Most of the Eastland County steers were in the lightweight class. Placings in this class were: Reggie Underwood 10th, Sandy Warlick 12th, Cynthia Housel 14th and 15th, Carter Housel 24th, and Mike Farnsworth 25th. There were 45 steers in each class.

In the pen of three steers fed under supervision of one County Agent or Agriculture Teacher, Eastland County placed 4th. These calves were shown by Cynthia Housel, Reggie Underwood, and Sandy Warlick and were fed under supervision of the Assistant County Agent, Bill McCutchen.

Mr. McCutchen praised the 4-H youngsters for their sportsmanship and showmanship and stated that they were not disappointed in the placings as the calves are being fed toward the local county show and the Houston show. He explained that most of the calves were not quite ready. Seven out of the ten from Eastland County were entered in the lightweight class.

## Site-Tour of County Is Feb. 4 EC-65 Seminar

The next seminar for EC-65 will be held on Thursday, February 4, beginning in Cisco and continuing in area towns before concluding with lunch and a briefing session in Rising Star, according to the Texas Industrial Commission.

EC-65, the pilot program for industrial development, is sponsored by leaders from Eastland County in cooperation with the Texas Industrial Commission.

This third seminar in a series of five so called "Plant Sites," a panel of experts from around the state will visit various sites in each community throughout the county and then hold a critique on how to improve and sell the properties to manufacturing companies.

The group will meet in Cisco at the Chamber of Commerce office at 8:30 a. m. on February 4. They will board a bus which is being provided by Cisco Junior College and then visit sites in Cisco, Eastland, Ranger, Gorman, and Rising Star. They will have lunch in Rising Star at the American Legion Hall and hold their briefing session there.

Anyone who wishes to join the tour in any town may do so.

The first two sessions were called "Community Betterment" and "Research and Analysis." The fourth and fifth seminars will be held in Gorman and Cisco on the subjects "Industrial Financing" and "How to Find Prospects." There is a possibility that Governor John Connally will attend the last seminar, according to a county spokesman.

Three experts on industrial property will participate in the seminar. They are:

Robert L. Shaw, representative of Watson and Watson Industrial Realtors of Dallas and a member of the American Society of Industrial Realtors;

Homer Tanner, manager of the Brownwood Chamber of Commerce; and

H. L. Vinet, Assistant Director of Industrial Development for the Texas and Pacific Railroad.

The panel of experts, Industrial Commission staff members, and local EC-65ers will board the bus in Cisco which is being loaned by Cisco Junior College.

### Farm Statistics Being Updated In Census Program

The 1964 Census of Agriculture, now being conducted by the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce, in Eastland County, will bring up to date the farm and ranch statistics last collected in 1959.

Here are a few of the many facts recorded in the 1959 agriculture census for this county:

There were 1,347 farms and ranches in 1959, compared with 1,681 in 1954. The average size of farm and ranch was 362.5 acres in 1959, compared with 285.5 acres in 1954.

The value of products sold by the county's farmers and ranchers was \$1,692,481. The value of all livestock and livestock products sold was \$3,961,212.

The 1964 national Census of Agriculture is the 18th in a series which began in 1840.

Because of the rapid changes American agriculture has been undergoing in recent years, Census Bureau officials regard the current census as one of the most significant ever taken. They ask every farmer and rancher to cooperate in compiling an accurate record of these changes by filling out the census form he receives in the mail and holding the completed questionnaire until a census taker calls for it.

### No Increase In Social Security Tax Rates Seen

"There has been no increase in the social security tax rate for employees, employers, and the self-employed for 1965," R. R. Tuley, Jr., district manager of social security in Abilene, stated today. The rate continues at 3 1/2 per cent of an individual's annual earnings up to \$4800 for employer and employee alike, and 5.4 per cent on net earnings up to that amount for the self-employed, he said.

Tuley explained that he was stressing this point at this time because in some sections of the country questions were being asked at social security offices about "the new tax rate for 1965," with the inquirers asserting that they had read about a change in rate in certain business publications.

