ASCS Personnel Attend State Convention

Elmer E. Blackwell, County Committee Chairman, R. G. Lynda, Vice Chairman and Jesse G. Meredith, County Office Manager attended the State ASCS Conference for County Committeemen and County Office Managers in Austin Monday and Tuesday.

The conference was the first statewide conference of its kind ever held in Texas and the purpose was to review the work and goals of ASCS County personnel and to make recommended changes on policy and program changes for better and more economical administration of the farm programs as provided for by Congress.

The meeting was attended by some 800 persons including the State ASC Committee, state office program specialists and USDA Washington officials.

The first day of the meeting was a review of the present farm programs and the orientation of new county committeemen and county office managers. The second day was a series of workshops where recommended changes were developed and presented to the group for approval.

Jesse G. Meredith, Office Manager, stated that some 60 recommended changes were approved by the group on various policy, program and administrative changes.

Elmer E. Blackwell, County Committee Chairman, stated that this was the most constructive meeting that he had attended in his tenure of office as a County Committeeman.

He further stated that the recommended changes were geared generally toward better service to farmers, a better understanding of farm programs by the general public, with the goal of providing fair prices to farmers for their products as well as fair prices to the consumers of farm products, with the highest degree of economy possible.

Countian Found a Demand and Is Filling It With Unique Farm Project

A \$52,000 potential annual gross from an acre of land in Eastland County.

That's farming! And it's not mink or chinchilla raising either. The product is tomatoes. Good red tomatoes.

Not just plain old everyday, run-of-the mill tomatoes either. These are tomatoes of quality, with a capital "Q." Long on flavor, long on looks and long on consumer appeal.

And therein lies the secret — marketability.

In the winter months housewives want flavorful tomatoes the same as in the spring — and Wayne Westerman of

near Rising Star is supplying the product. Growing vine-ripe tomatoes in the winter, in quantity.

All you have to do is simulate spring growing conditions — and that involves heating, ventilating, pest control and all the tender vine-handling procedures that go with producing a fine product.

The 27-year-old Westerman, a returned native of Rising Star, is going to have approximately 13,000 vines under his plastic-covered greenhouses this year. He started his seed in Eastland County sand and liquid fertilizer on Aug. 2, and began transplanting into the large houses on the 10th of August. He expects to see first fruit just before Thanksgiving — when the consumers are looking for a good tomato for their tables.

With careful management and 60 degree night time temperatures in the protected houses, Westerman hopes to reap ten pounds of tomatoes per vine. That's 130,000 pounds and his market price averages 40 cents per pound. This is his third year in operation and it will be the first that he'll do most of his own packing, in eight pound boxes. His market outlets are in Rising Star, Cross Plains and an Abilene re-packer.

The gross looks good, but the expenses are high too — rolls of plastic to cover an acre aren't cheap, and neither is labor, fertilizer or other necessities. However, the ambitious grower has one big saving. He heats his houses with natural gas from wells right on the home place.

A 1959 Texas Tech civil engineering graduate, Westerman was born near Star, moved to New Mexico with his family when he was young and came back to the homeplace to live about four years ago. He and his wife, Ann, have three children, 2, 4 and 5. His father is C. C. Westerman.

Idea for the tomato hot-house came to him at Tech and he thought it was original at the time, but found that it's catching on with a lot of growers over the nation. So he was able to get good advice and help in setting up the project. One of his close counsellors on the mysteries of tomato culture has been Dr. John E. Larson, vegetable horticulturist from Texas A&M.

Dr. Larson was among a group that visited Westerman's tomato haven this week. Others were County Agent J. M. Cooper, Ben McKinnis, and Gilbert Meredith.

Westerman's first crop yielded 8,000 pounds and he's actually planning two crops for this fall and winter, with the second crop to bear from about March 1 until July 1. It takes 120 days from seed to fruit so Westerman will have to have his seedlings ready to go when the first crop's vines are cleared out.

