We publish the above to show how thankful we should all be that we live in America, Texas and especially Mitchell County.



RANDALL COUNTY HOG MEN

The Randall County swine breeders are contemplating holding a special school in swine husbandry some time in December to further their knowledge of hog prdouction. As outlined at the present time by those in charge, the school will likely last two or three weeks. However, it is planned to have only two classes per week. A large part of the classtime will be devoted to feeding problems. The present price of grain is forcing breeders to give attention to economical rations and pastures for pork production.

According to Prof. Phillips of the West Texas State Normal College Department of Agriculture, the unit course in special livestock production is proving more satisfactory than the old type of farmer institute. The Farmer Institute was run with the idea of getting someone from a distance to make an inspirational speech and then the interest was lost until the next year's meeting. 



E. M. Noyse of Myers & Noyse, Dallas engineers who have charge of the sewer and water extension projects at Colorado, arrived Monday and spent a few days of this week checking up work of the contractors. Weeks & Hightower, Mr. Noyse, expressed the wish that a water softening plant would soon be authorized by the city council, stating that lengthly investigations conducted at his office had proven conclusively that a softening plant was the only practical solution of the water problem at Colorado.

In speaking of the water question at Colorado, Mr. Noyse said

"It is almost an axiom that a good water supply is essential to the prosperity of a municipality. Great improvement has been made in recent years in the quality of water supplied even in the smaller towns and villages of the country. This improvement has been largely the result of the growing understanding of the direct benefit to be derived in the health of the people by the use of good water. It is natural then that the first great improvement has been along sanitary lines. There is no longer any excuse for epidemics of typhoid resulting from contaminated water supply, since modern methods




Our Greeting






