A heated discussion developed on the convention floor when a resolution endorsing the name of Alvin Owsley, former national commander of the American Legion, as vice president was presented by M. S. Goldman. Speakers addressing the convention on the resolution were profuse in praising Owsley as a statesman and soldier, but most of them introduced the prohibition question, claiming that in view of the fact that the convention did not know the positon of Mr. Owsley on this national issue, it would be unwise to instruct delegation to support him at Waco. L. W. Sandusky, local attorney, was permitted to address the convention on this subject and paid a Denton county, Sandusky declared in the eloquence of his address that Owsley stood without a peer in the eyes of patriotic citizens and leaders of lofty ideals the country over, and pled for an instructed delegation. An amended motion, specifying that Mitchell county delegates support Mr. Owsley for vice president, on condition "he stands four square for 18th amendment," carried. The amended motion was introduced by Dr. P. C. Coleman. The resolutions which denounced administration leaders and lined Mitchell county up solidly in support of McAdoo, follows: "We, the Democrats of Mitchell county in convention assembled, would renew our allegiance to the time honored teachings of our party, and, further, deplore the fact that these teachings have been repudiated to such an extent by the present Republican party that the American people today are suffering the disastrous results which surrounded them at the present time. "We feel the only relief from the shameful and disgraceful condition is to restore to the sane and patriotic hands of the Democratic party the reins of our government, and, further, the absolute necessity of having as our standard bearer one who has demonstrated his ability, courage and patrioitism, we instruct our delegates to the State convention to cast the vote of Mitchell county for the Honorable W. Increasing Yield of Eggs Milk fed to laying hens brings better returns than when fed to hogs, according to Purdue university. Returns at that station show that the increase in egg production gives a return of \$1.82 to \$5 per hundred pounds of milk fed to hens. Feeding of protein to hens will usually increase the egg production of a henabout 100 eggs per year as compared to hens that do not receive a protein supplement.

Milk cannot be compared with other forms of animal protein such as meat scraps and tankage wholly on the protein basis, since its palatability, ease of digestibility, and general' availability on the farm must be given consideration.

For chicks, milk is almost a necessity "ince most people can raise chicks easier and better and with less mortality when given as a liquid diet.


