

own worst enemies. That is why we say that for growers to band together simply to save a little money by co-operative purchasing and things of that kind is not enough. This does not help them merchandise their crops, and if the growers will help each other to merchandise their crops they can make enough out of the process so that they can pay the same as anybody else for what they want to buy, in city or town. They will not have to think of that type of saving except in the same way that the city man thinks of it. The growers have one aim to accomplish, and that is merchandising their crops instead of dumping their crops.

Take what has happened in the cotton industry. We have in the United States an industry by which we produce two-thirds of all the cotton in the world, a staple nonperishable article giving us what would amount to a commercial monopoly of this high type product. We have been producing it decade after decade and in the same districts. You would imagine that these farmers must have made some money. because the men who sell cotton goods get a fairly good price, and you have known of cotton exchange millionaires and mill men who have left enormous fortunes for their children. There are several millions of cotton farmers in the Southern section of the United States, and they live in a stage of poverty such as you never dreamed of-a stage two generations behind the rest of the United States. You can go to South Carolina and see homes where the whole family lives in one room, where perhaps for the whole year no one has a pair of shoes or stockings; where they have to take the little children and put them to work in the field and can not give them any schooling. There are districts where the whole county can not raise enough taxes to put in a decent road or a school, or put up a decent church; where to family after family all their days are passed in gloom and hopelessness; where tenantry is increasing, where the standard of living is going down. And yet these very people are producing one of the greatest agricultural crops of the world, which makes millionaires every singe year in New York, in New England, and in Old England. You would think it a most amazing thing to realize that the average family income in South Carolina, in producing cotton, is less than \$300 a year, including the higher war years, for the last ten years. It is the most amazing thing I have ever known in my life to realize how this great and valuable crop, one of the greatest on the North American continent, can create so much wealth, can take so much out of the consumer and leave so little, either in money, in happiness or in decency of living for the man who primarily created that wealth. 



Yet our constitution reads, Article 8, Section 1: 'Taxation shall be equal and uniform. All property in this State, whether owned by natural persons or corporations, other than municipal, shall be taxed in proportion to its value, which shall be ascertained as may be provided by law.'

> "No patriotic Texan, no matter from what county he comes, but will agree that these flagrant violations of the plain letter, and spirit of the Constitution should be stopped by law. Thitry-four other States in the Union have developed and have corrected a similar abuse in unequal assessments. What they have done, Texas can do. Until Texas makes this absolutely necessary inform, there is, in my opinion, no hope of getting our State Finances on a safe and conservative basis.

"Of our \$28,000,000 of revenue last year, the State tax commissioner reports over \$20,000,000 came from the counties in ad valorem and regular taxes. Already the over-paying counties are announcing a policy of reducing assessments to the same basis of valuation followed in the other counties. This means in one county that I could cite cutting the State's revenue \$200,000. Texas is already \$6,000,000 in arrears, and drastic reductions in the State's revenue as these proposed cuts in assessment indicate, will mean absolute bankruptcy for Texas.



Governor Neff called a special election to be held May 8 to elect a successor to Representative Leo Brady of Galveston, who recently resigned as a member of the Thirty-eighth Legislature from Galveston County. . . .

Two additional towns, Munday and Boerne, have entered the contest for the Texas Technological College. A committee came here from Boerne to obtain details. It consisted of Professor Arthur S. Hathaway, B. Hole-kamp and H. L. Davis.

State Superintendent of Public Instruction Marrs said it is probable that an additional \$1 of the scholastic apportionment can be paid in May out of the State school taxes. The transfer will be made May 1. Of the \$13 apportionment the schools have received \$10.59. With \$1 paid in May, only \$1.50 will remain unpaid.

The Senate Finance Committee reduced the salaries of the normal college presidents from \$4,500, as allowed by the State Board of Control, to \$4.200, as now being paid, The board restored some of the maintenace accour.s of the San Marcos and Huntsville Normals, which were badly slashed last week.

It became known that members of the Legislature who opposed the wholesale changes made in the textbooks last Decem er have not abandoned the fight to negative the action of the Tertbook Commission. The Governor vetoed the bill to nulify the new contracts and thus permit them to stand.
