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WOLVES PERCHED ON LOW RUNG AS LAST GAME FOR SEASON ENDED THURSDAY

Big Spring Steers Get Break In Third to Cop Victory Over Local Eleven

The Wolves must have entered the 1932 interscholastic league conference schedule at the big end of the horn. Until they met Sweetwater on Armistice day the Cantrells had swept aside every opposing team engaged, for the most part, in victory with not one point chalked up to credit of the enemy. But the last three conference tilts were not in keeping with that record.

At Sweetwater the Mustangs scored on Colorado's diminutive ball carriers almost at will. That the Wolves had no chance of holding themselves in the undefeated class was apparent before the opening gun. The following week Harry Taylor's club over at San Angelo gave the Wolves another drubbing. Then at Big Spring on Thanksgiving the Steers were victorious.

The Big Spring tilt was in favor of Colorado through three periods. The Wolves outplayed the Steers through the first half, with neither eleven managing to score. The Steers came back in the third quarter, however, with a different story to tell. They effected the fourth consecutive touchdown, running up a total of twenty-six points. The fourth period brought some spectacular ball playing from among the ranks of the Wolves. They held the Steers and managed to carry the ball across for their only and only touchdown. The game ended 26-7.

Sweetwater won the district pennant Thursday in defeating San Angelo 21-0. McCamey defeated Midland 26-13, placing the Red Dogs definitely in the cellar with not one game won during the conference schedule.

Following Sweetwater in first place, San Angelo finished the district in second, Big Spring third, Colorado fourth, McCamey fifth and Midland sixth.

Mr. S. W. Scott and children spent Sunday with her mother Mrs. Felts.

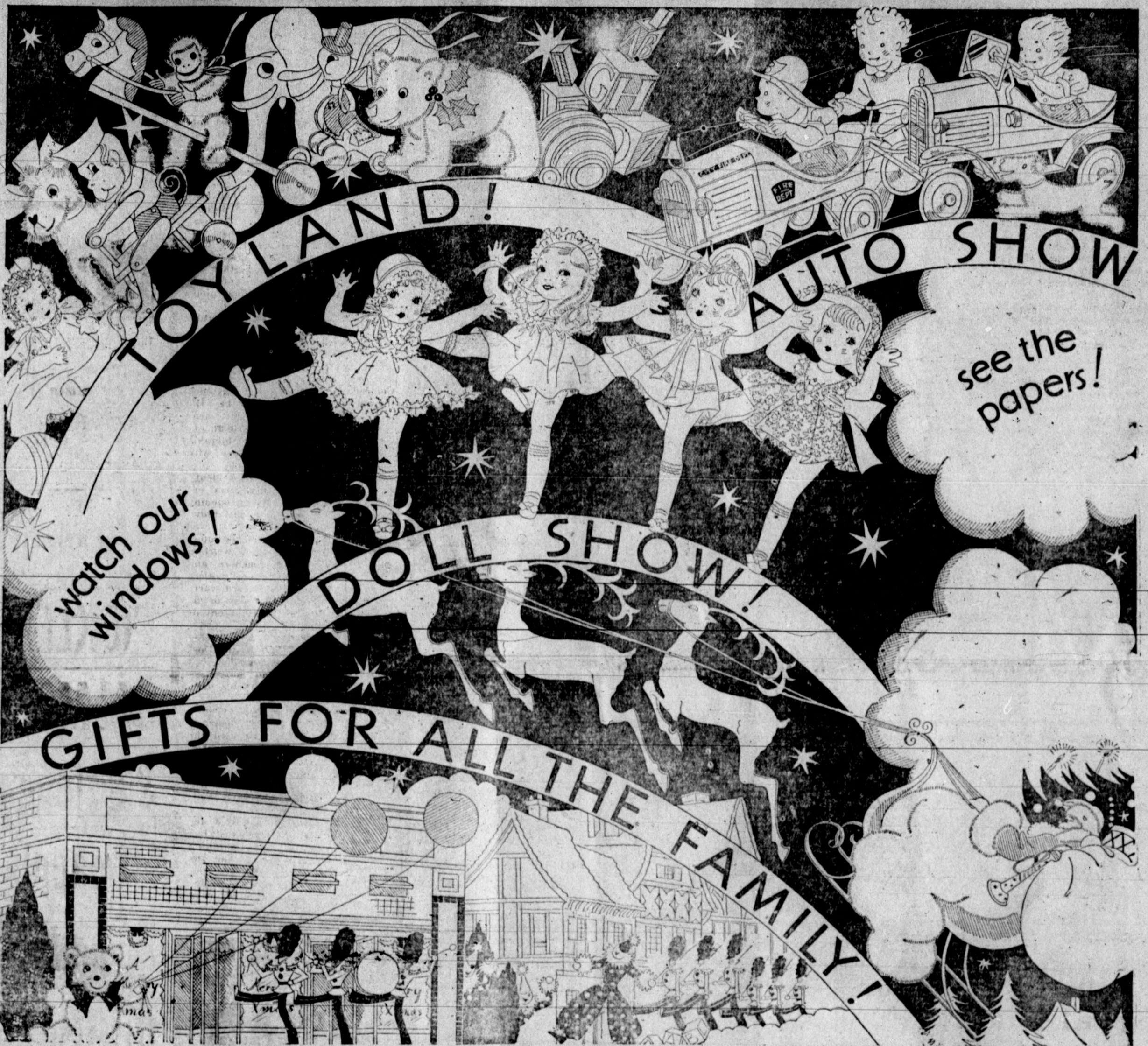
