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BROODINESS AMONG HENS IS BIG WORRY

The egg production in many flocks broody hens. A bird that is penned immediately in the right kind of a broody coop, fed as she should be and turned out as soon as possible should not loaf more than 10 days, writes W. H. McNeecy in the Dakota Farmer, good egg-making food, green material and fresh water and see that they are released as soon as they lose the notion and they will pay you for the trouble. It is a good idea to have a special color of celluloid leg bands for broody hens and put one on a hen every time she goes broody. Sell the ones that get bedecked like Fiji Islanders and use ones without any of these bands in the breeding pens next year. It takes feed and time to produce

chicken blood, so do not allow the mite to steal part of your income. A thorough spraying or painting of the roosts and nests in the poultry house with some good coal tar disinfectant will pay dividends.

Lice are irritants and keep the hen so busy fighting them that she has no time to work, so better kill them, too. Applying sodium fluorid powder, a pinch in fluffy feathers below vent, one under each wing and between body and legs and one on the back of the head should rid the bens of all lice but it will not kill the eggs. Repeat in about ten days when the eggs

will be hatched and no more laid. Another way to accomplish the same thing is to mix one ounce of sodium fluorid with each gallon of warm water and dip each chicken, making sure that the feathers are all soaked to the skin. This must be done early on a warm, sunshing day so that the henswill be dry before night. Repeat in ten days.

Brooder Pneumonia Will

Cause Loss of Chickens Heavy loss of young chicks is often due to brooder pneumonia, a disease caused by dusty or moldy litter, musty

feed, or severe exposure, Brooder pneumonia is sometimes associated with bacillary white diarrhea as the symptoms of the two dis-

eases are much alike. The diseased FARMERS ARMED WITH PITCH- refused to pay. chicks often breathe with difficulty, the lungs are usually diseased, and are found, upon opening dead birds, to be of a dark color and rather solid instead of light pink color and fluffy.

About the only remedy is to remove the cause. Clean sand is prohably the best floor covering for the brooder during the first two weeks, followed by a litter of some kind. Be especially careful that the litter is free from must or mold. Clover chaff if not dusty, or bright clean straw may be



Cotton was brought uses sunlight as a source of bottom and, as opportunity offered, was shipped to New Orleans. About this time a little Sea Island cotton was also being introduced along the Texas coast. Even earlier than the Scott gin, Jared E. Grace raised a crop of cotton on his farm near the present town of Hempstead and sinned and pressed it into, 100-pound bales, and carried it on pack mules to Mexico, where he sold it for 50 cents per pound. The same year, 1830, John M. Smith settled on the Trinity River, where the town of Liberty now stands, and opened up a farm by clearing a canebrake. He hired by day labor Moseley Baker, William H. Jack and William B. Travismen who later became prominently identified with Texas progress and

Texas history. But in spite of these isolated farms with their restricted fields of corn and cotton, stock raising constituted the chief pursuit of the early settlers. Mustang ponies were caught and after being somewhat gentled, were shipped to Louisana and sold. This industry or traffic was carried on mainly by young men who had drifted intto the country in search of adventure, but found no demand for their services other than capturing and breaking into use the wild ponies. The Vice brothers seem to have been the first to bring improved horses into the country for breeding purposes. They crossed these on mustang mares that had been captured and confined in pastures. But the Houston prairie, from Hempstead south, was a favorite range, not only for the wild mustang, but for buffa-

It is a far cry from the primitive agriculture of that day to the great farms and stock ranches of Texas, as we see them now. The ox wagon and the pack mule have been superseded by the railway, auto, and motor trucks. The tractor challenges the supremacy of horse power on the farm, while the multiplied conveniences of the farm home are in like contrast to the primitive home of a century ago. We feel at times that as farmers, we are not receiving an equitable share of the common prosperity that marked the advancement of the last centry, yet we doubt if in any other line of business, or in any other vocation, have there been such marvelous changes of improvement as in agriculture. by Use of Cuttings

Frame Which Uses Sunlight as Source of Heat Is Good.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

The propagation of plants by the use of cuttings is one of the oldest methods known, and until recently it was considered necessary for the best results that the rooting work should produce different crops. be carried on in a well-equipped greenhouse, using steam coils to supequipment, however, and the expense of providing it, have been serious objections to any widespread use of vegetative propagation except with plants easily rooted out of doors. This has been overcome to a considerable extent by the development by the by boat and on horses to the gin, heat. It has been found to give excellent results with the plants experimented with, including most of the standard citrus root stocks, as well as

the newer hybrids. The method and the experimental results are described in Department Circular 310, "The Solar Propagating Frame for Rooting Citrus and Other Subtropleal Plants," just issued. The construction of the frame is simple and the method is economical and offers considerable promise for other groups of plants, especially of subtropical character. The use of the solar rooting frame is obviously best adapted to the warmer portions of the country having a relatively large

amount of sunshine. A copy of the circular may be secured, as long as the supply lasts, from the United States Department of Agriculture, Washington.

