## FERGUSON PUTS STATE VIRTUALLY ON CASH BASIS

Texas virtually went on a cash basis Saturday night and all warrants will be paid at par on presentation to the American National Bank of Austin, announced James E. Ferguson. This is the result of an arrangement made following a conference Saturday evening in the Governor's office by H. A. Wroe, president of the American National Bank and Chairman Eugene Blount of the house committee on appropriations with Ferguson, representing Governor Miriam A. Ferguson.

The State has for the past several months been on a deficit because of lack of funds to the credit of general revenue and members of the Legislature, heads of departments and employes generally have been compelled in most instances to discount their warrants. From now on, however, there will be no more hawking of State warrants, under the arrangement made with the American National Bank, it was announced by Ferguson.

The details of the plan by which warrants will be cashed at par by the Austin bank was not announced.

## FAMOUS FORTS IN U. S. HISTORY

### Grant's "Unconditional Surrender" Note.

"No terms except an unconditional and immediate surrender can be accepted. I propose to move immediately upon your works." That laconic dispatch is famous in American history. Written to Gen. Simon Bolivar Buckner, the Confederate commander at Fort Donelson, Tenn., by Gen. U. S. Grant on February 16, 1862, it gave to the Union commander the nickname of "Unconditional Surrender" Grant. At the opening of the Civil war the Confederates built Fort Donelson on the Cumberland river and Fort Henry on the Tennessee to protect Nashville, the very heart of the Confederacy, from an invasion from the north. Erected on a hill 120 feet above the river, surrounded by two and a half miles of rifle pits and protected on the river side by three great batteries, Fort Donelson with its garrison of 18,000 men was one of the most important posts in the Mississippi valley.

On February 6 Fort Henry fell before the cannon of Commodore Foote's flotilla of gunboats, but when that commander moved to attack Fort Donelson he was speedily repulsed. Meanwhile General Grant had moved against Donelson and for three days a fierce battle raged during which each army lost more than 2,000 men. On February 15 the garrison tried to cut its way through Grant's lines but was driven back into its stronghold.

The next day Buckner sent a message under a white flag asking Grant what terms he would give if the Confederates gave up the fort. Grant's historic reply was the result. When Fort Donelson surrendered the first great Union victory of the war was won and 14,500 gray jackets marched out and laid down their arms, the largest number of men ever captured up to that time in any battle on the American continent. The victors also took possession of 57 pieces of artillery, although one great prize in the persons of Generals Floyd, Pillow and Nathan Bedford Forrest, the dashing cavalry leader, slipped through their hands when these officers escaped across the river.

The surrender of Nashville and Columbus soon followed. Kentucky and Tennessee were now in the hands of the Union forces and Ulysses S. Grant had started on the military career that ended triumphantly at Appomattox.

### SWEETWATER NEGRO PASTOR AND HIS FLOCK GO TO COURT

The outcome of recent hostile activities among deacons and members of the Little Zion Church will be the resignation of the colored pastor with his agreement to leave the city, according to police who

quieted a recent disturbance in the negro section of Sweetwater.

The affair has been the topic of much discussion among colored folks this week following the recent lively deacon's meeting where two negroes were injured, one later paying a fine for affray.

One negro faction appeared before both county and city officials requesting some action in regard to ousting the colored pastor, who, they charged, had attempted to forcibly kiss one of his lady church members. They were in favor of filing a case against him on that charge. The pastor, in turn, threatened to file a charge against the negroes for disturbing public worship, and things were mixed up generally until a compromise was reached.

The latest agreement, it was learned from officers Saturday, was that the membership would pay up their

past dues and the pastor would leave town.—Sweetwater Reporter.

The case of L. C. Riordan on appeal from Tom Green county, was affirmed by the Court of Criminal Appeals last Wednesday.

Riordan was convicted in the District Court of Tom Green county about two years ago on an indictment from Sterling county on a charge of killing T. E. Moon at Sterling City on April 1, 1921. He received a sentence of ten years imprisonment.—Sterling City News-

**FIRST MAP EVER MADE OF TEXAS NOW ON EXHIBIT**

AUSTIN, Jan. 31.—Probably the first map ever made of the State of Texas is now on exhibition in the University of Texas Library. This map is 100 years old, having been made by Stephen F. Austin about 1829. All of the rivers and most of the larger streams in Texas are shown. Heavily timbered districts, plains and regions containing iron and salt deposits are marked on the map.

In Southwest Texas, Austin made the notation: "Prickly pear, and thorny shrubs." Near the Mexican border he wrote: "huge herds of wild horses," and in the Panhandle "immense herds of buffaloes." At one place in Central Texas he wrote, "droves of wild cattle, horses and buffalo."