Two full time employees are Milton Bynum and Charles Young.

Tomato growers might like to know that Westerman uses these varieties: Monopal, Step 390, Step 431, Tuckcross V and O, and this year he's trying a development of his own.

ly thawed. Once thawed, however, they should be eaten at once. Sandwiches spoil rapidly after they have warmed to 450 degrees F.

Too much wax, oil and polish can actually dim the beauty of wood finishes. Furniture manufacturers themselves point this out. The best cleaning care, according to the American Walnut Manufacturers Association, is to wash furniture with suds and water. Wash it once or twice with a cloth wrung out of warm soap or detergent suds, then wipe all surfaces with a clean damp cloth and rub dry. All wood pieces — modern or antique — thrive on this basic cleaning, as the suds remove various types of soil which are not affected by simply applying another coat of oil, polish or wax.

When all surfaces are thoroughly clean, use any preferred type of finishing touch.

Polishes or waxes applied too often tend to build up a film which reduces the beauty of the original finish. Authorities recommend that most furniture be waxed only once or twice a year.

Vet's Questions And Answers

Q — What procedure should I follow to obtain an increase in compensation?

A — If you can present evidence to your VA Regional Office that your service-connected disability is possibly worse than when previously rated, a rating examination will be arranged and your right to an increase will be based on the evidence.

Q — A principal beneficiary under a National Service Life Insurance policy elected to take the proceeds on a monthly installment plan, even though a lump sum settlement was available. He died before receiving all of the installments. Who receives the unpaid portion of the policy, the contingent beneficiary?

A — The remaining installments would not be paid to the contingent beneficiary.

Where the principal beneficiary has the option of a lump sum payment and survives the insured, the rights of the contingent beneficiary are wiped out. The commuted value of the unpaid installments would be paid to the estate of the principal beneficiary.

Q — My husband died recently and the VA paid his insurance to his former wife even though they had been divorced 15 years ago. Why was this done?

A — The VA is required by law to pay the insurance to the person last designated as beneficiary by the insured veteran. Your husband either neglected to change his beneficiary after the divorce, or it was his wish that the insurance be paid to the former wife.

Hunters Asked To Send Hides To State Agency

ABILENE — "If you bag one — bag it!" deer hunters are reminded by Mrs. T. C. Campbell, Abilene. "At least bag the hide," she pleads, "as we're begging every scrap of buckskin for patients in our state hospitals and special schools."

The Volunteer Services Council, headed by Mrs. Campbell, once again will have donated hides tanned and distribute the leather among the 28,000 patients in Texas mental hospitals, tuberculosis hospitals, and schools for the mentally retarded. It is used in rehabilitation projects.

"Throw a handful of table salt on the hide, let it drain, 'bag' it in heavy paper and send it to Austin Taxidermist Studio, 2708 South Lamar, Austin, and we'll do the rest."

State Asking \$1,439.80 From Co. In Escheat

The State of Texas is suing Eastland County again — for \$1,439.80 held in escheat money by the 91st District. Under recent state legislation the state collects funds held in trusts and other sources for more than seven years, and legal proceedings are brought as a formality to obtain the funds. The present suit is for escheat monies dating to 1955 and 1956.

Browsing With Bev

Let the youngsters help you "do sandwiches" each weekend. They'll love the chance to pick their own fillings and look forward to finding these sandwiches in their lunches.

Some fillings that freeze well are luncheon meats, leftover sliced or chopped roast beef, roast pork, baked ham, chicken, turkey, dried beef, well-drained tuna or salmon, sliced cheese, cheese spreads, hard-cooked egg yolks, and peanut butter. You may use these separately or combined with cream cheese, milk, dairy sour cream, applesauce, creamed butter, or lemon, orange, or pineapple juice to make spreading easy. Add sliced or chopped olives and pickles, if desired. Spread the bread with softened (not melted) butter or margarine to keep the filling from soaking into the bread.
