

TOM NUNN KILLED HERE SATURDAY AT GRAVEL PIT

Tom Nunn was instantly killed in n accident at the gravel pits near he river northwest of Colorado Saturday morning when a bank several feet in height near where he was at work caved, covering him with sand and gravel. He was dead when his body was reached by a rescuing party which gathered at the pit within a few minutes following the acci-

His brother, Robert Nunn, was the only witness to the tragedy. The Nunn boys were operating a truck for hauling gravel and had just driven into the pit and commenced oading when the accident occurred. Robert was caught by the falling gravel but managed to extricate himself unassisted.

The accident was one of the most deplorable ever happening in Colorado, Tom Nunn, a young man twenty-eight years of age, and a former service man, was very popular in Colorado. He was a son of Mrs. John Nunn, widow of the late John Nunn who died here only a few months ago.

Funeral services were held at the First Baptist church Sunday afternoon by the pastor, Rev. M. C. Bishop, assisted by Rev. D. R. Hardison and Rev. J. F. Lawlis, Rev. Mr. Bishop paid a beautiful tribute to the life of the decreased and described him as having been a young man of unusual Christian charcater. MERCHANTABLE ICE NOT POSSIBLE FROM RAW WATER

According to report of analysis of water of the character taken from wells at the municipal water works, Lambeth, the grade of raw water ice that would be produced from it able if the people expect a clear ice. This information was received by Mr. Lambeth this week.

While in Fort Worth recently to attend the State Ice Dealers Association, Lambeth made a thorough investigation into the possibilities of manufacturing ice from the raw water here, and states that experts advised such an undertaking to be impracticable.

Through a process of distillation, however, ice can be made from this water after treatment which would just as good from any refrigerating standpoint as a block of crystal gether spelled Shepherd. clear ice, the Chicago experts stated. The raw water is also undersirable for boiler use, the report received by Lambeth continues. In speaking of this feature, the report says:

"The water should be treated, however, even for boiler feed purposes, as it contains a tremendous amount of incrusting solids which would form very hard scales in the boilers, reducing their efficiency, wasting fuel and necessitating fre-



MEXICO ITS HOME

Domestic Species of Turkey Had Origin There.

hanksgiving Bird, So Well and Favorably Known Today, Never of the Wild Species.

At this time of the year when the feasting holidays are here, almost everyone thinks of turkey, which also took an important part in the first Thanksglving of the Puritans, the founders of Thanksgiving as we know ift today. Little is known of the early Instory of the domestic turkey. Writers of the Sixteenth and Seventeenth centuries seem to have been ignorant about it, and to have regarded it as the guineafowl or pintado of the ancients, a mistake which was not cleared up until the middle of the last century, says a writer in the New

The name it now bears, and which it received in England where it is reputed to have been introduced in 1541, was given it from the supposition that It came originally from Turkey. As far back as 1573, we read of it as having been the Christmas fare of the the counterpart of its Mexican pro-

sturdy British yeomanry. Came From Mexican Fowl. Audubon, one of the early pioneers

of American ornithology, supposed our common barnyard turkey to have originated in the wild bird so prevalent in the eastern half of the United States. But it has always been a matter of surprise to naturalists that the latter did not assimilate, by interbreeding and reversion, more intimately in color and habits to the domestic form. No susplcion, until recently, old sawmill where the children play, pappears to have been entertained that the two birds might belong to differ

Texas, New Mexico, Colorado and C L. ROOT, M. D. United States, while in the parts of Arizona, thence stretching southward along the eastern slope of Mexico, there exists another form, essentially different, which by way of distinction, has been popularly called the Mexican turkey. It is from this species, and not from the other, as has been erronequaly supposed, that the domestic fowl has been derived.

Many Differences Seen. Between the wild bird of eastern North America and the Mexican and typical barnyard fowls there are differences which must be apparent to the most superficial observer. The extremities of the tall feathers as well as the feathers overlying the base of the tail are in the latter creamy or fulvous white, while in the former they are of a decided chestnut brewn color. Other characteristics exist, apparent to the ornithologist.

The difficulty experienced in establishing a cross between our wild and tame birds, shows that they are not as closely related as one would suppose. Did a near kinship exist, interbreed ing would more easily be accomplished. With the Mexican turkey, matters are otherwise. That a relationship does exist between the domestic bird and the latter there can be no question, as specimens of the naturalized species are often met with which are nearly genitor, differing only in the greater development of the fatty appendages of the head and neck, differences which may be accounted for as the effects of the influences to which the birds have been subjected by man. No well-authenticated instance of similar reversions to our once familiar eastern bird have been known to orcur, which would necessarily have been the case had they been so closely related as was once maintained.







