### **Conditioning the Farm Horse**

been idle or roughing it during the winter months and are not ready for hard, steady work. It is now the season when the pro-gram of many a farm horse is suddenly changed without the preparation that is necessary for flicient service,

On many farms the horses have obtained their winter feed from stalk fields and the straw They come through in a stack. thin condition and need to be put in better flesh before ready for hard work. This is best done by gradually giving the horses in advance a portion of the same ra-tion that is to be fed during the work season.

Whether the horse has been out in the open or standing idly in the barn, a moderate amount of light work preceding the rush season is advisable. The hardening process may be accomplished by changing horses each half day in doing the necessary hauling about the farm preparatory to working in the fields. This will exercise and strengthen the mus-cles without tiring them.

The horse will not perform effi-ciently in an ill-fitting harness. The raw sores that develop are in most instances, to plung-an idle horse suddenly into

heavy work or to the fact that the harness is not properly adjusted It is especially important that the horse collar be of the right kind, shape and size. A well-fitted col-lar does not choke and distributes the draft over the entire shoulder.

During the winter months most farm horses are groomed very little and the long hair of the winthe and the long har of the win-ter coats is a handicap when spring comes. It is best to re-move the old hair at once, by clipping. This is important as it increases the efficiency of the horse. It prevents the extreme sweating and lathering that would otherwise to be placed. otherwise take place as the heavy work goes on and the weather becomes warm.

Due to the fact that the direct farm income is mainly from cat-tie, hogs, or sheep, the care of the farm horse and mule is gener-ally neglected. It should be re-membered that the income from the other classes of live stock depends upon the crops that the farm produces; and the horse furnishes the power that makes farm oper-ations possible. More care for the work horse will in the end effect a saving and increase the efficiency on many farms. Be fair to the horse, by doing the things that will give him a good chance to give his best during the present


"A careful man' I ought to be, A little fellow follws me. I do not care to go astray For fear he'll go the self sameway

"The bravest battle that e'er was fought!


Shall I tell you where and when? On the maps of the world you will find it not-

ROBBERY. There are different kinds of robbery. To rob a person with fire arms is a penitentiary offense. To rob by entering a closed house is also a grave offense. But to take that which does not belong to one's self and appropriate it to one's own use is also a serious offense. For a banker to misappropriate funds gets him in bad. For an official to do likewise gets his bondsmen in trouble. For a person to sell mortgaged property lays himself liable to the demands of the law. Many are giving "cold checks" and some are paying the penalty for so doing. There is another kind of dishonesty that but few people think much about. It is the everyday use of what we earn. Many spend it on dress, pleasure, or otherwise. It is all right to spend our money as we want to but before we do that there is a higher consideration we should regard. Hear what God says: "Will a man rob God? You say how do we rob God? God says: You rob me by withholding from my services the tenth of ALL you make and then by not making free will offerings to my work." Then God says ye are cursed with a curse. For ye have robbed me. The curse is the penalty for robbing God. Then God says: "Bring ye ALL the tithes and put them in the Church Treasury and I will rebuke the devourer for your sakes." God asks us to prove to Him with our tithe and see if He, will not pour us out a blessing there will not be room to receive. The fruits of your ground will not be destroyed Your fruit shall not shed before its time. Then, he says, all nations shall call you blessed. Why all this? Simply because folks are willing to honor God with what they possess. Does it not make your heart sick to see professed Christians spending all they make on dress and social affairs, and good times, when they are giving about 3 per cent instead of 10 per cent to the Lords cause? Some may say that it does not pay to be liberal with the church with their money as they see some of the most stingy people the most prosperous. Yes, that is what God is talking about when He says: "Fret not thyself because of evil doers for they shall soon be cut off." We don't get all our blessings for serving the Lord in this world. We are commanded to honor the Lord with our substance. He says he loves a liberal person. One that is hilarious in his giving to God. Sometimes it is worth the amount to collect it from some supposedly good church people. If the churches of today would follow the Bible way of finances there would be meat and to spare. God knew how much it would take to run His business and that is why He made such a large program financially. You note in the New Testament the early church spent ten days in a prayer meeting. The next thing you note is they were having a mighty revival of religion and many souls were being saved. The next thing you note is this same church was having all things in common. They had brought all their money and turned it over to the apostles for mission purposes. Whenever you can get a fellow full of the religion of Christ it is not hard to get his money. But whenever the spiritual tank begins to run low some folks begin to dry up financially. That is natural. That is why the Lord wants us to stay well tanked up spiritually. It is rather difficult to do anything rehgiously when we are down and out spiritually. We cannot do much good at praying or soul winning. That is why some folks don't care for the worship of the Lord's house. They are so far down spiritually they have no real desire to worship God. Some thing else does better and satisfies better, too. What a pity we have to stay down and suffer the sad, hurtful results of disobiedience to God. He calls us upward and outward. If the pestilences are hurting us let us all come to recognize God's rightful claims and get in touch with him by doing what we should do as Christians. Remember the money question is one of the big questions in the Bible.



One of his statements is that the real battle of the Adobe Walls occurred in 1864, when a force of United States soldiers, under Kit Karson, successfully routed the redskins, although outnumbered ten to one. That was the real battle he rieterates, and not the attack by 200 Indians in June, 1874, on twentyeight buffalo hunters and traders, although the latter scrimmage was a warm affair.


The Reynolds Well is now down below the 1500-foot level. Everything is going nicely at this well. The drill of the Kanawha Angelo