Nicotine Dust Is Used

in Killing Plant Lice Nicotine dust is the substance recommended by the college of agriculture at New Brunswick for controlling the aphids which are so abundant on vegetable crops throughout New Jersey this year.

To prove the effectiveness of this substance in killing the pest a demonstration was conducted June 3 on the farm of William Hookstra, Beyerly, N. J. Dust containing 3 per cent nicotine was applied with a power duster. The next day an examination showed that the killing was nearly 100 per

The dust is easily applied, and as this and other trials have shown, it is thorough in its work. Application should be made after the dew is off and when the sun is shining brightly. Since the aphids are usually concealed beneath the leaves, considerable force should be used in applying the dust.

A one-horse two-row duster that will go through spaces six inches wide between the rows has just been placed on the market. This is particularly adapted to applying nicotine dust.

Growers of pens, beans, early celery, cabbage, spinach, lettuce, tomatoes, eggplant, and peppers must use increased vigilance and care if they are to free themselves from the ravages of the aphis pest this year.

Study Operation of Farmers' Elevators

Many Avenues of Possible Loss Due to Small Capital.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.) A study of the operation of farmers' elevators throughout the midwest grain-growing states is being made by the United States Department of Agriculture and the University of Minnesota in an effort to bring out the methods found to have produced success and those which may have been responsible for failure.

There are more than 5,000 such ele vators in the midwest grain-growing states. Many avenues of possible less are open to these elevators, due in part to limited capital, small volume of business, and the nature of the business itself, the study has revealed.

Other causes of financial difficulty may be the failure to insure properly the grain and other merchandise, building and equipment; failure to bond officials, bad accounts, fallure to provide sinking funds to replace depreciating property, failure to col-Even with care some sheep will lect full charges for services, fallure to detect erroneous charges, losses in weighing grain, losses from overgrading grain, losses from dockage, and losses from ineffective hedging.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO CONSTITUTION.

RELATING TO GRANTING OF CONFEDERATE PENSIONS.

Senate Joint Resolution No. 10.

Proposing an amendment to Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that the Legislature may grant pensions to Confederate soldiers, sailors and their widows, who have been citizens of Texas since prior to January 1, 1910, providing that all soldiers, sailors and their widows eligible under the provisions hereof shall be entitled to be placed upon the rolls and participate in the pension fund created hereunder; levying a tax of seven (\$.07) cents on the one hundred (\$100.00) dollars valuation of property in this State for the payment of such pension, providing that the Legislature may reduce the rate of rension for such purposes, fixing a time for the election to be held on such amendment and making an appropriation to pay the expenses thereof.



Much Corn Fails to Attain Grade

Large Portion of Loss Sustained Can Be Saved by Better Handling.

Much of the corn shipped from country points to terminal markets that is inspected and graded by federally licensed grain inspectors fails to meet the requirements for grade No. 1, according to grain inspection statistics of the United States Department of Agriculture.

The proportion of corn receipts inspected at terminal markets from 1917 to 1921 which met the requirements for grade No. 1 ranged from per cent to 27 per cent of the total crop. The remainder of the corn fell into one of the lower grades and was consequently sold at a reduced price. Considerable money loss to producers results from marketing corn which grade No. 1, a large portion of which loss can be saved through better handling of the corn on the farm, the department says.

The principal factors that affect the commercial grade of corn are quality, condition, color, test weight per aged kernels, heat-damaged kernels,

Any shelled corn which has a natural odor, is free from live weevils or other injurious insects, and has a bushel, a moisture content of not more 2 per cent of foreign materials or per cent of total damaged corn, and ho heat-damaged kernèls, will grade No. 1 under the government standards for shelled corn. Most of the corn which falls to meet the requirements for grade No. 1 usually receives one of the lower grades because of a single factor, although some lots are assigned the lower grade on account of two or more grading factors.

The department has brought together in a mimeographed pamphlet the recommendations of several investigators who have made a careful study of the problem of how to handle corn on the farm so as to assure a high grade and consequently a high price for the corn when it is sold on the terminal markets. Copies of this pamphlet may be obtained upon request to the bureau of agricultural economics, United States Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C.
