### CJC Starts 3 New Programs

Young people, including high school drop-outs and others who have not been able to finish high school, will be offered an opportunity to "work their way through college" by the Technical-Vocational School of Cisco Junior College when the spring semester begins Feb. 1.

Three new full-time programs will be inaugurated by the technical - Vocational School of CJC on Feb. 1, and the college has tentative approval for 100 campus jobs under the new Federal College Work-Study Program of G. C. Hogue.

The new courses are Industrial Drafting Technology, Industrial Engine Technology, and Industrial Welding Technology. Associate in Science Degrees will be awarded upon completing the two-year programs.

Eligible for the courses under the EOA program are students or individuals at least 15 years of age with a high school education or the equivalent. School drop-outs or those who have not been able to continue their high school education will be ac-

### 9 Men To Get Army Physicals During February

Due to be called for pre-induction Army examinations in Eastland County during February are nine men, five of whom are regular registrants and four 18-year-olds, according to the local Board of Selective Service; however, none of these are scheduled for induction.

The tests for 18-year-olds are the result of President Johnson's action in 1964, which ordered the Director of Selective Service and the Secretary of Defense to examine all newly registered men who are out of school and available for service. Males married at age 18, and those known to be in school at that age will not be examined, according to a report received from William B. Sinclair, Lt. Col., USAF.

### Sig Faircloth New Head Of West Texas Cutting Horse Group

Sig Faircloth of Carbon, well known Eastland County ranchman and pioneer livestock auction market operator, was elected president of the West Central Texas Cutting Horse Assn. at the 8th annual meeting held at Sweetwater Saturday.

The membership meeting of the organization, first established back in 1957, was held in connection with the cutting finals of the year, during which the grand and reserve champion cutting horses of the association for the year were named.

Faircloth, who established the first high bid livestock market in this area back in the 1930s, is co-owner of the Ranger Livestock Auction, U. S. Highway 80 east.

Other officers of the WCTCHA are Robert Herring of Miles, first vice president, and Boley Cotten of Woodson, secretary.

L. W. Bevan of Gordon was

one of the eight new directors elected during the Saturday meeting.

A total of 153 horses worked in the four classes Saturday, including 17 in the novice-novice, 54 in the open, 44 in the AA novice, and 38 in the novice.

An estimated 90 per cent of the horses in the open class will compete in the cutting event at Odessa this week. The horses and riders competed for \$2,530 in cash here Saturday.

Third place winner in the novice-novice class was Big Wimpy, owned by L. W. Bevan and ridden by Buddy Blue, of Gordon. Royal Lad, owned by L. R. Pearson of Ranger placed sixth in that division.

### Legion Opposes Closing Two VA Posts, Hospital

AUSTIN — The Veterans Administration's disclosure that it will close two regional offices and one hospital in Texas, comes as a shock to The American Legion, according to Department Commander Lewis W. Emerich of Houston.

Under the plan the VA offices in Lubbock and San Antonio and the McKinney Hospital will be closed, effective June 30.

At its State Convention in San Antonio last year, the Legion adopted a resolution asking for additional beds in the McKinney Hospital due to the long waiting lists. More beds are needed, not less. These patients cannot be transferred to the Dallas VA Hospital, for they are already extremely overcrowded with a long waiting list. Closing of McKinney will cost the north Texas area 312 sorely needed beds, and will further tax the facilities at Dallas.

The American Legion fails to see how money can be saved in consolidating the San Antonio VA Office with Houston and the Lubbock office with Waco, Emerich added. "Does the VA realize how far it is from Amarillo or El Paso to Waco? The extra costs to the government in travel and per diem would offset any savings realized by putting employees out of work."

The closing of these facilities will eliminate jobs for about 600 trained people. These will be thrown into the labor market, thus increasing unemployment.

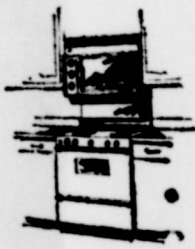

**Issuance Lagging Behind Schedule**

AUSTIN — Col. Homer Garrison, director of the Department of Public Safety, has encouraged Texas motorists to "start the new year with a safe vehicle" by securing the 1965 vehicle inspection sticker without further delay.

"The inspection stickers for 1965 have been available since September 1," Garrison said, "allowing ample time for all vehicles to be inspected without delay prior to the deadline. There can be no extension of the deadline and vehicles not displaying the new sticker will be in violation of the law after April 15."

There are 14 public inspection stations and one fleet station in Eastland County. Carl Boustead of Eastland, Motor Vehicle Inspection Patrolman, has announced.

They are:  
Gorman: Smith Brothers Chevrolet; Rising Star; Butler Motor Co.; Cisco: Rutherford Chevrolet, Graham Motor Co., Huffman Motor Co., and Booth's Garage; Eastland: Allen Auto Repair, Hood King Motor Co., Muirhead Motor Co., City Garage, and Fullen Motor Co.; Ranger: Anderson Chevrolet Co., Crawford's Garage and Mission Garage.

Territory covered by Boustead includes Eastland, Callahan, Stephens, Shackelford, Brown, Coleman and part of Taylor counties.

Patrolman Boustead urged county residents to have their vehicles inspected early for their own convenience as well as the inspection stations, to avoid the last-minute rush.

Texas now has more than 5,200 authorized inspection stations over the state. Ac-motorists may expect to find cording to Garrison, these stations are ready and capable of handling the remaining un-inspected vehicles without delay provided vehicle owners do not wait until just a few days before the deadline.

Farmers Unions resolutions were passed by the State Board or Directors at the State Convention which was held in November, according to President Claude Fuller.

Some of these resolutions are:

1. The Union is opposed to making any changes in the peanut program which would cause marketing quotas to be stated in terms of pounds and or bushels.

2. The Union recommends that a research program between the USDA, State Experiment Station, and growers be initiated, which will emphasize efforts to remedy serious peanut production diseases and to improve peanut harvesting methods.

3. Recommends that the Agricultural research Service, USDA, State Department of Agriculture and the State Experiment Station work cooperatively toward more uniform methods of testing seed germination, and that more effective ways of supervising and controlling these tests be established.
