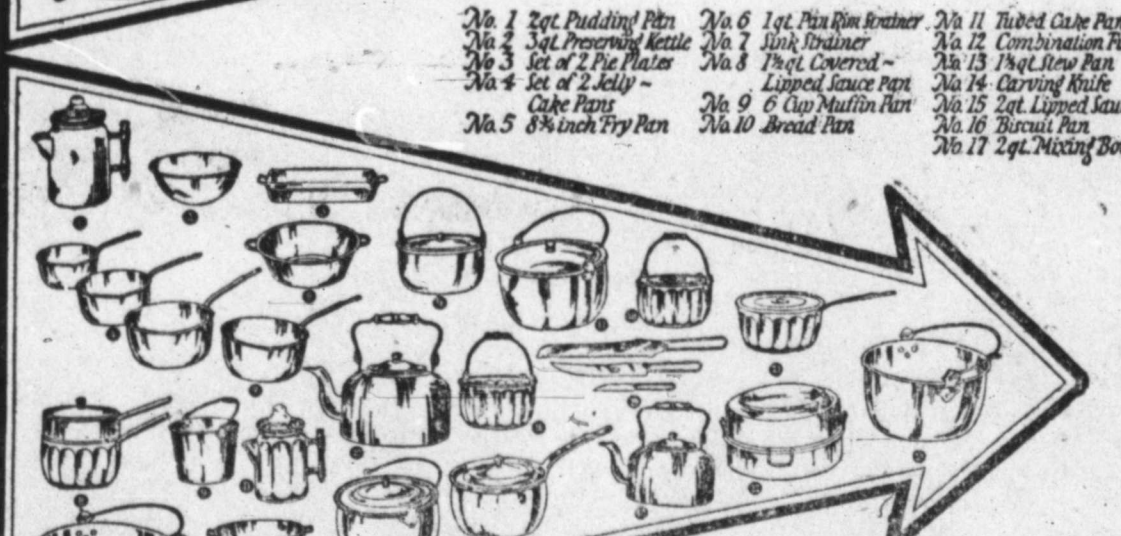

**SWEETWATER BAPTISTS TO BUILD \$60,000 CHURCH**

From Sweetwater Reporter: A church costing complete between \$55,000 and \$60,000 was definitely decided upon at the Quarterly Conference of the First Baptist Church last night. It will be built at the earliest possible date.

The new structure is to be located on the corner of East North Third and Elm streets, where the parsonage now stands. The parsonage is to be moved west to allow room and when the new structure is completed the structure that now houses the activities of the Baptist Church will be razed and the property probably disposed of.

About \$40,000 is to be spent in the new structure itself and the furniture will cost another \$15,000. The new church will be modern in every way and a credit to the town.

**WITHDRAWN FROM TAX ASSESSOR'S RACE**

Open letter by L. B. Elliott, Announcing his Withdrawal from the Tax Assessor's Race, With Reasons.

Colorado, Texas, June 28th, 1922. Now that I have withdrawn from the Tax Assessor's race it falls on me to announce the fact publicly. I have withdrawn from the present political campaign because of the business in which I am engaged. I am an abstractor of Land Titles in this county and I have too much interest in this work which I have chosen as my life's profession to drop it even for so short a time as two or four years.

When I entered the race for Tax Assessor, business conditions were such that I could have given that office proper attention and at the same time conducted my abstract business by the employment of some reliable person to whom I could entrust certain parts of the work. But with the present outlook for oil development in Mitchell County and realizing the increased work it would create in the Tax Assessor's office as well as in the abstract business, I am not willing to assume the responsibility of my work and a public office, each of which would tend to demand my entire time and attention.

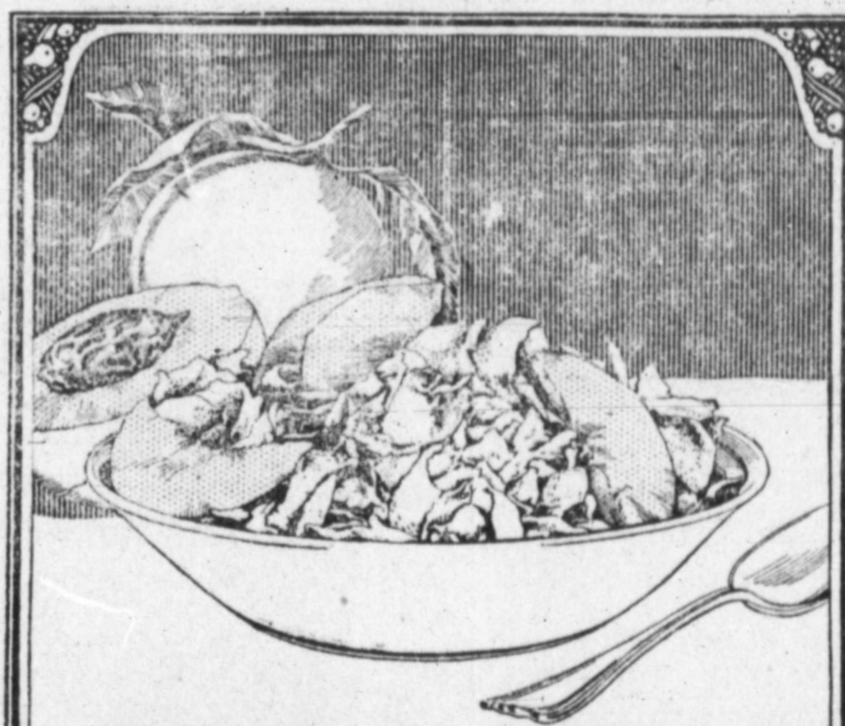

### PECAN WORM THREATENS DESTRUCTION PECAN CROP

A report to the West Texas Chamber of Commerce indicates that the presence of the pecan worm will cause an almost total loss of the nut in the Ballinger section this season in face of the bright prospects a few weeks ago. Reports indicate that the worm is working in practically all pecan territory of West Texas. The loss is expected to reach far into the millions of dollars. So far as known nothing can be done to save the crop this season.

The bend section of the Colorado Valley, located on the Colorado river, which loaded out its heavy crop of pecans through Lometa during the season of 1921 and by reason of that fact Lometa became the leading pecan market of the State. Not only were the greatest number of carloads shipped from Lometa, but in the national test a Lometa man secured the cash prize for exhibiting the largest pecans grown anywhere. They averaged 2 inches in length and it took just 32 to weigh a pound. It was expected until very recently that this year's crop would exceed that of 1921, but just at the stage of growth when the branches were loaded with blooms the hard rains of a month ago came and it is reported that only one-fourth of a crop is expected.
