COOPERATION OF FEDERAL BOARD WILL BE SOUGHT IN REHABILITATION OF PLANT

Plans To Request RFC Help On Highway Project Are Found Improper

Prospects that the Federal government, through its RFC Board. may be induced to extend financial cooperation to the city in rehability ating the salt industry here was accepted with a deal of enthusiasm by directing officials of the chamber of commerce.

"The government as advancing funds for employment and the building of public improvements in other parts of the country and I can see no reason why the same would not be proper at Colorado, Judge C. My chief recollection of the thinly settled west of that day was the courthouses, notably at Sweetwater, Abilene, and other places, and I always thought Colorado had one, also, showing up largely, yet Fred Whipkey has shown me in later years that Colorado only had a sinecure courthouse at that time, nothing like the fine one nowadays.

Also I recall, as a boy, one of my chief pastimes of the trip was shooting at jackrabbits from the train window, having provided myself with a .38 caliber Smith and Wesson, and a box of cartridges. It was great sport, though it is doubtful if I hit any of the rabbits. And I believe that was the last pistol I ever owned, as pistol toting went out of style soon afterward.

I so appreciated the "free dinner" of my friend John Birdwell, that in 1919 on returning from another trip to California, I dropped off and spent a day with John and his interesting family, which was the occasion of the last time I saw my friend as he passed on to his Heavenly Reward not so very long thereafter.

My regards to several old friends in Colorado, though am afraid to mention any I remember as so many have passed on also. May we aff so live that when our time comes, we can "wrap the drapery of our couch around us, and lie down to peaceful slumber."


