Federated Clubs Send Clothing Besides having a part in the \$430

County. Utecht bases his belief of this theory upon discoveries made on Morgan Creek, west of Colorado, wherein a perfectly fashioned stone idol, an antiquated stone grist mill and probably other relics of other peoples and other days were found. Utecht, who has made an extens-

ive study of the stone idol and the history of peoples who worshiped the type of idol found here; is firm in the conviction that a nomadic race, one no doubt of which history has

no record, made their home here in the long ago while crossing the Western Hemisphere. That the idol was the property of Indians is dismissed by the archaeologist as out of the question, because they were sun and moon worshipers and never adopted images fashioned by their own hands as their gods.

The stone idol proving of such interest to the visitor was found some forty years ago several feet below the surface of the ground by a negro man who was brought to Mitchell County by one of the early settlers in this the then frontier. The negro was engaged in digging a well on the banks of Morgan Creek, some five miles west of Colorado on what is now known as the Smith survey, when the stone image was found. In later years the grist mill was found at a location not far from where the well was dug. The image is still preserved and is on display at a local cafe, but the mill, after reposing on the curb at the City Hall for a number of years, was carried away, piece by piece, by souvenir hunters.

'Utecht has become so interested in the possibility of finding additional relics in this vicniity-probably the ruins of an ancient city buried near where the image and mill were found, that he is working in conjunction with the Chamber of Commerce in an attempt to interest the Smithsonian Institute and other research institutions in the find. "There is no telling what we might find with a little digging out there in 'that pasture," he commented rec-
