NEW HOSPITAL.

The five-story, fireproof, modern sanitarium building to be known as the West Texas Baptist Sanitarium has recently been completed in Abilene at a cost of \$150,000 for the

structure itself. Plans are now under way by the Board of Trustees of the institution for the furnishing and putting into operation of the modern hospital plant at an early date. A big rally of Baptists of this section in the interest of the sanitarium is scheduled for April 4, with Dr. Geo. W. Truett of Dallas as the speaker of the occasion.

Doctors from a large section of West Texas, including the second medical district of the State and adjoining counties, were invited to attend a special all-day session in Abilene one March 12 and were entertained by the sanitarium board at a luncheon. First official and public inspection of the building was made on this occasion by the visiting members of the medical profession. The all-day session was scheduled in connection with a regular meeting of the Taylor County Medical Association, and leading physicians of the State were secured to address the assemblage in the afternoon.

Sometime before the first of April the sanitarium board is planning a general opening of the building to the people of Abilene. Later a special opening is to be arranged for the students of Simmons College, whom the institution is particularly designed to serve, the building being only one block from the college campus. Under the inspiration of the completion of the new hospital plant a pre-medic club of some fourteen members was organized during the past week at the college.

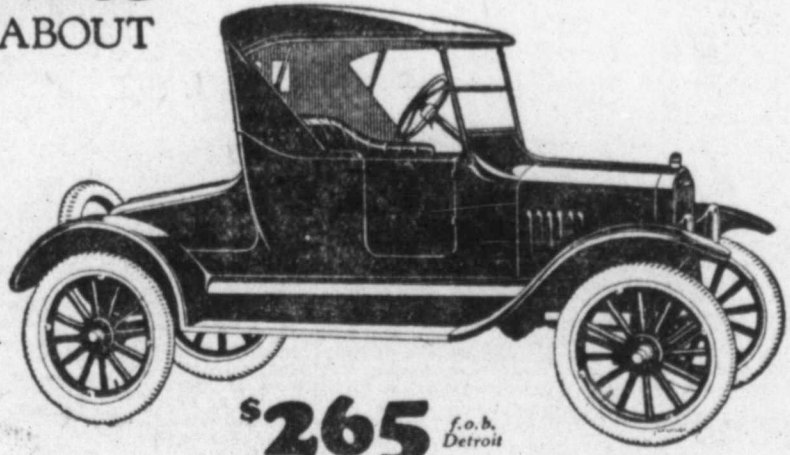

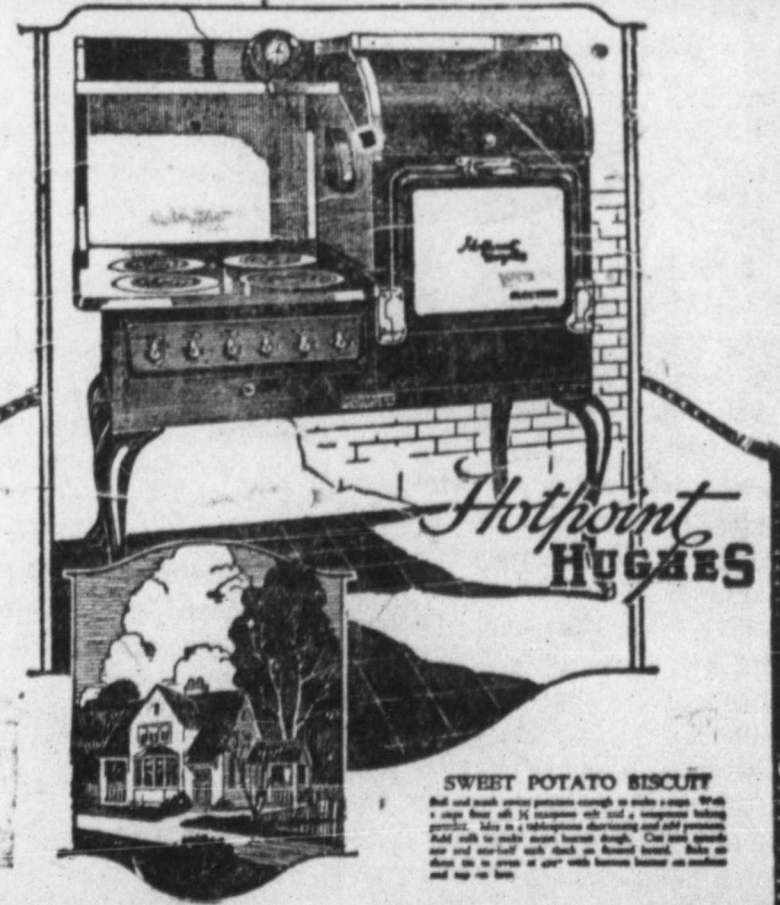

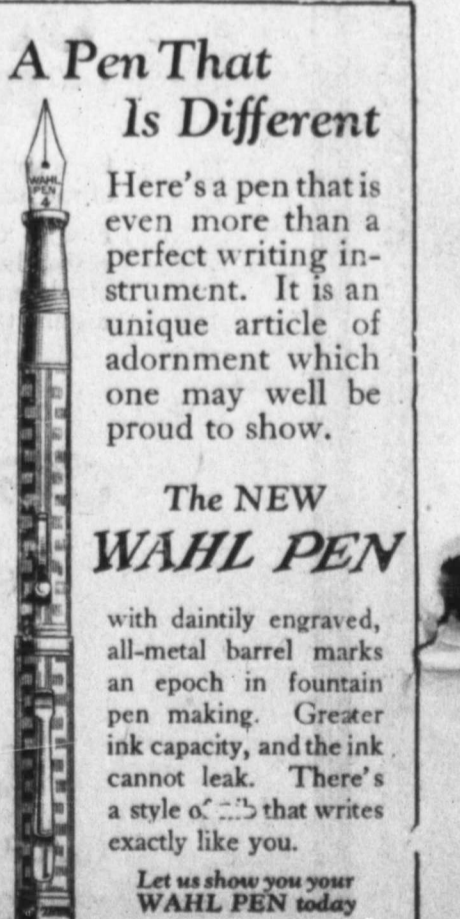

claim agent for the Fort Worth and Denver Railroad, as head teamster. The detail of troops was under the command of Lieutenant Daugherty. "Long Brothers' ranch was near the Fort Phantom Hill, which was abandoned at that time. As I remember, the Long Brothers' ranch was the furthest one west at that time. There was a man named Jackson who kept a store at Fort Griffin and bought buffalo hides, of which he had a great quantity. The above are about all the names I remember, except one Rooney, who was a teamster, and one Belding, who was a chairman, as I was.

Lawrence Banks afterward surveyed the L. & G. N. Railroad into Austin and he is the only one of the original party I have seen since 1874. Banks, Rooney, Belding and myself left the party out west and came back to civilization in the fall of 1874, and as General Byrnes did not want us to leave, he took all of

our arms away. Banks, who owned his own rifle and pistol, was the only armed man in the party, which walked for eight days through the Indian country before we reached Fort Griffin again. It was after we left the main party that it was reported we four had been killed by Indians. I heard the report from my brother

