### OLD MINING SHAFT IS BELIEVED UNCOVERED BY BLASTING CREWS

"Thar's gold in them thar hills," stated the old prospector here years ago. Whether or not he referred to the hill south of the Col-Tex Refinery is not known, but anyway, there is where traces of it were found Wednesday.

Crews who were engaged in blasting a ditch for a pipe line up one of the hills, rumor says, blasted into a hole which is supposed to have been at one time an old mining shaft-or just a hole.

Rumor says that the hill for a time after discovery of the shaft Wednesday, represented a miniature picture of gold rush days. Claims would have been staked off only for the fact that the land does not belong to the government, and private property is immune from prospectors' claims.

Some say traces of real gold have been found in the shaft, while others say it is only "fool's gold." According to old residents of Colorado there was a shaft sunk south of town, just in the rear of what is now known as the Vance place, about forty years ago, and citizens of the town donated both cash and groceries to the old prospector who had the work in charge. F. M. Burns is reported to have given \$50. Traces of gold were found in this shaft, but not in paying quantities, therefore it was

abandoned. No one has been found who ever knew of the existence of a mine shaft on the hill south of the Col-Tex refinery, and the belief that some old miner, after making the strike had to travel many miles to get grub and was never able to return, lends an air of mystery and eagerness that will not be suppressed without a thorough investigation, If there is gold in "them hills," there are a bunch of prairie dogs and rattlesnakes out of every hole in the county.





Volcanoes once belched forth fire, lava and smoke in this region, the solified flows having been located at several points. The Chisos Mountain is believed by geologists to be the cone of an extinct volcano which once had an altitude of 9,000 feet, but has been cut down by erosion to 8,000 feet. Emory and Livermore peaks are near the 9,000-foot mark and they also are of volcanic origin. Residents of the eastern and central sections of the State are surprised to learn that in the western region there are mountain peaks ranging from 9,000 to 10,000 feet high. Guadalupe Peak near the New Mexico line, is 10,000

Many freaks of nature are to be found in the Big Bend region. One of these is a sunken block 39 miles long and several miles wide that lies 4,000 to 6,000 feet below the surface of the earth. It is one structural unit. There is a smaller block about 300 feet square and 500 feet deep in

Grace Canyon. There are mountains of almost every size and color in the Big Bend. There are bald mountains, pine covered mountains or any kind of old mountain that could be conured up by the most vivid imagination. These mountains are a veritable storehouse of ultitarian and precious minerals and metals. There are mountains of solid granite and mountains of iron and clay. There is hardly a metal or mineral known to the kingdom of geology that can not be found in the Davis Mountains. Few of them, however, are being commercialized to any great extent. 

So many of the stations where eggs are bought, now conduct tests for fertility that their sale is the more reason for segregating or butchering the rooster as soon as his period of usefulness is over. As soon as one breeding season is over, therefore, all male birds should be put in comfortable pens to themselves or should be marketed for table use. Any poultryman who is not already practicing this plan of handling the male birds of his flock is losing money through his old-fashioned methods, and will be well repaid for adopting more up-todate practices.
