



June was the coldest month of roses ever experienced in this latitude. Frost and ice were as common as buttercups usually are, Almost every green thing was killed and all fruit was destroyed. Snow fell 10 inches deep in Vermont. There was a seven-inch fall in the interior of New York, and the same in Massachusetts. There were only a few moderately warm days. Everybody looked, longed and waited for warm weather, but warm weather did not

#### EGG PRODUCTION FOR MRS. W. H. GREGORY

Mrs. W. H. Gregory of Carr community increased the production of her flock of 130 White Leghorns 20 sonals appearing on an inside page of eggs a day by feeding an egg laying mash. The first ten days the hens were fed a mash they averaged 30 eggs per day while during the last ten days they have averaged 50.2 eggs per day. Last week the hens had been fed the mash for 35 days so they were culled by the county agent and six loafers were removed. About half the flock are pullets. They started laying in July and are now laying good-sized eggs.




