



RELICS FOUND IN CORNER STONE OF SNYDER BUILDING

This is a day of exploiting of ancient tomb excavating and many other weird and interesting things are taking place. Some exploits are made for the mere satisfying of one's curiosity while others are done in order that old debris may be removed for the erection of other and more modern buildings.

This happened the other day in Snyder when the corner stone of the old school building was excavated by T. L. McMillan, a member of the school board, and Elmer Ben'ley. The ground on which the old school building stood was being (cleared, and in the work of leveling up and removing the ancient structure of learning the corner stone was encountered with the result that many antique specimens of other days

According to historical records, the corner stone of the old Snyder High School building was laid on June 18, 1901, under the auspices of the Masonic order of Snyder, as indicated by relics found in the stone. In it was found a copy of The Dallas News of June 7, 1901; also a copy of the El Paso Times and one of the St. Louis Republic of the same date. About a dozen pieces of silver rangng from a 5c piece to 25c were found; also a few pennies, jewelry, keys and a Masonic apron; a local paper was not found in the corner stone. One might have been placed there and perhaps rotted away as the papers were in pretty bad condition from the effects of dampness that still legible.-Snyder Signal.

three weeks after it was hatched. On farms where kafir, feterita or milo are available these grains can be used to good advantage in making up home mixed feeds for baby chicks. Where the chicks are started on rolled oats and are fed that for a week or ten days the chicks can be gradually worked off onto a scratch ration composed principally of one of the kafir grains if nothing better can be secured. While it is desirable that kafir should be cracked until the chickens are three of four weeks old it is possible for chicks to eat the whole kafir after they are from seven to 10 days old.

Any of the following mashes can be easily mixed and will give excellent results when fed in unlimited quantities to growing chicks:

Mash No. 1-100 pounds wheat bran, 100 pounds shorts, 100 pounds oat flour, -100 pounds corn flour, 100 pounds corn meal, 100 pounds high grade tankage.

Mash No. 2-200 pounds wheat bran, 100 pounds wheat shorts, 100 pounds corn meal, 100 pounds high

grade tankage. Mash No. 3 .- 200 pounds wheat bran, 200 pounds wheat shorts, 100 pounds high grade tankage.



### SAYS OUTLOOK IN COTTON STATES IS NOT ENCOURAGING

FLORENCE, S. C., April 24,-Taking issue with conclusions of the recent report by the Department of Agriculture that the indicated cotton acreage was 12 per cent greater than last year, Senator Smith of South Carolina declared in a statement here today that in the Carolinas and Georgia at least the outlook for the cotton crop was the poorest in years. Unfavorable weaththe migration of tenant farmers from the 1920-21 prices were the causes given by Senator Smith.

"Whatever may have been the intent of the Department, the result was at least temporarily disastrous to the price of cotton," the South Carolina Senator said. "I do not know the sources of information of the Department or those who made statement but I do know

In most instances, especially in the sandy land belts, where crops had been planted the farmers will have to plant over.


