CHICKEN THIEF FRIGHTENED FROM HOME OF J. W. KAY

The man who attempted burglary of the J. W. Kay chicken roost one night last week came out looser, since he not only failed in obtaining the coveted chickens, but lost his car also in the deal.

Shortly after midnight Mrs. Kay was up at the home and detected a man stealthily approaching the chicken house, in which were sheltered more than one hundred fryers and young turkeys. She aroused Mr. Kay who armed himself and proceeded to investigate.

Going into the back yard and about the chicken house. Kay failed to find the prowler. Supposing that the man had been frightened away, Kay left the house, which is on the highway east of Colorado, and came toward the city. While near the cemetery he heard the motor of a Ford car start not far from the kay home. The driver came in the direction of Kay. As he approached the farmer ordered the diver to stop, but to no avail. In the attempt to halt the driver, Kay fired twice into the air. This caused the would-be chicken thief to turn and head his jitney in the opposite direction, toward Sweetwater. Wtihin a few minutes Kay and his son were pursuing in another car and for a few minutes a thrilling automobile race was taking place on the Bankhead highway. The man being chased, realizing that the machine in the rear was gradually gaining, turned into a country lane and after driving a short distance abandoned his car and fled into the woods. The Ford, bearing a number plate issued at Wichita Falls, was delivered to local authorities.

WEDDING ANNIVERSARY **CELEBRATION IS HALTED** BY WRECK INJURIES

The Sunday edition of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram carried an interesting story aboutt Rev. and Mrs. John R. Henson of Clarendon, parents of Mrs. S. O. Wulfjen of Colorado. Rev. Mr. Henson was at one time pastor of the Colorado Methodist church. The article follows:

Clarendon, July 14-Plans for the elebration of the fortieth wedding anniversary of Rev. John R. Henson and wife of this city were abandoned on account of the continued illness of Rev. Henson, due to injuries received in a wreck on the T. & P. between Cisco and Baird.

Rev. Mr. Henson and wife were married June 3, 1883, in Jacksboro, Texas. Henson was born in 1864 in Texas, while his wife was born in W. Virginia, in 1867. Her maiden name was Belle Furbee.

Henson and family moved to this city in 1898, and served the Methodist Church as pastor for four years. These were the years in which the big pohibition fight was waged in this town, finally putting out the saloons to stay. Much credit for the victory is accredited to Rev. Mr. Henson by old settlers living here now. They recall that he fearlessly published a paper called the "Agitator" and that business practically came to a standstill when itt came off the press, so anxious were the citizens to see what new advance the prohibitionists were going to make on the whisky dealers.

It is said that often Rev. Mr. Henson was in danger of bodily injury from enemies made during the fight for prohibition.

Rev. Mr. Henson has been presiding elder of Clarendon district of the Northwest Texas Conference of the Southern Methodist Church for four years and will round his work this fall.

Practically all of Rev. Mr. Henson's preaching has been in West Texas. He and his wife have seven children living in Texas. They are Mrs. S. M. Shelton, Abilene; Mrs. S. O. Wulfjen, Colorado; John P. Henson Hereford: Ernest N. Memphis; Ralph B., Roscoe; Mrs. A. R. Carter, and Margaret Louise, this city.





UDGE all goods according to their investment value.

There is a get-rich-quick merchandise. There is blue-sky service in goods, the same as blue-sky promise in swindle certificates.

Quality determines investment value. It gives safety to the investment value. and insures greater returns.

Just as a good bond costs more than a speculative stock, so does quality in merchandise cost more than shoddy; but this difference in cost is experienced only at the time of purchase.

While quality costs more in the beginning, it costs less by the month or the year

Many cheap things have exterior polish but quality goes deeper than paint or varnish. The confidence man can issue the highest-class stock certificates, so far as appearances go, but the investors get nothing else of merit.

Tinsel goods make excellent flashes often fine window displays-but in use their inferiority makes itself evident.

The best varnish on earth will not compensate for poor motors in an automobile-Cheap shoes that look well on display may have paper soles.

A dollar spent is a dollar flitted away or invested. No money should be paid for anything that does not give full value

Quality goods are not intended to compete with bargain goods. During the war the highest grade wool advanced in price, while shoddy kept about two jumps ahead of the dust-cloth.

Poor folks pay most for their necessities, because they receive least in return -least nourishment in their cheap food, least style, fit and wearing quality in their cheap clothes, least sanitation, light, comfort in their cheap homes.

Poverty perpetuates itself by patronizing only the inferior.

Inexperience believes that high prices are arbitrary—but experience knows that they are essential because they represent better materials; better workmanship; better values.

The Sunday edition of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram carried an interesting story aboutt Rev. and Mrs. John R. Henson of Clarendon, parents of Mrs. S. O. Wulfjen of Colorado. Rev. Mr. Henson was at one time pastor of the Colorado Methodist church. The article follows:

anniversary of Rev. John R. Henson | was credited to Wyoming. and wife of this city were abandoned on account of the continued illness of Rev. Henson, due to injuries received in a wreck on the T. & P. between Cisco and Baird.

Rev. Mr. Henson and wife were married June 3, 1883, in Jacksboro, Texas. Henson was born in 1864 in Texas, while his wife was born in W. Virginia, in 1867. Her maiden name was Belle Furbee.

Henson and family moved to this city in 1898, and served the Methodist Church as pastor for four years. These were the years in which the big pohibition fight was waged in this town, finally putting out the saloons to stay. Much credit for the victory is accredited to Rev. Mr. Henson by old settlers living here now. They recall that he fearlessly published a paper called the "Agitator" and that business practically came to a standstill when itt came off the press, so anxious were the citizens to see what new advance the prohibitionists were going to make on the whisky dealers.

It is said that often Rev. Mr. Henson was in danger of bodily injury from enemies made during the fight for prohibition.

Rev. Mr. Henson has been presiding elder of Clarendon district of the Northwest Texas Conference of the Southern Methodist Church for four years and will round his work this fall,

Practically all of Rev. Mr. Henson's preaching has been in West Texas. He and his wife have seven children living in Texas. They are Mrs. S. M. Shelton, Abilene; Mrs. S. O. Wulfjen, Colorado; John P. Henson Hereford: Ernest N. Memphis; Ralph B., Roscoe; Mrs. A. R. Carter, and Margaret Louise, this city.



appear and be heard, and to introduce evidence and subponea witnesses.

IV

The City Secretary of the City of Colorado is directed to give notice to the owners of the property abutting upon the said portions of street, and to all others interested, of all said matters and things, by causing a copy of this Resolution to be published at least three times in some newspaper of general circulation in and published in the City of Colorado, Texas, the first publication to be made at least ten days before the date above fixed for such hearing. The City Secretary may also give notice by mailing to each owner at his or her address, if known, by registered letter, a copy of said notice, but the said notice by letter shall be only cumulative of the said notice by advertisement and publication, and the notice of the notice be given.

This resolution shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.