"The source of many of the misconceptions has been traced to several privately produced leaflets outlining a number of proposed amendments to the social security law which were considered by Congress in 1964 but not enacted. The leaflets were sent out in sample lots to prospective bulk purchasers while the legislation was still under consideration.

"The failure of the legislation to pass the Congress should have ended all interest in these publications, and in most cases it did. However, at several widely-scattered locations these leaflets, which mentioned a proposed social security tax increase for 1965, were understood to mean that the proposed changes had been made. This was evidently why people began asking for more details," he said.

## Browsing With Bev

A potted plant makes a lovely gift for a person in the hospital, a gracious hostess or a birthday girl. They also take special care. Florist plants are grown in greenhouses. They are used to conditions there, so for best results they should continue to receive regulated light, heat and water.

A few of the more popular gift plants are listed below with their desired growing conditions:

**Azaleas** — Keep azaleas in diffused sunlight. They do best at temperatures of 55 to 60 degrees F. Water frequently.

**Chrysanthemums** — Potted chrysanthemums like full sunlight, temperatures between 60 and 70, and lots of water.

Alaska, as well as Continental United States, is divided into four standard time zones.

Most potted mums are not satisfactory for later planting outdoors. Some new varieties, however, are. Ask your florist.

**Cinerarias** — Place them in a sunny window. They like temperatures from 50 to 60 degrees F. and frequent watering. Discard plant when the flowers are gone.

**Cyclamen** — Flowers last about 2 weeks if the temperature is kept at 70, longer at 50 to 55 degrees F. Never let water stand in the crown of the plant flower shoots and bases of leaves rot easily.

**Hydrangeas** — Provide abundant water and moderate light. After the plant has bloomed, cut it back to several internodes and repot.

## Browsing With Bev

If you're one of those impatient souls who can't wait for spring-time — though winter is just beginning — you can rush the season a bit by forceblooming shrubs inside your home.

Flowering quince, forsythia, pussywillow and thunberg spirea are easily forced into bloom in mid-winter. So are peach, apple, pear, plum and cherry branches. Cuttings from most of these may be made any time after January 1. For apples and pears, it's best to wait a little longer — probably until February.

Select branches which have many large flower buds. Cut the stems, remove bottom inch of bark and pound the base of the stem with a hammer to give good contact for water uptake. Place stems in a warm (110 F) water bath and allow to cool naturally to room temperature and then remain in the water for 24 hours. Cover top with moistened burlap or with a plastic bag.

Place the branches in a vase of water and keep them in the sunlight at 65 to 75 degrees F. (Branches forced in the dark develop very little color.)

Scrub base of branches often and replace water frequently. Use a flower preservative in the water.

Expect blossoms in 2 or 3 weeks.

## Big Quantity Of Beef, Chicken Given Schools

Texas schools participating in the national school lunch program have been allotted 8,022,000 lbs. of frozen beef and 2,490,000 lbs. of frozen chicken bought by the U. S. Department of Agriculture during 1964.

This represents Texas' share of the 51.9 million lbs. of chicken and 178.5 million lbs. of frozen beef purchased to help schools meet protein requirements for lunches served under the school lunch program, explains John J. Slaughter, area food distribution director of USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service.

The allotments will provide about 1½ servings of beef per child per week, and 7½ servings of chicken per child during this school year.

Around 3,320 schools operated cafeterias under the national school lunch program in 1964 — the largest single feeding operation in the state. These cafeterias feed nearly 30 percent of the students enrolled in elementary and high schools.

Under the program, USDA contributes cash and foods accounting for about one-fifth of the cost. Children's meal payments make up around 60 percent of the cost and local and state sources pay the remaining 20 percent.

The State Education Agency will allocate the beef and chicken among Texas schools participating in the national school lunch program and the State Department of Public Welfare will make distribution.

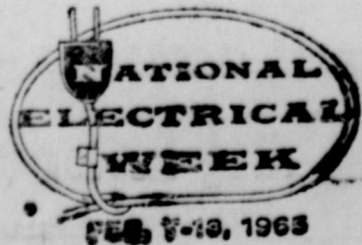
