Passing of one of the oldest, bestknown, and most faithful negroes of next week's Record. Colorado took place Monday morning with the death of Anderson Barnes, who had for 18 years been janitor Ten Schools Oof of the Colorado National Bank. Barnes's exact age was not known,

though he had been heard to remack that he was four years of age when the Civil War broke out. He came to Mitchell county with some cattlemen in 1882. During his residence at Colorado he worked at all the old saloons, the St. James Hotel, and at Jake Mauer's restaurant.

SWEETWATER MAKES PLANS TO CONSTRUCT VIADUCT

A definite move to eliminate the dangerous grade crossing on the Bankhead Highway as one enters Sweetwater on the west, has been made by that city and the two interested railroads, according to the following article appearing in the Sweetwater Reporter:

Santa Fe railroad engineering department will be asked to prepare cost estimates and tentative plans for a concrete viaduct over the tracks on West Second street (Broadway) following a conference Thursday between the city commission and F. W Christian, Santa Fe superintendent, and W. W. Wilson, chief engineer, both of Temple. E. N. Noyes, Dallas, city plan engineer, was also at the meeting which opened negotiations for the long-talked-of bridge co eliminate the Santa Fe and Orient crossings on the highway. Construction of a concrete viaduct over the railroads has been favored for some time by the city commission, and it is said the Santa Fe also favors the proposition. Cost estimates will be prepared immediately.

CROP CONDITIONS IN TEXAS ARE REPORTED BETTER THAN LAST YEAR

DALLAS, May 15 .- Despite inroads made by wind, rain, and hailstorm May 1, crop conditions in Texas find themselves better than at this time last year, according to reports compiled by the Department of Public Relations of the Southland Life Insurance company.

The entire Panhandle appears to be in unusually good condition and small grai ncrops over the State, except in localities where destroyed, are progressing rapidly and well. It is true, of course, of grain crops as well as cotton that conditions appear spotted over the State, here excellent, there too dry, and in other places too wet. However, the aggregate appears especially good. As to cotton, West Central Texas reports 60 to 70 per cent planted. The West Plains will, however, have some replanting to do because of dry weather and wind damage, but now have good moisture for replanting. West Texas along the T. & P. railway is about 50 per cent planted.

The Texas pecan crop in 1928 was of estimated value of \$2,040,000 for the 450 car leads shipped. The crop is variable, according to weather and other conditions, and within the past ten years has ranged as low as 25 cars, valued at \$200,000 (in 1922). The largest production in that period was in 1919 with 500 cars valued
