TABERNACLE TO HEAR NOTED EVANGELIST

Services Continue Until May 8 or Possibly Longer; Music Good

INTEREST IS INCREASING

52,800 Church Additions Under Ministry Of Rev. Starnes

The Baptist revival campaign which was started at Union Tabernacle Sunday, April 17, under leadership of the pastor, Rev. D. Wilson Morgan, and has been attracting considerable attention, was turned over to the Starnes Evangelistic party of Waco, Monday night, and is gaining in interest daily. The party is composed of V. B. Starnes, evangelist, K. D. Turner, song leader, and Miss Alice McKnight, pianist.

The services will continue all next week, including Sunday, May 8th, according to announcement made Thursday morning. Services are be ing held each evening at 8 o'clock, and from 10 to 11 a. m. on Tuesday Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. No morning services are held Satur day and Monday.

Evangelist Starnes is said to be one of the strongest preachers in the country. He has been preaching eleven years and the past seven years have been devoted to evangelistic work. Up to the beginning of 1927, 52,800 people had been added to the church under his ministry. He started preaching one week after his conversion, which occurred when he was 23 years of age. He spent four years in college, doing preaching in spare time, before entering the evangelistic work exclusively.

A total of nine evangelistic campaigns have been held in Waco, home city of the evangelist, and each of these proved very successful.

Thursday night the subject will be: "The Two Most Deadly Demons in Town." Friday night he will speak on "The Naked Truth About a Naked Devil." GEORGE LACKEY -DIES FROM WOUND RECEIVED TUESDAY

SHOTS FROM OFFICIALS PROVE FATAL TO SWEETWATER

George Lackey of Sweetwater who was shot Tuesday afternoon by Scurry county officials at liquor cache about midway be tween Colorado and Snyder, died at the Colorado Sanitarium Wednesday afternoon at 6:17 o'clock from the effects of the wounds He died without making a state-

One bullet entered his back, piercing a kidney and passing out through the abdomen. He will be buried Thursday afternoon at Hilton, south of Sweetwater. He is survived by his wife and parents

Information by Farmer According to Sheriff Brows field's version he was notified or Monday morning by a farmer that liquor was hidden under the bank of a creek near the Celorado river, in the edge of Scurry county, about midway between Snyder and Colorado. He and his deputies went to the scene Monday afternoon, inspected the liquor, and secreted themselves in brush near

"Two men came to the cache Tuesday morning, armed with Winchesters and pistols. When they had surveyed the immediate vicinity they departed, returning at about 1 p. m. in a motor truck, which they stopped nearby. They then hired a wagon and team from a farmer, drove to the cache and, laying their arms aside began loading the wagon and hauling the booze to the truck, which could not be driven down to the creek bank," Sheriff Brownfield said.

Watch Procedure After watching this procedur for a short time the officers ros from their hiding place and ordered them to throw up their hand: telling the men that they had the advantage of them and admonish ing them not to resist. Instead they are reported by the officers to have attempted to get their guns, and were fired upon.
