



THE STIGMA OF IATAN FLAT. An Editoial.

Iatan Flat has for a long time been a handicap to traffic over the Bankhead Highway through Mitchell County in rainy weather, and the Record has on numerous occasions undertaken to show the people wherein the damage to our city and county lies in the toleration of this condition, but the recent rains have served to bring the matter to our attention more forcibly than ever before. Last week hundrdes of automobiles were marooned on the Bankhead Highway west of Colorado, and traffic was at a standstill for sometime. Of course, such rains as fell Friday night seldom fall in this section, and could not be expected to do anything less than tie up traffic, but it was not this rain that we refer to. The light showers we have had for the past 10 days are the ones that tied up so much traffic, because people thought the roads would be fairly good going and therefore tackled them, with the result that hundreds of citizens from other counties and States are "cussing" Mitchell County and spreading the bad news for this county all over the country. They are saying things about this county and the towns in this county that are calculated to hurt in the future development and we believe will hurt unless something is done to put our part of this great national highway in passable condition at most all

In speaking of this last week the Big Spring Herald

"Between six and seven hundred folks had reason to "cuss" Intan Flat Monday afternoon on account of the highway being blocked for hours by a flood of water, following a heavy shower.

"Two hundred and forty-seven automobiles were tice up at that point between 3 o'clock Monday afternoon and 10 o'clock Monday night, waiting to get across the "draw," "slough," "creek," "river" or whatever you care to call it-but most of the crowd used harsher names in describing it.

"The shower which started at 2:45 p. m. continued for two and one-half hours, and there was no crossing the draw until the flood waters went down. When the water did get sufficiently low it was found that there was about two feet of mud and sand in the road, and it was necessary to hire teams to pull the automobile across the bad stretch. Auto owners paid from \$1 to \$5 to be towed across this place, according to report,

"Of course we don't have the rains very often but when we do we can expect to hear complaints from autoists who are compelled to cross Iatan Flat.

"There is nothing we can do to remedy conditions at latan Flat, except to offer advice, because it is in Mitchell County. Mitchell County voters have turned down the bit too hasty. several bond issues which were intended to overcome just such obstacles as Iatan Flat, and give that county a fine system of highways. Until those opposing the road improvement campaign in that county are induced to change their mind, Iatan Flat will be a knock for Mitchell County and for the Bankhead Highway.

of Texas would consent to change also, and a resolution was passed urging the other districts to make this change.

Resolutions of thanks were extended the local church and the citizens of Colorado for the royal way delegates were entertained.

An elaborate plan of work was adopted by the convention and the delegates left Colorado with considcrable enthusiasm for the future outlook in their work. The plan of work outlined was as follows:

1. Evangelism-In harmony with the home department of the U. C. M. S., and in accord with our custom, we urge that each and every church conduct special evangelistic services during the year; that each church loan its minister for a missionary meeting either in a needy field or some pastorless church, and that the proceeds, after expenses are paid, be devoted as a special offering for additional district work: that hearty co-operation be given district superintendents and pastor-evangelists of the state society; that all evangelistic efforts be so extended as to in clude the Bible School and Young People's department-all to the end of securing a minimum of 15 per cent net gain in each church.

2. Literature-The use of graded Literature in all Bible Schools; stressing the claim of the Christian Courier and of the World Call; the free use of tracts on The Church, the Restoration Movement, Stewardship

3. Educational-Cooperation with our two Junior Colleges and with T. C. U. in their worthy efforts to train our thys and frirls; a leadership training program in every Church District Standard Training School; the observance of "Special Days" and program as suggested by the Missionary training for our children, with the use of the King's Builders in organizations and homes,

4. Financial - (a) An adequate financial program for each Church, receive the five-yard penalty, both for local work and for Missions Education and Benevolences.

HOW ENDLESS CHAIN SELLING PLANS ARE USED TO ROB SAVERS

W. R. Morehouse Continues His Exposures of Modern "Gold Brick" Schemes-American Bankers Association Official Tells How Life-Time Savings Are Wiped Out.

FIRMLY believe that promoters and high-pressure salesmen are becoming more and more crafty. Shrewder ways are being resorted to in order to trap the novice investor. It is

deplorable that the investor does not profit by experience and is victimized a second time in his endeavor to recover that which he has already lost. It is the old, old story of trying to recover, but in the attempt losing. This very hour thou-sands of hard-earned dollars have slipped from the grasp of the calloused hands that earned them into the clutches of unscrupulous skin-game artists. 

TORRENTIAL RAIN FRIDAY CAUSES HEAVY DAMAGES Colorado Stores Flooded;

Streets and Roads Badly Washed

Rainfall in almost the proportion of a cloudburst fell at Colorado last Friday night, the precipitation dura ing Friday afternoon and night registering 8.31 inches, the heaviest recorded in Colorado for 20 years.

