But Few Borrowers Received Maximum Amount Under 1932 Contracts

But few if any Mitchell county farmers will be effected by the reduction of \$100 from maximum crop production loans to be advanced this year. Secretary Hyde announced at Washington Friday that the maximum loan to any farmer would be \$300. Last year the maximum was \$400

But few farmers obtained the maximum loan last year, Jim Greene, secretary of the chamber of commerce, reported Saturday morning. The chamber acted as agent for the county committee and government in handling applications from farmers during both 1932 and 1931.

Another feature of the plan unde which loans are to be advanced this year provides that borrowers of last year who are in arrears will be bin ifed to \$100. Rut lew farmer this county will be registered in that class. A. C. Cooper of Sweetwater, district representative for the goyernment in collections, stated recently that only about two percent of

I believe terraces over a five year period will increase crops one fourth each year." Mr. Hardee had about 75 acres terraced and terraced about 70 -acres more last week.

The writer was invited last week to visit a new food cellar on a Mitchell county farm but it resembled a ommunity grocery more than a food cellar. There were 1266 containers of food on the shelves not counting what they had eaten since the vegetable canning season ended. In addition there were 300 pounds of sugar, a sack of salt and enough coffee to last a year. They also had the cured meat from 6 or 8 hogs in the smoke house. (Name withheld

Still another advantage in terracng is shown in the report of Lewis Vowe'l who says before he terraced he had to replant some of his crop every year due to blowing or having some of the crop washed up or covered up by rains. The year before he terraced he replanted 3 to 5 times in places. Since he terraced he says he has had to replant only one time and that was on account of weeds. He finds that the crooked rows prevent sandblowing to a large extent. He is terracing some more this






