Cisco Couple Tells Of Cyclone In Hale Center

The value of an active Civil Defense organization was demonstrated to a Cisco couple last week when they visited Hale Center after a tornado had wrecked many of the homes and buildings in the community.

Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Jackson of Cisco went there last Thursday after her aunt, Mrs. Tom Rice, was one of three people killed. One hundred people suffered injuries. The storm struck Wednesday night, June 2.

The tornado was first spotted at a nearby community of Cotton Center and a siren was sounded in Hale Center, giving people plenty of time to take cover.

Mr. Jackson said "they put me to work" soon after their arrival. Virtually every building in the business district was in ruins. The storm tore a one to two-block path through residential area, he said.

Many automobiles were wrecked. A new car dealer had 60 cars demolished. An elementary school was demolished, along with a church. A Newspaper office was wrecked, and the post office was in shambles. The bank

building was damaged badly, trees were uprooted, signs were down everywhere, and the city hall was destroyed.

"Never have I seen more destruction from a storm," Mr. Jackson said. He said the people there were given considerable help from neighboring communities.

Mr. Rice is in serious condition in a Plainview Hospital with a broken arm and both legs broken and possibly a broken back. Tommy Rice of De Leon also attended the funeral. Mr. Tom Rice is a brother of Mrs. Oscar Petree and Mr. Henry Rice, also the late Floyd Rice.

Mr. and Mrs. John Avery brother of the deceased Mr. Rice, lost their home which was demolished by the storm and are making plans to move to this area.

County 4-H Food Show Will Be June 16 In Eastland

Rain Totals 8.48 Inches

It's been fairly well established that the month of May in Eastland County can be considered a "wet one." The month just ended further proved the rule with a total of 8.48 inches officially recorded by U. S. Weather Observer

Two years ago, in 1963, 6.66 inches fell in May, and everybody remembers that it was a 11.70-inch rain in May, 1957 that filled Lake Leon. Average for the month is 4.08 inches, third only to August and September with averages of 5.83 and 5.79 respectively.

Total rainfall for 1965 is 14.38 inches — 3.09 inches above the five-month average of 11.29, and 5.78 inches above the same five months last year.

Rain fell on 11 days this May — .03 of an inch on the sixth; .02 on the eighth; .70 on the tenth; 1.82 on the 11th; 2.96 on the 13th; .48 on the 14th; 1.57 on the 16th; .46 on the 17th; .18 on the 19th; .09 on the 28th; and .25 on the last day.

Temperatures ranged from a low of 40 degrees to a high of 89 on the 29th.

Cong. Burleson's District Gains Ten Counties

West Texas congressional districts will range from 376,200 for Omar Burleson's District 17 to 456,051 for Clark Fisher's District 21 under the reapportionment bill passed by the Legislature and sent to the Governor early Sunday.

Burleson loses Scurry County to Rep. George Mahon's District 19 (Lubbock), and Parker County to Rep. W. R. Poage's District 11 (Waco). But District 17 gains 12 other counties, bringing the net number of counties up from 14 to 24.

Added to District 17 are two counties from District 13 (Wichita Falls), Haskell and Throckmorton; two from District 19 (Howard and Mitchell); one from District 16 (El Paso), Glasscock; and seven from District 21 (San Angelo-Odessa-San Antonio), Sterling, Coke, Runnels, Coleman, Brown, Concho and Mills.

District 17 thus climbs from 287,889 to 376,200.

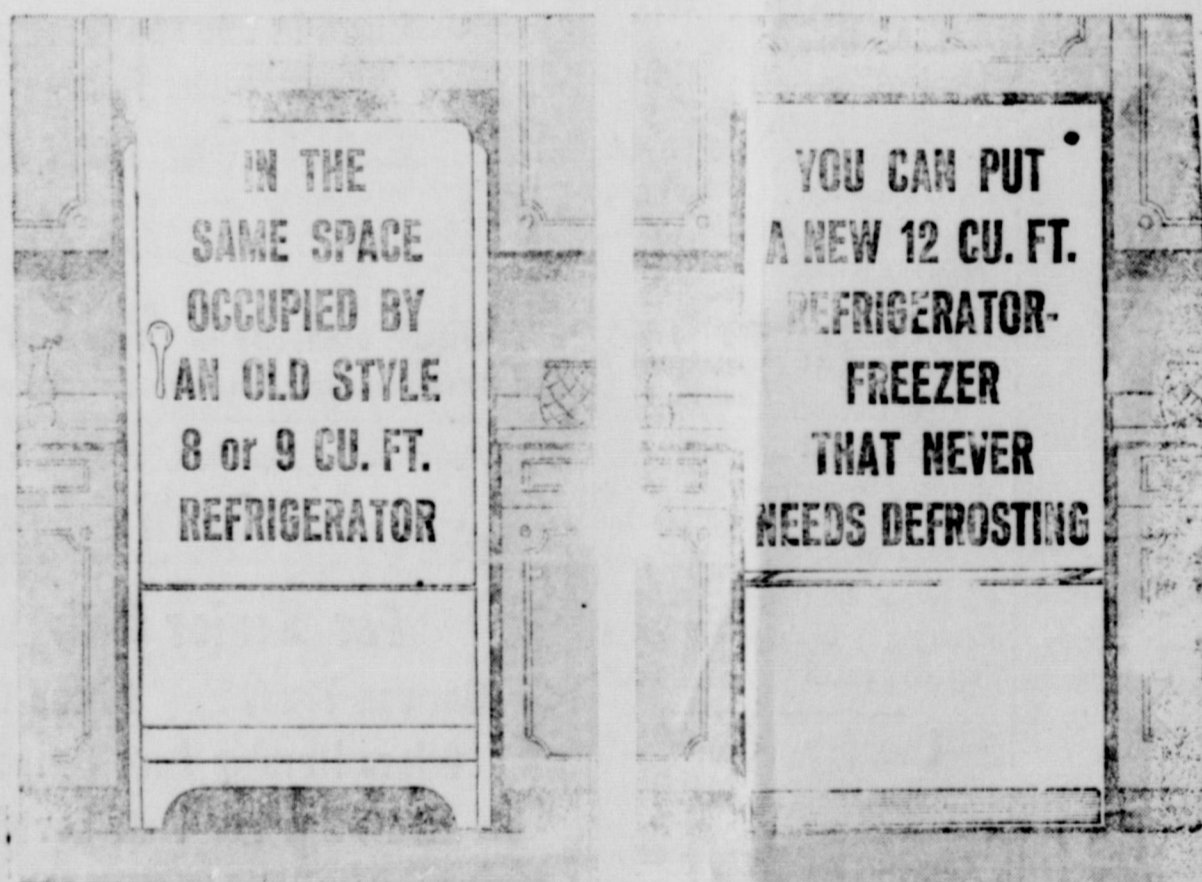