Colorado downtown business sec tion was flooded, from four to six inches of water rising in the store building on Second and Walnut Streets, resulting in several hundred dollars damage to the stocks. Damage reported is as follows:

Mrs. B. F. Mills, ladies' toggery, \$600; Pond & Merritt, haberdashers, \$200; Star Cash Grocery, \$25; Dr. C. H. Lane's office, \$50; Cook's Home: Bakery, \$25; Gordon's Confectionery, \$100; Hurd's Bakery, \$25; Smith's barber shop, slight damage; Lambert's gin, roof caved in, \$300; T. & P. Railroad tracks washed out, \$500. The new high school building saw seven feet of water in the cellar and the pressroom of the Colorado Record was flooded, but no damage entailed.

Morgan Creek was turned into a caring torrent and Saturday afternoon was five feet over the bridge on the Bankhead Highway west of Colorado, Traffic on the Bankhead Highway was held up for several nours. Several head of stock belong ing to George Callan were slightly injured and a number of other stock being forced to remain in the water for more than 12 hours after being caught in the rising flood. No losses of stock have been reported.





ple and events. She is democratic, tactful and diplomatic, and her friends who have had opportunity to know the part she played in the campaign, declare she has the indefinable "political intuition," which goes far toward straightening out the tangles to pub-

Mrs. Moody's friends say, too, that she is peculiarly fitted to preside as First Lady of Texas, by the charm of sincerity and "naturalness" under the trying circumstances that the Governor and the Governor's wife are "on parade" as it were always, that every word and act is followed with eager, even if justifiable, curiosity and interest because of the important station in public life the individuals hold.

"She's a born Governor's wife," an Austin woman commented.

There aren't extensive statistics on the ages of the women who have bossed the Governor's mansion. So far as known, Mrs. Moody will probably be the youngest woman who ever presided there just as Dan Moody will be the youngest chief executive of the State.



The addition to the huge motor dant at Flint is now well under way. New machinery for making cylinders, cam shafts and small parts is arriving daily and extensive enlarge ments are being made at the Flin sheet metal division. A building 200 feet long by 134 feet wide is under construction to increase production at the Toledo transmission plant. En largement of the heat treat depart ment of the Bay City small parts plant will provide additional facili-

In Detroit the building known a General Motors Truck Company plant No. 7 has been purchased for manufacturing axles and small parts and will be merged with the gear and axle plant.

New buildings and the crection of 37 steam forging hammers at the Detroit forge plant will make this plant one of the largest forging centers in the United States,

Chevrolet factories at Cincinnati, Janesville and St. Louis will be extensively enlarged under the program. Fisher body plants at these cities are to be augmented, providing manufacturing facilities for 750, models. A proportionate increase in 000 closed bodies and 250,000 open employes will follow the completion of these plant additions,

Appropriations approximating \$17 500,000 will become available September 1 for the support of the state government for the year ending August 31, 1927.

All unexpended appropriations for this fiscal year will revert to the general revenue fund with the closing of books August 31, 1926.

Gov. Miriam A. Ferguson has authorized this fiscal year more than \$2,000,000 in deficiencies. Appropriations to cover these deficiencies may be made at the special session of the legislature convening September 13. More than \$6,000,000 will be available September 1 for support of educational institutions, and \$3,291, 431 for the various state depart-

> Values of Cotton Contest Told. "Co-operative marketing has made great strides in Texas and in the whole country, but economical production of crops has lagged. The Dallas News and the Semi-Weekly Farm News in the "More Cotton on Fewer Acres" contest in conjunction with the extension service of the Texas A. & M. College, have tried to get at the problem through arousing interest among farmers by offering \$10,000 in prizes for highest yields of staple cotton on five acres of land. When such a system becomes statewide it will undoubtedly bring with it greater prosperity on the farm. Toraise cotton at a loss is the usual lot of the Texas farmer. When it cost him 25 cents a pound to raise and he sells it for 20 cents or less he loses money. Men in the News cotton contest have raised their cotton on five acres at so small a cost as 3 to 5 cents a pound. They also are living at home, which is another factor which must be taken into consideration if the farmers are to make money generally.

"Quit swapping cotton dollars for grain, feed and food which every farm can and should produce. The problem is just that simple in the last analysis, but the farmers are not all sold to the idea. The contest will convince the most skeptical farmer that the way to profit from cotton is through economic production by in

creasing the per acre yield. "If he markets his cotton through the Farm Bureau he is sure to have recognition of his staple length and character of his lint as well as grade. That is the way cotton should be sold, not on the round market which so many country markets provide.

"We believe in efficiency on the farm. Let us make cotton a clean cash crop, by first raising a living at home. That method has undoubted advantages over the old system of trying to make a living from cotton
