STANDARD PICKLE and RELISH RECIPES

Recommended By County Home Demonstration Agt.

The first group of a series of recipes have been tested out by the home industry specialist of the Extension department of A. & M. College and which are recommended by Miss Abbie M. Sevier, county home demonstration agent, as being of women at this time, are given below, following some valuable prerequis- allspice.

Necessary Utensils

There are certain utensils which hould be included in the supplies twice more with fresh boiling brine. when making pickles, relishes, or chow-chow for the market. The strong brine and vinegar solutions used in the pickling process cause a reaction on metal spoons and containers which discolors the product pickles in the dressing and allow to of Et5 of block 138 and gives an unpleasant flavor.