Although it was not known how many people were in Texas at the time the map was made, it is known that nine years before this time, in 1820, the population of Texas was 2,000. Bexar, now San Antonio, numbered 1,100 and La Bahia had 900.

This map was given to the University as part of the Austin papers by Guy M. Bryan, grandson of Moses Austin. The donation forms a part of the Texas manuscript collection, which is preserved in the archives of the library.

**PEOPLES STATE BANK AT RANGER FAILS TO OPEN**

AUSTIN, Feb. 2.—The Peoples State Bank of Ranger failed to open for business today, Banking Commissioner Charles C. Austin announced. He said records of the banking department show the bank to have been in an insolvent condition for many months. Its continued operation, he declared, meant further inroads into the guaranty fund which had already sustained a heavy loss in this failure.

LAWN.—A new mercantile company will be opened here soon by W. D. Counts who will operate a grocery, dry goods and hardware store in a new brick building now under construction.

ABILENE.—A contract was recently let here for a new ice plant. This plant will be operated entirely by electricity supplied by the West Texas Utilities Company local plant.

HASKELL.—The good roads meeting called off last week on account of the heavy snows was held at noon Thursday, Jan. 29th, at the Magazine club building. A \$600,000 bond issue is proposed.

BARNHART.—The cattle and sheep men report live stock conditions here good and much interest is being taken in wolf proof fencing in that the herding cost is practically nothing and the lamb crop is usually 70 to 80 per cent greater where there is no disturbance from the herder and his dog. 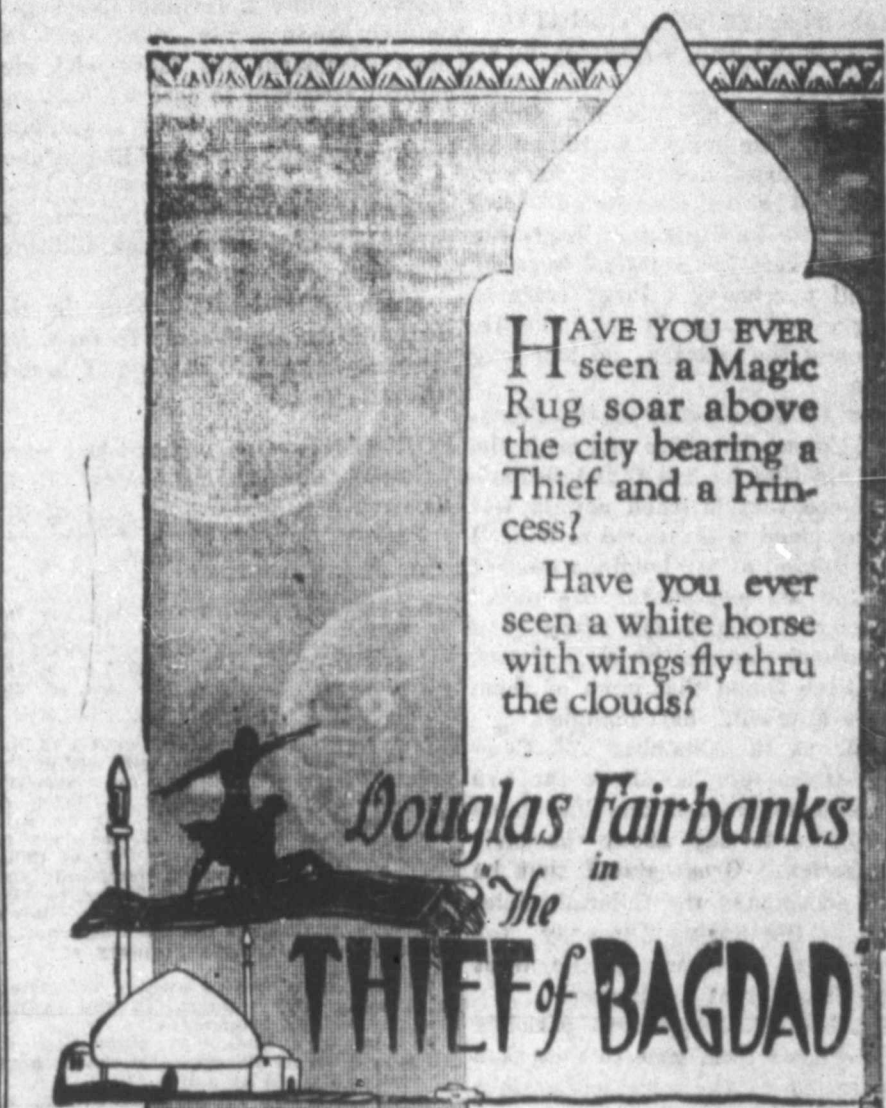

