## 312 Retail Firms in Eastland County Do \$23.1 Million Annual Business

Eastland County's 312 retail establishments had \$23.1 million in sales in 1963. Substantially unchanged from 1958, the U. S. Bureau of the Census has just reported after tabulating data gathered from all firms in the 1963 Census of Business. The last previous business census conducted by the Census Bureau, an agency of the U. S. Department of Commerce, was in 1958.

Retail trade in the county meant jobs (exclusive of proprietors) for 731 men and women and a yearly payroll of \$1.9 million.

In volume of business the county's food stores had sales of \$5.9 million, an increase of 4 per cent from 1958. In other retail business — the county's eating and drinking places had sales of \$944 thousand, and gasoline service stations had sales of \$5.0 million; General merchandise group stores had sales of \$2.0 million; and lumber, building materials, hardware and farm equipment dealers had sales of \$1.6 million.

For the state as a whole, the Census Bureau reported 96,406 retail establishments with sales of \$12715.4 million, up 13 per cent from 1958. Census reports to be issued during the next few months will give state and county figures on wholesale and service trades, manufacturing and mineral industries.

Figures on number of establishments and sales volume for major types of retail establishments in each county are provided in the printed report: 1963 Census of Business, Retail Trade, Texas, available at \$1.00 from Superintendent of Documents, Washington, D.C. 20402 and at U.S. Department of Commerce Field offices.

## Rainfall Is Above Average, Below 1964

Officially, rainfall in Eastland County during the first quarter of this year is above average, but below that which fell during the same period last year.

Rain in both January and February was above average, but moisture in March fell far below average. Only .54 of an inch was recorded by Official U. S. Weather Observer James Smith of Eastland. Average for March is 1.59 inches.

There's been a total of 4.74 inches this year, compared to 5.48 inches during the first three months last year. Average for the three months is 4.34 inches.

Moisture during the month just ended came on four days: a half inch of snow on the third amounted to .11 of an inch; .20 of an inch on the 12th; a trace of snow on the 25th yielded .13 of an inch; and .05 fell on the 26th, Smith reports.

Low March temperature reported was 15 degrees, recorded on the 20th, and high was 31 degrees on the 17th. Low for the winter was 14 degrees on Feb. 24.

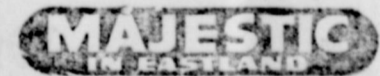

## Plans Underway For Fandangle Event At Albany

ALBANY — Reshaping a ranch stock tank, bulldozers are recreating in a pasture just outside Albany's city limits the Clear Fork of the Brazos River as background for Albany's outdoor summer show, the Fort Griffin Fandangle. The 1965 version of the spectacle, originated in 1938 and performed periodically since, is scheduled for production on two weekends in June, 18-19, 24-25-26.

For the first time in its history, the show is to have its own especially designed theater, with an expanse of Shackelford County prairie as its stage setting. The Fandangle, a theatrical recreation of the Old West is a dramatic project which includes in its cast not only 300 Albany actors but herds of longhorn cattle and buffalo.

Terraces cut in a hillside provide audience seating adapted to a natural setting, fulfilling a dream long held by the Fandangle production staff of having a theater exactly suited to the needs of the unique show.

The Fandangle is an all-Albany production, produced, written, directed, and performed exclusively by Albany people. Its new theater has been designed by Albany engineers and is being built by Albany construction firms as a contribution to the community-wide endeavor.

