





THE ROBISON CASE

Abilene Morning News: Now that the house has settled the Robison case, a little history is

After the great drouth of '17 and '18 and the years of depression following the world war, the cow business of West Texas was in a bad way. Many old timers, unable to stand the strain, went to the wall.

Millions of acres of public school and university lands had been thrown on the market some years before the twin disasters, drouth and post-war depression, hit the ranch country. In many cases ranchers who had lived on the land under leases, had organized i atnd had developed an important ranching industry, were outbid on the purchase of the land by outsiders with speculative inent. In order to keep from being thrown out bodily, some of these ranchers bid more than the land was worth.

When hard times came, the inerest on these purchases proved onerous-in some cases, ruinous. It was the desire of the legislature to have these lands reappraised as down as the individual case warranted. To pay for this work of reappraisal a tax of one-cent an acre was assessed against the OWNERS OF THE LAND. Keep that fact in mind. It is important.

J. T. Robison, land commissioner, was ordered to make the reappraisal singlehanded - over his protest. He wanted someone to share the labor and the responsibility with him, but he was overruled. He did the work, traveling hotusands of miles in all sorts of weather, over all sorts of roads or no roads at all. Already well advanced in years, he suffered a breakdown. He collapsed at Marfa and was taken to San Antonio for a serious operation.

Now, here is where the plot hickens. Knowing that the white haired commissioner had broken which is second nature to themthey came to the rescue. The cost of reappraising the land under Robison's guidance was less than one cent an acre. The difference between the actual cost and the one-cent assessment was under he law REFUNDED TO THE RANCHMEN.

These refund checks (their own money first, last and all the time) were immediately endorsed over to Robison by the ranchmen, and sent to him to defray the cost of his operation and hospital bills. It was their money; it never was at any time the State's money; they could do with it as they chose. If they had cashed their checks themselves and sent the cash to Robison, there never would have been any question raised. It never occurred to them that anybody would question their right to give away THEIR OWN MONEY.

This hurried review serves to show why the lower house of the legislature lost no time in refusing to impeach Robison, based on these incidents. The vote was nearly two to one. That verdict, we feel sure, will win approval of most Texans.

Nothing worse than a loose way of doing business was indicated by any of these transactions. It was an old-timey frontier sort of direct action, innocuous of itself but not strictly according to modern ways of conducting business. That is the worst that can be said of it.

SIMMS COMPANY'S NO. ELLWOOD GETS OIL SHOWING AT 4,427 FT.

Shut Down Pending Decision To Run Casing Before Drilling Deeper

Simms Oil Company's No. 1 W. I Ellwood in Mitchell county, which encountered a showing of oil Wednesday night at 4,425 feet in sandy gray lime, remained shut down Saturday at 4,427 feet pending a decision whether to run casing or drill ahead with a wet hole. The test was carrying 3,500 feet of salt water from 4,002-07 feet, representing an accumulation in thirty days, when the oil showing was obtained.

The hole was reduced in size at 4,400 feet and if casing is run, the lower part of the string will be 4 3-4inch and the upper part 5 3-16 inch. After the oil showed up through the column of water, the well deepened two feet Thursday to 4,427 feet without apparent change. Sandy, gray lime has been sold from 4,007 feet to the bottom.

> RECORD'S COTTON CROP PREDICTION

The Colorado Record each year about the 15th of August makes a prediction as to the cotton crop. In the past we have been fairly close on these guesses.

We are setting the figure of 30,000 bales as our guess for this year, with the proviso of 37,000 bales if a good general rain is secured in a week and a favorable late fall season is had. But with the present outlook of dry weather we predict a crop of at least 30,000 bales in Mitchell county.

In 1925 on the 15th of August the Record predicted 40,000 bales, and 39,874 bales were actually

In 1926 our guess in August was 42,000 bales and 41,788 bales were ginned. In 1927 we predicted a crop of

30,000 bales and 30,010 bales were ginned. In 1928 we guessed the crop at

30,000 bales and about 32,000 bales were ginned. Of course, we realize this was

merely a guess, while our estimate

was made after a complete survey of the county. While we have been fairly successful in the past in estimating the crop, we may miss the crop this year more than a mile. We urge our readers to remember this prediction. Mitchell county will make at least 30,-000 bales of cotton this year and but this is an error, there is a possibility the crop may run up to 37,000 bales or more.






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
