Earlier in the day Major William B. Robertson, sponsor of the flight, sent aloft a note requesting the flyers to land some time during the day, and it was considered that in landing they would be acceding to his wishes.

Jackson and O'Brine presumably debated all day over the note calling them down. The text of the note was not made public, but Major Robertson explained in a memorandum that the reason for his decision was that the objects of the test flight had been fully accomplished, as the motor has more than proved itself and that the technical data desired has been

Pass Angeleno 173 Hours The fliers had been in the air almost eighteen days and had exceeded the old endurance record of the Angeleno by 173 hours, 37 minutes and 58 seconds when, with Jackson at the controls, the plane swooped gracefully over the field and settled to earth.

The landing was made in a glard of field lights as a crowd estimated at more than 25,000, many of whom had stood in the rain during the afternoon, burst forth with the greatest ovation witnessed at the field since the homecoming of Col. Charles A. Lindbergh from his New York-to-Paris flight.

Excellent Condition Both men were pronounced in excellent physical condition. O'Brine Jackson went up July 13, scaling 140 pounds tonight as against 138 bounds when the flight began. Jackon's weight was the same as it was

when he went aloft, 154 pounds. The heart action of both men was pronounced normal and physicians said their hearing was normal. They conversed easily with reporters and friends in the hangar.



#### Survey Shows Six Cylinder Cars in Lead

For the first time in the history of the automobile industry, six cylinder cars promise to lead the field in production this year, according to a survey by the Chevrolet Motor Company just completed data on which was received by J. B. Mills, local Chevrolet dealer. Up until this year four cylinder cars ranked first in annual production volume.

Comparative production figures for the first six months of this year are offered in support of the forecast. During this period there were produced approximately 1,900,000 ixes as compared with approximately 1,265,000 fours, an indication of what the total for the year is apt to

How the change comes about is il lustrated in the survey. Chevrolet's manufacturing goal for the year is 1,350,000 cars. Chevrolet's changeover from a four to a six means a deduction of this enormous total from the four cylinder field and adds t to the six cylinder field.

How the automobile picture changed almost overnight will be noted in an inspection of the 1928 showing. Last year when Chevrolet was producing a four cylinder car, four cylinder manufacturers built approximately 2,098,000 cars, with one large manufacturer of four cylinder cars en limited production due to model change, while six cylinder manufacurers were making 1,617,000 cars.

As it now stands the year 1929 should show approximately 3,000,000 six cylinder units as compared to

only 2,250,000 four cylinder units. Consequently this significant development, which will make the current year an epochal one in the annals of the automobile business, comes about chiefly as a result of the entrance of Chevrolet into the sixcylinder field. In lay circles, this event is seen as a tribute to the automobile industry and the newest step which this gigantic business has taken in the direction of constantly offering its patrons more automobile per dollar.

Great volume production, coupled with expert direction in the engineering, manufacturing and selling branches of the business are given as reasons that are making it possible for the automobile industry to lead all others in giving the public the utmost for its money.