### VETS QUESTIONS & ANSWERS

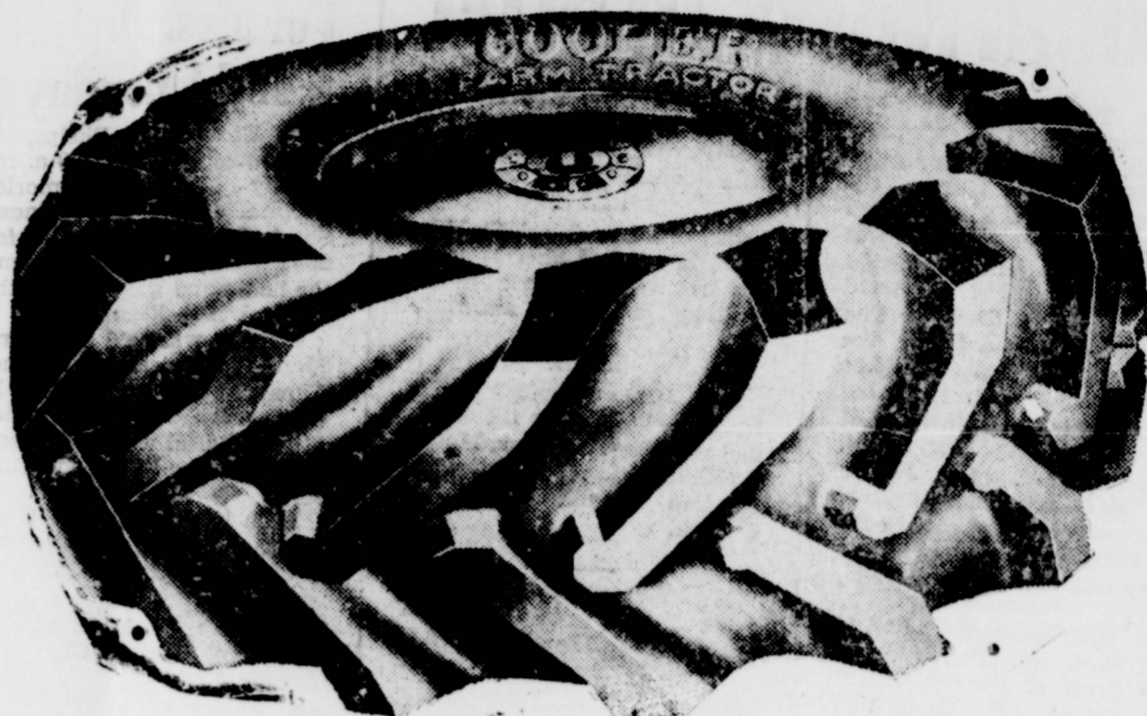

## NSLI Available To Former GIs In New Program

WACO — Many veterans whose nonservice-connected disabilities prevent them from buying commercial life insurance at sub-standard rates will have the opportunity to obtain National Service Life Insurance during a one-year period beginning May 1, 1965.

Glyndon Hague, manager of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Waco, pointed out that these applicants, unacceptable to commercial companies, will be obliged to pay very high premiums.

Nonservice-connected veterans affected are those who had been eligible to purchase insurance between October 7, 1940, and January 1, 1957, but who now hold less than \$10,000 worth or none at all.

These veterans may obtain a general information sheet at any VA regional office.

However, veterans are reminded that no application may be made prior to May 1, 1965.

The condition rendering the veteran uninsurable had to be in existence on the date the president signed the bill.

## REPORT ON PEANUT DAMAGE BY NEMATODES EXPECTED

Hordes of microscopic sub-soil animals may be robbing West Cross Timber peanut acreage of up to \$500,000 a year, according to a report which is to be published soon.

The culprits are worm-like creatures no larger than 1-50th of an inch in size, but capable, in numbers, of reducing the some \$8,000,000 peanut economy of Eastland, Erath and Comanche counties by as much as ten percent, the report shows.

County Agent J. M. Cooper and two county farmers have assisted in experiments which show the danger of the "nematodes."

Norm Spray, representing Dow Chemical Co., is preparing the report which will be submitted to the Southwestern Peanut Growers Association newspaper for publication.

"I think nematodes are our No. Two problem, after Southern Blight," D. B. Warren of Gorman has said. Warren is a grower and a director of the S.P.G. Association. The report shows that the Cross Timbers area has 113,000 acres or about 60 percent of the peanut acreage in Texas, and produces only about one-third of the state's yield. Damage by nematodes is believed to be the reason for the loss in production in the area.

The tests have included six test locations, including Mr. Warren's and Mr. Herman Schaefer's, of the Nimrod Community.

Cooper has said that he thinks as many as 20,000 acres may be seriously affected by the crop-damaging creatures.
