



1921 Study Club Meets



24 SCHOOL DISTRICTS TO REQUEST \$19.250 AID

Twenty-two common and two independent school districts of the county are to file application for State aid aggregating a total of \$19,250. Application presented by the twenty-four districts have been filed at the office of J. C. Hall, county superintendent, and will by him be presented to the State Department of Education.

This will be the largest amount requested from the department since the state aid act became effective a few years ago. Last year the schools of Mitchell County applied for \$14,-500 and received from the state \$11,500. Hall will go to Austin to personally support the application for this financial assistance.

irrigation projects of West Texas, which will soon be visited and reportd upon by the State Board of Water Engineers lies in the southwest part of Scurry County in the Colorado River Valley about 16 miles from

Several preliminary surveys of this project have been made, but rom lack of proper legislation it has been deemed unwise to attempt the

At a point where the protruding rock embankments on either side of the river are only separated by a gorge some 1,500 feet in width, is found an ideal damsite and which will require the installation of a dam rising about 1000 feet above the Colorado River bed. Stretching back from this point and covering something like 100 square miles, is a natural storage reservoir capable of impounding 200,000 acre-feet of water. Above this point and reachthe headwaters of the Colothe lower South Plains is an than 2,000 square miles which drains through this territov and capable of filling the reservoir everal times during any normal year. Near the damsite and draining back into the rive is a natural spillway that will take care of all surplus loodwaters for any projects below

The reservoir site is now part of. several big ranches, and little farming property will have to be dis. turbed in the project.

Below the damsite are many housands of acres of rich land already in cultivation, reaching thru the southern portion of Scurry Couny and into Mitchell. The project calls for two main canals, one on either side of the river widening gradually for many miles and reaching a class of land singularly suited for fruit and truck growing, in addition to the other staple crops grown throughout this section.

The annual runoff from the Colorado through this territory totals many hundred thousand acre-feet draining as it does the major portion of several counties, and there is no reason to believe but that when this project is completed that there will be ample water to take care of considerabled more acreage than, now ontemplated.