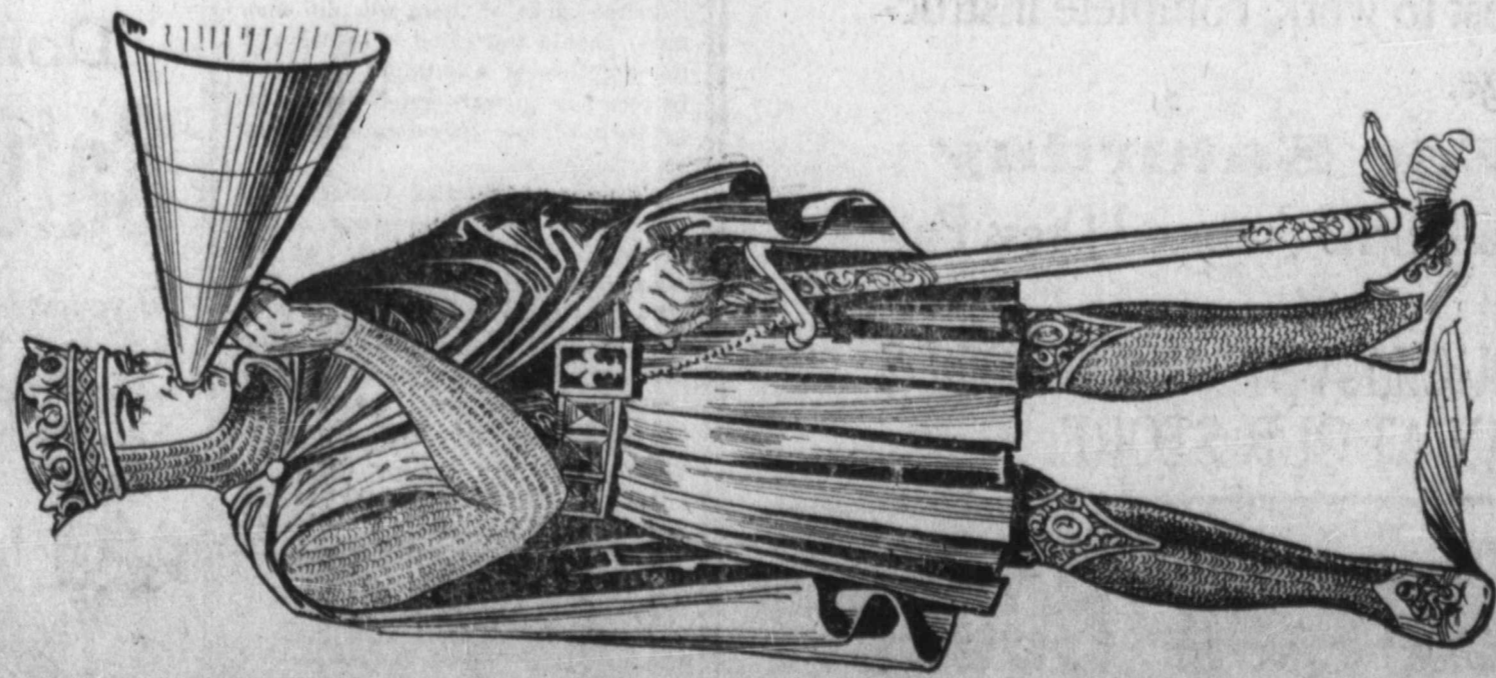

**COTTON ASSOCIATION IS ADDING 64 NAMES DAILY**

With a daily average of 64 new members to the Texas Farm Bureau Cotton Association since the first of the month, indications are that between 2,000 and 2,500 additional cotton growers in the State will join the association during March, according to W. W. Porter of Colorado, secretary of the Mitchell County unit of the association.

"Sentiment towards co-operative marketing is growing daily," Porter states, "and the association over the State is growing daily and the increased interest and support of the banks and bankers, together with the morale and satisfaction of the membership leads us to believe that we can and should conservatively expect an increased growth."

"Since November every month has shown an increase over the preceding month in the number of new members. In November the State Association added 459, in December 916, in January 1,028 and in February 1,360. Bad weather and roads during February materially lessened activities of the field forces, or that month would have shown an even larger increase. Membership in the association is now near the 35,000 mark, with possibilities of a 60,000 membership by the next cotton season."

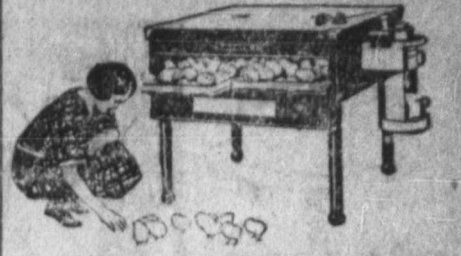

**OIL ACTIVITIES IN IRA FIELD INCREASE EACH WEEK**

The Lou-Tex J. J. Moore No. 1 has been all cleaned out and completed. The pumping equipment is on the ground and being installed. The well will probably be on the pump by the early part of next week.

As you know there is a three inch gas line from the Moore to the Humphreys Wellborne No. 1, and the Humphreys well is being drilled on the power from this non-inflammable gas. Probably due to the accumulation in this 8200 foot line the pressure of gas at the Humphreys well is more constant than it was when being used on the Moore. The volume and pressure shows no diminution whatever.

This non-inflammable gas was encountered in the Moore at 1296 feet. Monday, March 3rd, the Humphreys well encountered the same gas, with like volume and pressure, at 1100 ft. which is 200 feet higher than the Moore. There is about fifty feet difference in the elevation between these wells and striking the gas at 1100 feet in the Wellborn would apparently indicate that this well is running 150 feet higher than the Moore, which, if true, is quite a remarkable and certainly a very encouraging development.

The Wellborn is drilling in a 12 inch hole and it is planned to run the 10 inch casing to the top of the lime and branden-head the gas off between the 10 and 12 inch casing. The Wellborne will then be in position to operate on its own gas power. The well at the present date is drilling at 1200 feet and averaging from 30 to 40 feet a tower.—Scurry County Times.

#### BULLET-PROOF FORD CARS FOR POLICE IN BIG CITIES

Armored Ford cars as bandit chasers are the latest police innovation. Gen. Smedley D. Butler, Philadelphia's dynamic commissioner of public safety, is the man who introduced them.

