C. W. Palmer Says Crop Failed Only Twice in 23 Years; Made 187 One Year

C. W. Palmer of Loraine has just finished harvesting his crop of sweet potatoes which made 141 measured bushels on a measured acre of ground. During the last 23 years Mr. Palmer has been growing sweet potatoes in Mitchell county and the crop has failed only twice-in 1918 due to drouth, and in 1922 his crop

The smallest yield he has made was 29 bushels per acre and the largest 187 bushels. Mr. Palmer plants from one to two acres each year always on new ground and usually following a feed erop. The erop is grown without irrigation.



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
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
