Costin, city secretary, the city water wells at the north waterworks are declining in production, and the drilling of additional wells has had a tendency to lower production of the old wells. The city owns only 30 acres there and has eight wells on pump now, and only has about seven acres not drilled, Costin said. These wells are producing about 50 gallons each per minute, according to Costin.

The east waterworks has six wells. minute when first drilled.
