## MERCURY DROPS TUESDAY NIGHT TO LOWEST LEVEL REGISTERED IN 3 YEARS

## Range Cattle 'Shrink' But No Losses Reported To ... Thursday Noon

Gripped in throes of the most severe blizzard within three years, Coloradons, Thursday afternoon were from Dallas Thursday at noon and giving consideration to hope that Friday would bring an abating temperature from the biting cold that since Monday midnight has prevailed. The blizzard is the most severe recorded here since January, 1930, when the mercury dropped to 10 degrees below. Wednesday morning at 6 o'clock a reading of 6 below was registered here.

The cold flurry swooped down on this section Monday night. At 11 p. m. the gentle south breeze that had prevailed some days, bringing with it typical Indian Summer weather, suddenly gave way to a blast out of the north. Before morning a drop in temperature of 35 degrees had been brought about. 4 above zero was registered at 7 o'-

clock Tuesday. Through Tueseday the weather continued cold, with occasional snow flurries adding to zest of the severe nightfall the weather grew colder. and at 6 a. m. Wednesday the low mark of six degrees below zero was

reached. No losses had been reported by Mitchell county cattlemen up to Thursday at noon, although range cattle suffered considerably from severe cold. Cows and calves were drawn but due to fact they were in excellent condition came out from effects of the blizzard little worse from the experience.

Damage reported from freezing automobile radiators and engine to the blizzard. Several Colorado motorists report damage to their machines. Water pipes were frozen and burst in a number of homes.

The freeze has come as a boom day morning that organization plans to Mitchell county fruit growers. Trees, some of them already showing signs of beginning to bud, have been set back several days. There is small probability that the fruit crop will be killed by frost or freezing this Spring.

Farmers having small grain crops will bear brunt of losses to be credited to the blizzard. These crops were badly damaged.






