COLORADO "ACES"

ARE SUCCESSFUL IN BREAKING RECORD Having broken all previous en-

durance records, the "Exclamation Mark" which took off last Tuesday morning at 10:33 in the show window of John L. Doss drug store to make an effort to break the record set by the "Question Mark" "landed" Monday night at 8:20, after 153 hours, 42 minutes and 15 seconds in the air. This record was three hours and

two minutes more than that of the "Question Mark." The candle, around whose base the string holding the plane in the air was tied. burned down immediately before 8:20, and the plane, with its "famous aces," began to glide to earth, figuratively speaking. Lieut. Corley Bozeman co-pilot

was at the controls when the plane landed. Capt. Maurice Terrell, chief pilot, was at that post when the plane took off on its record flight. He and Lieut. Bozeman were relieved at intervals by Lieut. Tom Hughes, also a co-pilot. Major Ed Majors was in command of the ship, and M. Foster was official cranker.

None of the valiant crew appeared much the worse for their long hours in the air when the plane landed, and all five modestly refused to be fussed over and made heroes of.

The crew learned when they came to earth that Mutt and Jeff set out in a plane also called "The Exclamation Mark," to set an endurance record. They made em phatic statements that they named their own plane without any sug gestion from Bud Fisher, the Mutt and Jeff eartoonist.

Webster, a son of Senator Flanaghan, was born in Cloverport, Kentucky, on June 9, 1832, received a liberal education, studied law and was admitted to the bar in 1851. He became a prominent politician. In 1865 he was made judge of the 5th Judicial district of Texas. He was elected to the State constitutional convention in 1859, and in 1871 he became lieutenant governor of the State, an office which his father had held in 1869. He was chairman of the republican convention which met in Philadelphia in 1872. He served as a member of the Texas senate until 1875. In 1880 he was a Texas member of the "Grant guard" at the Chicago convention. He was a delegate to the Chicago convention of 1884 and supported General Arthur, who appointed him collecter of internal revenue for the 4th district of Texas in 1884, which office he held for a year, and thereafter devoted himself to his stock farm, introducing fine horses and Jersey cattle into the State. From 1876 to 1880 Webster Flanaghan was president of the Henderson and Overton railroad.