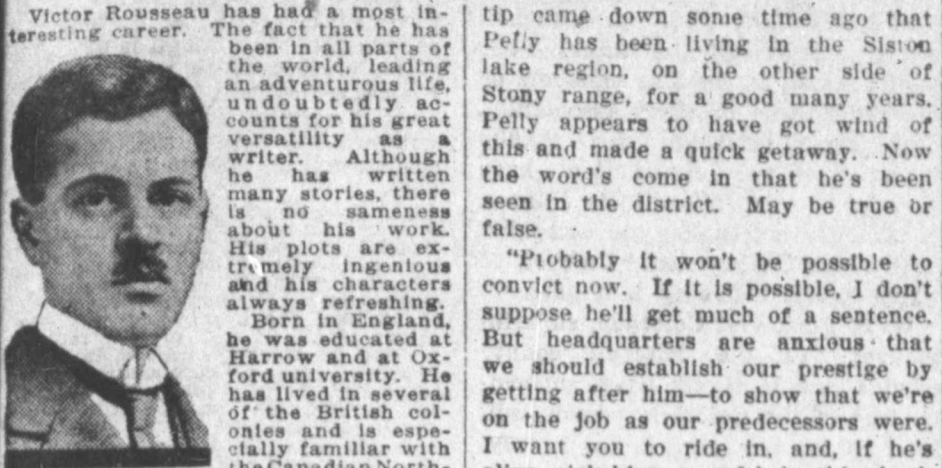

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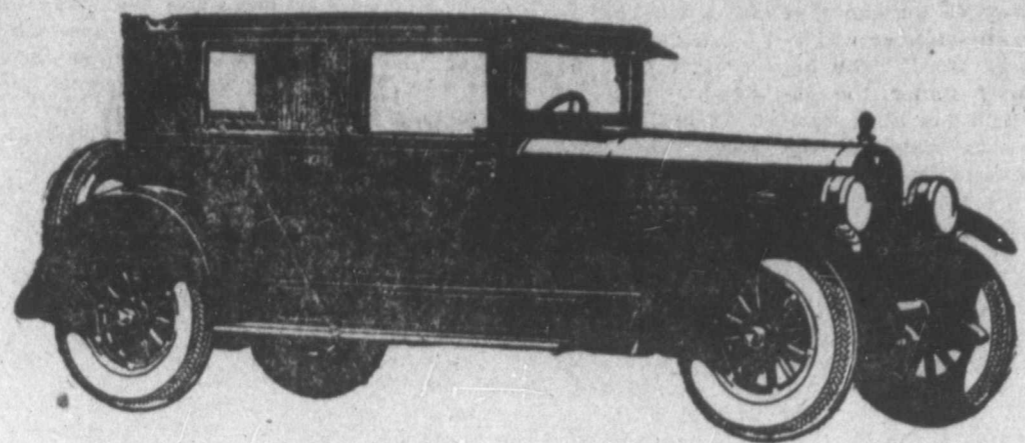

### DOINGS DOWN AT AUSTIN AS REPORTED THIS WEEK

The 39th session of the Texas Legislature now fully organized in starting upon what gives promise of a period of constructive legislation.

It goes without saying that the usual batch of bills will be emptied into the legislative hopper, but it is refreshing to know that in the grinding that is to follow, the chaff is junked; at least there is most hopeful signs that this will happen.

The motto of most of the legislators seems to be "economy." This reads well, but the thought should be added "that all is not gold that glitters."

There is an excuse for the sentiment of economy, but there are reasons for the statement, that all economy is not economics or constructive statesmanship.

The opening sessions of the 39th legislature resounded with eloquent statements to the effect that all needed legislation could be passed within 60 days. But these sentiments begin to pass away before the end of the week. The fact is, Texas is growing more rapidly now than ever before, and it might be added, that with the large number of representatives in the legislature, the increasing business of the State and the varied interests involved, that it will be almost impossible for any legislature as now constituted to give the needed attention to these varying interests in a sixty days session.

Take the appropriations bill along, and it is necessary to give at least days to them, for as is well known, one week is consumed in the complete organization and co-ordination of the houses. So, it can be set down as a certainty that the sessions will last longer than sixty days, and then a special session or two may follow.

### TWO BELOW IN NEW YORK, COLORADO CITIZEN SAYS

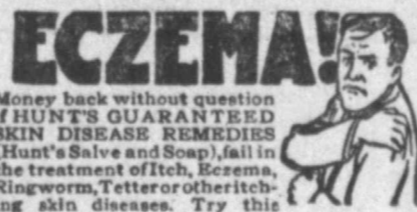
"Clocks stopped in towers:

G. D. Foster, of Colorado, superintendent of the Mitchell county schools, and E. Frank King, superintendent of the Colorado schools, will head up the campaign in the county. Each of the eighteen districts is expected to enroll a minimum of 1000 members.
