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Farm And Ranch Land Prices Up Again In Texas

COLLEGE STATION—Texas farm and ranch land prices reached a record high of \$94 an acre in 1963. This, said Boyd Andrews, Extension resource development specialist at Texas A&M University, was an increase of 10 percent over the average price in 1960.

He added that a recent study by the resource economics section of A&M's Department of Agricultural Economics and Sociology points out other interesting facts. Due to the vast differences in soil types and locations, sale prices ranged from \$20 to over \$1,000 per acre.

While land prices moved upward, the net farm income was declining. Thus requiring a larger investment for a smaller return. A popular view expressed to the study group was that the low net farm income does not justify the existing high land prices, Andrews said.

But a closer look at the dominant sources of demand for agricultural lands may help explain the situation, the specialist added. First, he said, the average net farm income can be misleading. Many farmers and ranchers receive a far greater return than the average indicates. This group is capable of adjusting rapidly to incorporate technological advances and financially able to bid up the price of land to gain a larger

economic sized unit. The strong demand for strictly agricultural land comes almost entirely from this group, Andrews said.

Another important source of demand for agricultural land is from industry and urban developments. In many areas of Texas industry is expanding and using large acreages of agricultural land and pushing prices upward. Urban centers are spreading out and taking up more and more land and highways are also taking their share, the specialist said. These intensive uses of land exert great influence on land prices, the study noted.

A third important source of demand comes from urban dwellers. These buyers are interested in using land for agricultural purposes as well as for homes, week-end farms and for recreation.

These demand sources for land are the dominant forces in the Texas land market and are not expected to change in the near future, Andrews concluded.

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Annual Reports Due From Many Claimants Of SS

Early each year, many people who get social security payments must file an annual report of their earnings for the prior year.

This report in 1965 must be filed by every social security beneficiary who was under age 72 during any part of 1964 and had income of over \$1200 in wages or in profit from his own business. One of the questions on this report is: "Do you expect to earn over \$1200 in 1965?" If so, you show your expected total earnings for 1965.

Many times the estimate shown in January or February is not high enough when a second look is taken in mid-year. If you then think your actual earnings will be more than you at first anticipated, you should get in touch with your social security office. Someone there will be glad

to help you revise your estimate.

You may find that you have already received more benefits than you will be entitled to get for the year and are overpaid. The adjustment of this overpayment need not be made until after the end of the year when you make your next annual report.

March 26 Is Deadline For Feed Grain Signing

Friday, March 26 is the final date to file intentions to participate in the 1965 Feed Grain Program, according to County Office Manager, Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service (A. S. C. S.) Jesse Meredith. He also stated that April 5 is the last day to release peanut acreage that will not be planted.

Meredith reminds producers that winter legumes planted under the 1964 ACP program

must be left on the land until April 15, 1965 before plowing under. Rye cover crop planted for wind erosion control must be left on the land until after the blow season or until the land is prepared for spring planting. Rye or winter legumes planted under ACP program may not be harvested in any manner.

Producers with domestic cotton allotments that are smaller than the effective al-

lotment are reminded that to be eligible to participate in domestic price support payments, intentions must be filed by March 26, 1965. Meredith stated. Producers interested in cost-share on approved conservation practices must file a request before beginning the practice. When the practice is completed, sign and return the application for payment, which will be furnished when practice is approved.
