INTERESTING STONE RELIC

A stone image representing the bust of a human being is on display at the office of Hart-Costin Realty Company, in the City Hall. The image, which is claimed to have been found several feet below the surface by a man who was digging a well on the N. T. Smith place, five RURAL SCHOOL DISTRICTS miles west of Colorado forty years ago, has been in the possession of Turkey Smith, an old negro resident of Colorado, since that time.

A few days ago, J. L. Costin, member of the realty firm, was in the negroe's cabin and noticed the image. The old darkey told how that it was found and stated he had kept it in his home all these years. Upon request, the negro presented the relic to Hart who prizes it very high-

The image weighs nineteen and one-half pounds and was hewn from granite. Since there is no granite known to exist in this section, it is supposed to have been brought here from some other locality, probably from Old Mexico. An old primitive stone mill was found several years ago near the location where