Before he took office a few weeks back, the Philadelphia city council voted General Butler \$5,000 with which to purchase an automobile for his personal use.

But when salesmen for high-priced cars appeared and tried to interest him, he made it plain that he intended to spend the money in purchasing small, light cars for use as bandit chasers by the police department.

The Ford runabout was his choice and it wasn't long before an enterprising Ford salesman had a car ready for the general's inspection.

Now the Philadelphia police have six of these armored Ford cars and under General Butler's plan this number will shortly be augmented until there will be ninety such bandit chasers in service.

The entire shell of the body is lined with 1-8 inch special steel and the space between the armor plating and the outside of the cars packed with loose cotton and coarse hair to retard the velocity of bullets. Armor plate also covers the cowl and runs up as high as the lower portion of the windshield. The upper portion is in two sections of bullet proof glass and wind-wings have been provided on either side, these also of bullet proof glass.

The Ford engines are specially equipped to afford increased speed and tests made show some interesting results. In one test to show acceleration and power developed for hill climbing, a mile was covered in one minute and thirty-one seconds from a standing start. On country road the car attained a speed of more than sixty-miles an hour and in a city street the car covered 2,828 feet at a speed of approximately 70 miles an hour.

Ford cars have been in use by police departments all over the country for years and recently there has been a rapidly increasing tendency in the larger cities to use them in place of motorcycles, since they are less conspicuous, and afford greater protection and comfort. Portland, O. is one of the latest cities to adopt the Ford cars to replace motorcycles and now has twenty-three of them in operation. Cleveland Heights, O., and Cincinnati are other cities which have recently joined the Ford ranks, the armored Ford as used in Philadelphia, however, is General Butler's idea.

#### MITCHELL COUNTY ACTIVE IN ITS OIL DEVELOPMENT

The Dallas Morning News for Sunday carried an interesting article on oil development in Mitchell County. The News outlined that development in this county was being carried out on a larger scale than ever before.

The article follows:

There is more activity in the Mitchell County oil field this week than at any time since the field was discovered almost four years ago, according to reports from local offices of companies operating in the county. At the end of this week there were a total of eighteen wells either drilling or definitely located with tentative location of six more. This is in addition to the wells which have been completed.

The last location to be announced was made this week by Chal Daniel, who returned to Colorado a week ago from the Smackover field. Daniel controls valuable acreage in Section 15, Block 28, Texas & Pacific Railway Company survey, immediately north of the Smartt and Miller leases of the Sloan Oil Company and the California Company, and on which are located some of the best pumps in the county. Daniel has rig materials on the ground for his first test on this lease, which is in the west half of the W. D. Keynard subdivision of the section.

M. E. Eddleman has completed rig at his Gist No. 1 location, three miles north of Colorado, and is shipping in a string of tools. This test is ten miles east of producing wells in the Westbrook sector, and the first location in the vicinity of Colorado to the north.

The Sloan Oil Company is spudding their Smartt No. 3 in Section 21, Block 288, today. Their Smartt No. 4 and Smartt No. 5, on the same survey have rigs completed and tools being strung. The latter two tests are to be started within the next week.

J. F. Carey et al. are drilling at 2,200 feet at their Morrison No. 2 on the Earl Morrison survey near Westbrook. Six and five-eighths casing is being assembled for landing below 2,200 feet in this well. The Carey-Humphrey interests is below 1,200 feet in the Wellborne No. 1 near the town of Ira in Scurry county. The Wellborne test is the first one in this field to be projected by Col. Humphreys, discoverer of the Mexia field. The Lou-Tex Corporation has made two new locations in the Ira sector, which with their Moore No. 1, recently completed as a shallow producer, makes the third test by this corporation on their holdings north of the Colorado River in Scurry County.

Smartt No. 2 of the Sloan Oil Co. was completed this week and placed under pump, gauging a production of 200 barrels. Production is being turned into pipe line.

The California Company has ten uncompleted wells in the field, with activities reported at seven. The other three are standing cemented. At three of these wells the crews are drilling around the Morrison sand level. At Morrison 2 drilling is progressing at 2,940 feet, at 2,322 feet at Abrams No. 5, and 2,260 at Le Sure No. 2.

The new and enlarged loading rack of the Rio Grande Pipe Line Company, on the Texas & Pacific three miles west of Westbrook, has been completed, doubling the former loading capacity for handling pipe run crude.

Oil well supply depot of the California Company at Westbrook is under construction. The company recently purchased a tract of fourteen acres adjoining the town of Westbrook as base from which to supply development on their large holdings in the field.
