Its principal great-ness lies in the fact that through its use of an agricultural product as raw material for manufacturing, it has brought permanent prosperity to bundreds of thousands of farmers in other states. Today, in that central section of Texas, within the trading area of Waco, more than 2,000 Texas farmers are getting ready for the program of intensive milk production which is to deliver a constant flow of cash into their pockets.


