Ringling Lake

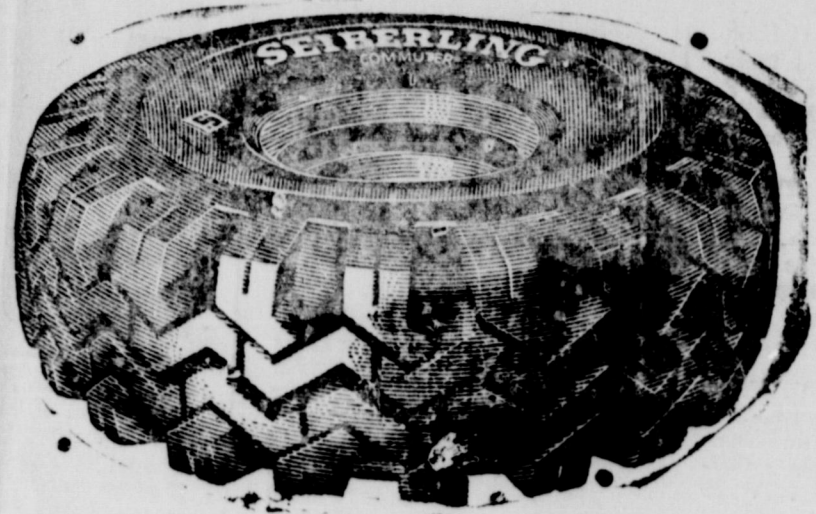

Mr. D. G. Fambrough referred us to the late Boyce House's book, "Were You in Ranger?" which details the account of the "railroad boom" — "... there were no less than five railroads actually under construction in the oil fields, and four others were in the preliminary stage (in the booming county)" . . . The book offers some good history too on town lot sales at "Breck-walker," "Leeray," and "Jakehamon."
