"From end of the war until 1926, the cattle business was not profitable for many feeders and ranchers of West Texas, as well as all other sections of the country. In the process of getting their business readjusted from a war to a peacetime basis, they have had to liquidate their cattle on a large scale, and many of them have been forced to withdraw from the business altogether.

"From a profits standpoint, the outlook for the cattle raiser is much improved. The period of liquidation has run its course. As Victim Buried LAMESA, Feb. 9 .-- J. A. Cox shot







East Colorado is becoming thickly populated and Broadway of America-or Bankhead highway-and there is no safety zone or walk provided on that structure for pedestrians. The bridge is barely wide enough for two cars, and when automobiles meet there, which is frequently the case, the man, woman or child walking across has to stop and hug the railing on the side or get cun over.

Parents in East Colorado deem this crossing so danzerous that they are afraid to send their children to town for purchases in the stores and either take time school children crossing this bridge find themselves in constant danger from reckless auto drivers, leaving thei. parents in constant dread for their safety.

This is a matter of "Safety First" that should have he attention of the proper officials and pushed to 4 apid relief. Colorado cannot afford to endanger the ives of its cast side residents for the sake of a few doiars that it would cost to provide a foot path on each side of the bridge.

### SOUTHERN FARMERS SHOULD REJOICE

The announcement that Secretary Jardine of the Inited States Department of Agriculture will retire to private life is welcome news to the Southern farmers, or the planters of cotton generally. President Hoover will teristics which bespeak great it least receive the thanks of the South for not insisting on Secretary Jardine's staying in the cabinet.

During the early part of the cotton season there was nuch dissatisfaction expressed regarding the manipulaion of cotton production reports from the Agricultural Department, and resolutions were offered in Congress 'or an investigation. While the reports showed a crop hortage that caused increase of prices, the secretary

vould issue a later statement, optimistic in tone, that yould again cause prices to fall.

It is believed throughout the South that these reports ost to the farmers millions of dollars in early production. It is even estimated that the farmers of Mitchell county hould have received \$100,000 more for their cotton if he early estimates had been properly worded.

However, the Wall Street Journal, pointing out that 'armers themselves can not avoid responsibility for the insatisfactory condition of the cotton market from their wn standpoint, insofar as this unsatisfactory condition is 'ue to overproduction. The Journal says the average rice this year means a profit for cotton farmers only in Vest Texas, where the staple can be grown cheap. Here 3 a direct warning to the older cotton growing regions thich should not go unheeded. Continued overproducion, or at best the kind of production control which looks ack upon the record of the last year rather than upon he probable demands for cotton for the coming year, just inevitably increase the economic pressure against Il cotton growers. But the point is that this pressure will be felt more keenly and will become unbearable in

the less favored regions of the cotton belt where production costs are high. This year, in all likelihood, more acres of virgin land will be put to cotton production in West Texas, where cotton can be raised at a profit at vay to Colorado to attend the funeral of Mrs. F. B. 


